

A LIST OF YORKSHIRE PARISHES HAVING CHAPELRIES

In parts of Yorkshire the parishes are large and the more distant areas are served by chapels under the jurisdiction of the parish church, but in the marriage registrations the parishes of the participants are given and at times this can lead to confusion for genealogists. Thus, for instance, one who was baptised at Chapel le Dale and is presumed to have lived with his parents on the family farm in the neighbourhood, is given in the record of his marriage as being "of Bentham". For the help of members a list of parishes in Yorkshire which also contain chapelries as noted in the "Map of the Yorkshire Ancient Parishes and Chapelries based on George Lawton's collections relative to York and Ripon (1842) and Henry Teesdale's Map of Yorkshire (1817-1828)" obtained from the Yorkshire Archaeological Society is appended.

INGLETON FELLS AND CHAPEL-LE-DALE

In correspondence with member Mr.H.E.Crossfield, I queried his recording of some of his ancestors' births and marriages at "Ingleton Fells", as in the Map of Yorkshire Ancient Parishes and Chapelries that I had no such chapel appeared.

I have just received a letter (5.7.83) from him explaining the mystery. He had been to Lancaster University and Preston C.R.O. and had found a printed copy of Ingleton and Chapel-le-Dale parishing registers in one volume with an introduction which stated that the Chapel was first known as Ingleton Fells.

I had previously written to Northallterton C.R.O., expecting that the registers would be there, regarding the possibility of an ancestor of mine being baptised there 1730-1745. The reply I got was that the separate registers of the chapelry of Chapel-le-Dale begin in 1775. However, Mr. Crossfield's ancestors were married 1739, 1747, 1761, 1768 and baptised 1758, 1760, 1762 at Ingleton Fells. So it would seem that there are two names and two (at least) registers for this Chapel.

GRINTON REGISTERS

The following abstract is part of an article by J.R.scarr in the June issue of "The Newsletter" of the Yorkshire Archaeological Society, Family History Section, which may prove the answer to a riddle for some of us.

"But why was there no mention of Richard in the baptisms in Grinton parish registers? Some weeks later it was possible to check the original registers, and there among the baptisms, the mystery came to light. A note written by the embarrassed Vicar, the Rev. Tobias West, A.M. stated: "Memorandum that there is a 4 years a-wanting in this register by the neglect of the then Clerk who should have kept them".

No entries had been made between September 1690 and May 1692 or between May 1693 and July 1696, and the Parish Clerk's dereliction of duty had been the cause of the vain and endless searches."

SOME METCALFES NOTED IN BOOKS

The following Metcalfes noted in the books named may be the ancestor of one or other of us if we are able to trace our families back so far, hence are given for readers interest and wry amusement in view of the foregoing statement.

From "Companion into North Riding" by J.M.Ingram, p.201

"An old record relating to a charge of poaching is of interest for the light it throws upon the names and characters of Swaledale families in the early sixteenth century. 'In the year 1500 Sir Ralph Bygod, Knt, lord of Swaledale Forest, Claimed against Galfred Metcalfe of Mewcre, yeoman, Alexander Metcalfe of Mewcre, chaplain, Ralph Milner of Mewcre, yeoman; John Brandryke of Mewcre; Richard, George, and John Alderson of Keld, yeomen; Thomas Mawer of Thwayt, yeoman; Christopher Metcalfe of Gunnersett, yeoman; Simon Huchenson of Satorne, yeoman; John Wharton of Cawnerd House, and James Milner of the same place, yeoman; for forcible entering his free chase at Mewcre, Keld, Thwayt and Gunnersett without his leave or licence, hunting therein, and taking many beasts of chase, which they bore away, besides committing other enormities."

"The first Askrigg /clock/ makers were Mark Metcalfe, James Wilson who died in 1750, and Christopher Caygill, who died in 1803. Their clocks had only one hand, and they introduced arched faces, generally of brass."

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CUMBERLAND TO CANADA

Miss FloraA, Metcalfe (No.26) of Ontario sent us the following extracts about a notable James Metcalfe to whom she is related:-

JAMES METCALFE,

TORONTO.

JAMES METCALFE, one of the leading citizens of Toronto, and ex-member of Parliament for the East Riding of York, is an Englishman by birth, and was born in Cumberland in the year 1822. The Metcalfe family, though very numerous, are all of the same stock and descendants of a very ancient family, justly entitled to the compliment paid them by the compiler of the life of Lord Metcalfe, a gentleman of our time, well-known in Canada, viz., that they were industrious, honest, and unassuming people, whose integrity was a better inheritance than titles. One of them was knighted at the famous battle of "Bosworth Field," by Richard the Third, for bravery. The father of our subject was James Metcalfe, a practical builder and

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contractor in Cumberland, but who removed to the city of Manchester to engage in the same business, shortly after the birth of his son James. The mother of the latter was Anne Finlinson, of an old North of England family.

Our subject was sent to school in Manchester, where he obtained an ordinary education. His studies were devoted chiefly to mathematics, for which branch he seemed to possess an aptitude, which with the knowledge he afterwards gained of men and their affairs, poculiarly fitted him for the business to which he has principally devoted his attention-contractor, builder, and real estate. After leaving school he entered his father's office in Manchester, and under his direction studied architecture and other practical branches of the builder's art. When about nineteen years of age his attention was attracted to the new world as offering more inviting fields and better chances for a young man, and before the end of the year (1841), he had emigrated to Canada and settled in Toronto. Being a young man of energy, pluck and integrity, and not afraid to work, Mr. Metcalie soon established for himself a favorable reputation. Forming a partnership here, the business of contracting and building was actively and entensively engaged in. After the dissolution of the partnership in 1851, Mr. Metcalfe again decided to emigrate with the desire to better his fortunes, this time to Australia, then the centre of attraction to large numbers on account of recent discoveries of gold. He reached Melbourne in 1852, and remained there about four years, engaged in building on contracts. During this time he made several important building contracts, and was employed by Sir Redmund Barry (now Chief Justice of Victoria), to build the Public Library, of which he was the Commissioner. He also built the Bank of New South Wales, the London Chartered Bank of Australia, and the Hall of Commerce, all of which were at the time the best buildings in Melbourne. After a very successful career, especially from a financial point of view, Mr. Metcalfe returned to Toronto in 1858, and since that has resided in Yorkville. His attention has been chiefly devoted to real-estate transactions, especially of late years, but he has also been prominently connected with many of the monetary institutions of the city. The evidence of his skill as a builder will remain as long as the following mentioned buildings, with many others, are seen in Toronto: St. James Cathedral, the old Post Office on Toronto Street, Trinity College, the Normal School, and St. Lawrence Hall.

Mr. Metcalfe's usefulness has not, however, been confined to private business, for at the first general election after Confederation, he was induced to contest East York for the House of Commons; was successful, and, by re-elections continued to represent that constituency in Parliament till 1878, when in common with the Reform Administration he was defeated. His career in the House was a creditable one, and the confidence of his constituents in his ability, was shown by their returning him by acclamation in 1872, and again in 1874.

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Mr. Metcalfe was married in the County of Peterborough, Ontario, in 1843, to Ellen, daughter of John Howson, of that county. By this union he has one surviving son, Rev. James Finlinson Metcalfe, who resides in East York, and is married to a daughter of the late Rev. H. W. Wilkinson. He is a Minister of the Methodist Church of Canada, but has retired from active pastoral duties.

In the foregoing sketch we have given a brief notice of the career of one eminently worthy of being classed among the self-made men of Ontario, and one who by honest industry, integrity and uprightness, has won his way from a small beginning to a recognised position among the solid and respected citizens of Canada.

*METCALFE, James, M.P., born in Cumberland, England, 1822; son of James Metcalfe and Anne Finlinson; married Ellen Howson, 1843; attended school at Manchester, England; came to Canada, 1841, and became a builder at Toronto; emigrated to Australia, 1851, but returned to Toronto, 1858; was again a builder and real estate broker and financier at Toronto; was Vice President, Royal Canadian Bank; elected to the House of Commons, 1867, for York East, Ont.; re-elected, 1872, 1874; defeated, 1878; Liberal; died, Sept. 13, 1886, at Toronto, Ont.

LATER YEARS

Joseph Hargrave opened the Eglinton Post Office in 1856.¹⁰ His little shoemaker's shop had already expanded to sell groceries. It was in the centre of the district, with the Wesleyan Methodist Church and Jacob Lawrence's tannery to the north, the hotel to the south, and a school was built across the road in 1879.

James Metcalfe, M.P.P., in 1856 owned one of the show places of Yonge Street, and delighted the country children with his Australian birds. Cockatoos, magpies, pheasants and peacocks wandered freely around the grounds on the west side of Yonge, north of Lawrence. In his younger days, he had been a builder and contractor. His business failed with heavy liabilities, and he departed for Australia where he accumulated a large fortune. Upon returning to Canada he gave a banquet and invited all his old creditors. On the table, under the plates, each guest found a cheque in full for his account, with interest added to date.¹¹

No: 53. Miss Ethel Metcalfe - 11 The Downs, Sandy Lane, Prestwich, Manchester, M25 8RB. Descent from Anthony Metcalfe who married Margaret Rallinshaw 1805 at Tunstall nr Cowan Bridge, Lanc. Their first 4 children, Mary, Margaret, Elizabeth and Thomas were born 1806 - 1811 and bapt at Tunstall and are shown on the CFI. Their next 4, Ann, William, Anthony and George were born 1815 - 1821 at "TIMRIG" which is untraced to date and they do NOT show on the CFI. Other children, Agnes, John and Jane 1824 - 1832 were born at Over Kellet, Lancs but again do not show on the CFI.

Mrs. Ann Crabbe recommends the book "A Dales Heritage" by Marie Hartley and Joan Ingleby, price £ 5.50 and published by Dalesman Books, Clapham, YKS. It contains many Metcalfe mentions in and around Swaledale and Wensleydale.

Our Mormon Microfiche (CFI) print outs now cover the whole of the U.K. with the Spouse Index standing at 7000+ cards. My current project is to extract all the Metcalfe entries from the YPRS series and other printed parish registers available at Claremont. These have revealed some very interesting snippets, such as a marriage at Manfield near Darlington of "Dorothy Metcalfe to Thomas Brown, Clerk, both otp by banns 8 Nov 1785. Being 60th year of his age and the 25th of hers".

We are now members of the Guild of One-Name Studies and have received a letter from a Hebden member, Mr.J.R. Hebden, 15 Nailcote Avenue, Tile Hill, Coventry CV4 9GT. His ancestors were in Raydale, near Bainbridge Wensleydale, from 1700 to late C19 during which many of his family married Metcalfes. He offers to exchange information, a SAE was enclosed. Other enquiries have come but havenot lead to any new members so far.
