Grandparents: - William MTE 22 bach miner of Riseburn son of Henry MTE, miner, married Selina Downs 20 spr of Middridge dau of William Downs, publican, took place at the parish church SHILDON. Co Durham. England on 28th Oct 1890.

Miss Y. Dixon, member 155. 11 Norwood Terrace, Burley in Wharfedale, Ilkley, LS29 7EY. Yorkshire.

Thomas MTE married Frances Jackson 2nd May 1850 at Hawes. Thomas b c1825 at Mallerstang, Westmorland was son of Joseph.

Mr. Edward Metcalfe, member 158. 18 Larch Rise, Barrow in Furness, LA13 OJZ Cumbria.

Thomas born 4 Nov 1842 Burton in Lonsdale son of Edward and Mary Ann (Wilcock) MTE who mar 26th Jan 1839 at Bentham.

He was tried at York and sentenced to seven years for manslaughter and obtained his 'Free Certificate' in 1850.

Anthony born circa 1700 ? son of Cuthbert, yeoman, and Barbary (?Lister) MTE. Cuthbert bpt & mar not yet traced. ALICE MTE wife of Anthony possibly dau of Philip and Alice Mte bpt 29.12.1699 Hawes.

William b c1840 at Bainbridge son of Richard Lawson MTE and his wife Elizabeth Cockbone who mar 1829 at Aysgarth. Richard bpt 12.5.1803 Askrigg, son of James.

Mrs Vicky Young, member no: 178. 18 Elstree Road, Fairfield, Liverpool, L6 8NU.

dau of George Albert & Alice Margaret (MTE) Elliott. Alice Margaret b 1917 Liverpool, dau of Guy Tiplady & Eleanor (Cockburn) MTE. Guy b Aug 1891 Countersett, Wensleydale Yks; son of John & Mary (Tiplady) MTE. John bpt 20.8.1854 at Stallingbusk, Wensleydale, 5th child of 9 of Christopher and Jane (MTE) MTE who mar 31.1.1846 Stallingbusk. (Christopher's parentage not yet traced but after Jane's death in 1866 he married Esther Tiplady and they are buried at Askrigg). Jane bpt 16.11.1823 Stallingbusk 4th child of 8 of John & Margaret (?) MTE. John bpt 6.10.1793 stallingbusk 9th child of 16 of William & ANN\* (Tomlin) MTE. William bpt 13.5.1759 son of John & Alice (Tennant) MT who mar Stallingbusk 13.6.1754. \* Ann Tomlin was grand-daughter of William & Anne (MTE) Hodgson who mar 22.4.1732 Askrigg.

Mr C.A. Fryer, member no: 179. Manor Cottage, Stillingfleet, York. YO4 6SF. Fryer ancestors were at Sicklinghall near Wetherby, Yks: circa 1884, thought to have come from the Grinton area of Swaledale after 1862. Grandmother Fryer is believed to have been a Metcalfe but no christian names known. Family possesses a sampler bearing these details: - "1822 Eleanor Metcalf born October 2nd 1808". Can anybody help?

Mr Alan Thompson, member 180. 19 Laburnum Park, Bradshaw, Bolton. BL2 3BX. Lancashire.

Son of Edward & Rosamund (Mte) Thompson who mar 1903 Ilkley, Yks: Rosamund b 1874 Brompton by Northallerton, Yks: also had an elder sister Anna Maria b 1869 and they were the daus of Christopher Mte and his second wife ???? Thompson. Christopher's first marriage to ?? had also produced two daus; JAEL and JANE. Christopher was a blacksmith in Brompton and is believed to have had a brother Henry or Robert who farmed at Burley Woodhead in Wharfedale and who had children Robert & Maggie. Christopher also had a niece May Metcalfe who became housekeeper to a Mr Jarret of Panorama Drive, Ilkley, in the early 1900s. Christopher's father is also thought to have been a Blacksmith.

Great grandson of John & Ruth (Mte) Robinson who mar 29.4.1840 Kendal, Westmorland. Ruth b 1815 Killington, Westm: possibly the Ruth bpt 4.8.1816 Killington dau of James & Jane Mte.

Mr Colin Metcalf, member 182. 54 Marine Parade, Shoreham, Victoria 3916, Australia.

Son of George & Edith Margaret (Craven) MT who mar 1933 St Hilda's, Whitby, Yks: England. George b 1906 son of William & Annie (Iredale) MT who mar 13.4.1898. William b 29.5.1874 Market Weighton, Yks: son of Thomas & Mary (Wardell) MT who mar 11.10.1863 at Parish Church, Market Weighton. (They had 9 sons and 2 daus but only two produced issue - William b 1874 and his brother Charles who died in London and had Sheila, Mary & Peter). Thomas, a blacksmith, and Mary lived at 3 Beverley Road, Market Weighton and he was bpt Dec 1840 there, son of Thomas & Sarah (Cherise) MT. Thomas b c1804 died 3.6.1876 at Market Weighton was also a blacksmith, \*and was the son of Michael who was bpt 13.9.1772 at South Kilvington near Thirsk, Yks: the son of Michael & Margaret (Catterson) MD/MT who mar 26.11.1754 South Kilvington. Michael bpt 12.10.1731 at Leake, the next parish to South Kilvington, son of John.

\* All after here awaiting confirmation.

Whose wife is the dau of Mabel Violet(Metcalfe) and her husband. Mabel born 19.11.1875 at Scarborough, Yks: dau of James MTE and Mary (Bores). James was a jeweller of 32 Westborough, Scarborough and he was born there circa 1843 son of William MTE, cabinet maker.

Miss Rachael A. Metcalfe, member 184. Norton Priory, Norton, Nr. Doncaster, DN6 9BX, South Yorkshire.

Dau of Clive & E. (Stanley) MTE. Clive son of Rodney & M. (Williamson) Mte. Rodney son of Clifford George Mte who was born 6.6.1911 the son of George Joliffe MTE who was the son of J.W. Metcalfe.

This appears to connect with our founder member Mary Metcalfe - awaits confirmation.

Dau of John & Minnie (Baul) Clarkson. Minnie Baul b 1880 dau of Robert and Elizabeth (MTE) Baul. Elizabeth b 1844 dau of George MTE who was 5th child of 8 of James & Mary (?) MTE, James was a carpenter of North Stainley near Ripon circa 1822 and also landlord of the 'Stavely Arms' at North Stainley. James 1777 - 1861 was son of George 1740 - 1833.

Dr John H. Chippendale, member 186. 1 Collingham Park, Scotforth, Lancaster, LA1 4PD. Lancs:

Son of Thomas & Lilian (MTE) Chippendale. Lilian b 1901 Millthorp, Yks: dau of Christopher & Margaret (Tebay) MTE who lived Millthorp (in parish of Sedbergh) and then moved to Sedbergh circa 1915. Christopher was a horse and cart carrier between Sedbergh and Kendal and was the son of John MTE of Dent and his wife ?? Mason. (IGI has John bpt 28.5.1838 Dent son of James and Ann).

Mr Donald G. Halliday, member 187. 23 Clarence Road, Exmouth, EX8 1LB.Devon.

Descendant of Henry & Hannah (Medcraft) Grant who mar 1843 Millbrook, Hampshire. Hannah bpt 17.7.1808 at Dawlish, Devon dau of Edward & Mary (Sheriff) Midcraft/Medcraft/Mitcraft who mar 26.12.1807 Dawlish, Devon. Edward b c1781 ? arrived as a servant with one of the wealthy families that went to Dawlish when it was first expanded as a resort in the beginning of the 19th Century. Edward had sisters Maria b c1780 and Elizabeth b c1798, surnames given as METCALFE. Investigations taking place as to whether this family could be children of Edward & Ursula from Fenny Compton, Warwickshire - the only county showing children of these names any where near the right age group. Does anybody have any other clues ??

Mr John C. Metcalfe, member 188. 12 Fairfax Street, Skipton, BD23 2DP.
North Yorkshire.

Born Skipton, son of Richard & Alice (Mason) MTE who mar 1930. Richard b 1905 at Bradford, Yks: son of Matthew & Annie Jane (Copeland) MTE. Matthew b 1880 7th and last child of Matthew & Elizabeth (Lancaster) MTE. Matthew, who became a farmer & innkeeper at Gisburn, Yks: was born 1837. Family said to have come from Beckermonds.

A gravestone at HUBBERHOLME church of a JOHN MTE from Gisburne d Sept 1878 aged 67, Sarah his wife d 18.5.1870 aged 56 and dau Mary Ann  $\overline{d}$  Aug 1869 aged 28 --- could this John be an elder brother to Matthew ??

#### MECCA MUSTER 1986

On Saturday 6th September about 46 'Meccas' and friends, representing eleven counties of England & Wales, assembled at Boroughbridge High School for the third Mecca Muster.

After a welcoming cup of coffee our secretary, Nina Benson, added her own welcome to everyone and thanked them for coming. In her report she said that the active membership had now reached 157 including 35 overseas members. New members are always welcome, she said, and appealed for people to be always on the look-out for new members, as she herself was. The Spouse Index now holds nearly 10,000 cards and was available for members to search.

Apologies were received from Mary Metcalfe, John Kitchin, Valerie Metcalfe (our Editor, who sent a photograph of herself to help members 'put a face to her name'), Dorothy Galliford, and Helen Offer.

Nina then explained her methods regarding indexes and record-keeping and thanked the other officers for their tireless work.

Mr George Buxton (General Index Keeper) reported that he now has an Index of over 20,000 cards. This takes a lot of transporting and if it gets much bigger it will be impossible. Apart from his wife, Janet, George now has the assistance of member Miss Sandra Metcalf. Two members present offered to help with future transportation.

The Treasurer, Mrs Margaret Metcalfe reported that the financial position was in a healthy state and thanked members for donations of stamps and money. She suggested that an Auditor be appointed and Mr Frank Bradley of Ilkley, who claimed no Metcalfe blood, offered to undertake this job and he was duly appointed. Members felt we should also make plans for obtaining Charity status and to allow for the remote posibility of the closure of the Society and the disposal of any remaining monies. This would mean changes to the Constitution and the Secretary is to investigate.

In the absence of the Editor, Mrs Valerie Metcalfe, her report was read by the Secretary. In her report she stated that it was hoped to maintain the larger number of sheets per issue.

The following questions were then asked :-

- Q. Do copies of the Newsletter go to any libraries ?
- A. No, but it was suggested we try Northallerton, the Borthwick and also the Yorkshire F.H.S.
- Q. Are we members of the One-Name Society ?
- A. Yes, and through it we are affiliated to the Federation of Family History Societies.
- Q. Are there any Mormon records of deaths ?
- A. No, in their eyes, we do not die.
- Q. Is there any definite way of tracing deaths ?
- A. Secretary has copies of Monumental Inscriptions from a few upper Wensleydale willages..and as wills are evidence of death these should be consulted.
- Q. Secretary enquired if members wished to continue buying new issues of the I.G.I. In view of the increasing availability through county FHSs

and the Mormon churches, it may be that members could continue their own research. ?

- A. It was the general feeling that perhaps full membership should be consulted and therefore next years subscription slip will carry extra questions. (So in the meantime will members please ask around to find if they do have a nearby source Sec).
- Q. George Buxton asked if anyone would offer to help him extract all Metcalfe Wills from the P.R.O. Also Barbara Kent asked if it would be possible to extract the Wills from the Borthwick Institute in York.?
- A. George is to begin at the PRO and Jean & Frank Bradley are to begin some Northern records. There is an obvious need for a Projects Organiser, but nobody volunteered. (Can anybody help?)
- Q. The Secretary enquired if somebody would re-vamp the information leaflets to explain the working of the society to new members.
- A. Anne Magee undertook this work.

There being no further questions the Secretary made two proposals :-

- 1) That the Society purchase a secondhand electric typewriter, approx: cost £50 for the post of Editor. This would enable the newsletter to be typed up in fair copy ready for the Printer to photocopy in place of a complete re-type, and will thus cost much less.

  Seconded by Carol Arkwright and carried unanimously.
- 2) That subscriptions for 1987 remain at the present rate.

  Barbara Kent proposed leaving the matter with the Secretary for one year allowing her to raise them if necessary at her own discretion. Seconded by Eunice Herring and carried unanimously.

There being no volunteers to organise our next Mecca Muster elsewhere the Secretary suggested holding it at the same place on the first Saturday in September 1988. This was unanimously agreed to, though it was also felt that soon it would be necessary to hold ANNUAL General Meetings.

The meeting ended by Mr Frank Bradley proposing a vote of thanks to Nina Benson for all the hard work she had put in and for acting as Chairman as well as being Secretary.

An excellent lunch followed the business meeting and provided an opportunity for members to chat and get to know one another.

The afternoon session took the same format as previous Musters when members were able to consult the Indexes and Microfiche print-outs and inspect each others family trees and, perhaps, find some hitherto unknown relative.

The meeting was honoured by a visit from the Yorkshire Post reporter and photographer and a number of photographs were taken and some members were interviewed. An excellent report appeared in the following Monday' edition of the paper along with three good photographs.

Tea was served about 3.pm and just before the meeting ended, a family of Metcalfes from Hornby, Bedale, walked in, having read about the Muster in the local paper, and after learning more about us, joined on the spot which was a very nice ending to an enjoyable and successful day.

#### Contemplations from K.O.G.I.

It occurred to me at the Muster that many members were at a loss as to how "the system" worked. SO AM I  ${\tt I}$ 

The information arrives from two sources, 1) Mrs Offer and 2) you, the member.

Mrs Offer receives 'LISTS', these tend to be from Parish Registers and Census returns, but can be of any Metcalfe involvement, i.e. Westminster Abbey and City of London. Mrs Offer then makes out a 6" x 4" card, noting all confirmed facts such as:- name(s), date of birth, parentage, marriage details, any children's names with their birth dates together with any other fact. Each 'LIST' donated by a member is numbered, and this number is entered onto the card alongside the 'fact', hence the original document can easily be traced if necessary.

#### You, the Member.

You should send me a copy of your Family Tree. I then get one of my lady helpers (Sandra Metcalf and Kay Davey) to make out a card. Each'Family Tree'is given a number, i.e. FT6, and this number entered onto the card. My third assistant, my wife Janet, then enters each card onto a 'Town Index' card. This gives name, date and List/FT number. These are filed in Alpha/numero order, not in list or FT order.

I am allowed to file and to reply to correspondence. The idea is that if a member requires information on a person, we should be able to locate all people of that name, or if information about a location is required, I can advise what List we have.

It sounds simple but it is time consuming. So if I do not reply to your letters please chase me up - I tend to work in fits and starts. We have about 20,000 cards now, with approx: 5,000 to add. Kay Davey is sorting all the information we have into alphabetical order, this we hope to have ready for the booklet Dorothy Pope is producing. This will also enable us to state what information we hold and what we require to, say, complete a parish. One or two places I can think of :- P.R.O. - Somerset House - including Index to Wills (not the Wills themselves) and a source I have not studied but have read about - Victoria Tower. At various times a 'Muster Roll' was made, these give age, description and name. It would be good if we could copy these. SO. ANY HELP PLEASE?

Up to now I have sent information free of charge, if however a copy of a parish register or census list is requested then I think a charge of 10p per sheet is not unreasonable.

I hope this helps you to understand the system - I think I do now ! Unfortunately I am <u>unable</u> to help more members than I <u>can</u> help - so we must EXPAND.

## FROM HAWNBY near HELMSLEY, YORKSHIRE TO NOVA SCOTIA, CANADA.

This story has come to us via our member Miss Denise Smith, 454 Wakabayashi Crescent, Saskatoon, Sask: Canada S7K 7A4 who in turn received it from Mr Ernest E. Coates, Nappan R.R. 2, Cumberland County, Nova Scotia, Canada, BOL 1CO.

I re-type The Metcalfe Family story as compiled by Priscilla R. Dunlop, on 12th March 1968. However there are errors, omissions etc: which are evident to anyone knowing the district and also having seen the local records....therefore to avoid further confusion I humbly offer my observations in brackets. - N.E.B

"Richard Metcalfe and his wife, Gecily, lived on a farm called 'Eppy Head', in the Township of Daleside (Daletown), Yorkshire, England. He died there 6th June 1729, the father of ten children, all born at Eppy Head:-

James Metcalfe, senior, born 1706 at Eppy Head, Hawnby, Helingsby (Helmsley), Yorkshire, England, married Mary Pebus at Hawnby 24th Jan 1743. She died 16th Sep 1760 and was buried at Hawnby. He came to Nova Scotia about 1771 and settled on the Maccan River on property acquired from J.F.W. DeBarres. This farm later came into the possession of the Atkinson family, through his grand-daughter Elizabeth, who married Charles Atkinson, and is known as the Atkinson Farm, located next below Russell Harrison at Lower Maccan. James senior died 13th March 1787 age 81 and was buried on his farm. His children, four sons and three daughters, were all born at Eppy Head, Yorkshire, England.

William born 1746 - his connections not straightened out. He was supposed to have left a fortune of three million pounds. He is supposed to have assumed the name of "William Ledley Hudson". Hawnby to Nova Scotia ...continued.....

James Metcalfe junior was probably the only son to come with his father to Nova Scotia in 1771. William coming next and Richard last. Born 12th Apr 1745 at Hawnby, Yorkshire he was 26 when he came with his father in 1771. He married 1st June 1773 (following letter states that his bride arrived in 1774) at the Fort Church in Fort Cumberland to Ann Gill of Hawnby, Parish of Sutton in the Forest, Erdingwold. (Hawnby is a Parish of its own right, Erdingwold = Easingwold.) Ann Gill was baptised 1746 daughter of Anthony Gill by his first wife, Elizabeth Sutton. James junior died on the farm at Maccan, Ann Likewise. Both are buried there. In 1952 several stones by the line fence were found but mostly undecipherable.

Issue of James jr and his wife Ann :-

Elizabeth born 11th Feb 1778. Married Charles Atkinson. James junior's will, made 17th Oct 1817 and probated 7th Jan 1820, gives to his grandsons, James Metcalfe Atkinson and Amos Atkinson, sons of Charles Atkinson and Elizabeth Metcalfe, all his homestead farm, 520 acres, 80 of which is marsh, 'to be divided equally between my grandsons with all stock and utensils'. Ref Will Book A.P. 302.

Mary born 4th June 1783 died 29th Aug 1787.

Hannah born 10th Apr 1787 died 13th Apr 1787.

Ann born 27th May 1789 married William Sharp on 7th Jan 1813, Nova Scotia."

The letter which follows from James Metcalf (junior) to his intended wife (Ann Gill) throws a side light in the conditions of life in Cumberland (Nova Scotia) in 1772. The letter, though rude in form, exhibits a man of strong purpose and high character. It was two years reaching Ann Gill. She arrived at Fort Cumberland in 1774 and despatched a messenger to James who awakened him at 2 o'clock in the morning with the news. He started at once with a led horse for the Fort where he met her. They were married at Fort Lawrence that day. They left two daughters, one of whom married William Sharpe and the other Charles Atkinson. Amos (King) Seaman married a daughter of the latter.

"August, 1772.

My Dear, This comes to let you know that I am in good health as these lines I hope shall find you. We are meany Leagues part but Distance or lenth of time since we parted hath not made mee to forgit you, I have got 207 acers of land, 33 acers of clear land very good land a good part of it will bee easly cleared, because it hath been formerly cut by the French, I and other two have 45 acers more for 5 years, and orchard that grows plenty of appels we desire to plow ye 45 acers and to sow it with wheat and other grane it is a pleasant and will be a frutefull place with cultivation I need not say much of my place nor of the country by this letter for I have described it in the other letter to my master, only one thing I would tell you and that is a little flye caled a misketo that is troublesome in somer time and bites like a midge but I am told by the people that came to the place 8 or 9 years since, that there is becom much fewer of them, it is oweing to ye want of inhabitance and cattel to eat up the gras, this is the only thing I have to say against the Country and now I put you to your promis that you promisd mee

saying I will surely come to you and my Dear I shall be very glad to see you fulfill your promise to mee and I will fulfill mine to you if you will come I will be a kind Husband to you and will take you before aney other for I must marry for I cannot live well as I am, and as to your passage you need not bee affraide not to let your thoughts to trouble you to think how shall I undertake such a journey only try come and be not affraid I sopose that you will have plenty from Yorkshire to acompaney you O would I wear in the place of these lines and that I might be your companion but that must not be I have great besiness to do and cattle to look after so I cannot I can only pray to our God to protect and be your soport and guide when I was at sea I was sick but 2 half days half a day ye day that we imbarked and again sometime after when the sea was very Ruff and we all had a very good passage and were very helthfull.

The peopel here are of different persuasaions in religion they are mostly prisbyterians and Baptists ye church of England are fewer that either I believe that if one of our methodist preachers wear here he would be gladly received by people of all persusaions they are very strict in regard to ye Lords day and consious of family dutys but as to the mane thing in religion would it were more known among all people I trust that religeon in its purity will be preached here also people here are naturally kind to another even the Indians when a countryman comes to their wigwams are if they have aney meat at all they give him some. Spinning wheels are very dear here for they are twenty shilings a peece English money pay for more then in England Ye Guney pays for thre and twenty and fower pence but all ye money in ye place is not English, there is dollar that is 5s, the pisterence that goes for a shiling, every countrys money goes if peopel know its worth, all linen cloth and woolen cloth is very dear here but they almost all grow thir own linen and dres it themselves and the French and New England peopel, the women are mostly waevers and work their own both linen and wolen if you come pray be so good as to bring about a bushel of wheat if you can of 4 different kinds for seed let yellow Kent be one and Hampshire brown another for it will be of great servis here, be carefull to keep it from salt water, you may if you please lay it like a pillow in your bed or in aney place where ye salt water does not come. provide a little tea or something that is nourishing provided you should be sea sick, I should be glad to see my master Wilkison here but altho ye countrys good I would not advise him to come lest things should not do well so I might be blamed but if he should I think he might do well here, is nothing but the misketos that is trobelsome and they are bad to that they make a smoke at ye door sometimes in the evening to keep them out of their houses they are more troubelsom than you may imagin but as I said before it is for want of the Gras being mowed or eaten or burnt.

This is ye only thing that I have to say against the place all things I think will be made up when inhabitance comes and trade increases if you come be not discoriged by aney thing in ye country for it is good if you come you will sail up to Fort Cumberland and when you are there write a line or two to me and send it to me to Maccan River by aney man and I will pay him and come for you but as soon as you receive my letter let me know your mind by letter and I will be as good as my word, the passage is paid at Liverpool before you go on bord but if you should not be able to pay, make friends to some that come and I will pay, write to James Shanks at Liverpool about it.

 $\bar{\rm I}$  must conclude for this time may ye Lord bles you and conduct you safe hither from James Metcalf.

If you write to mee you must derect to me at Maccan near Fort Cumberland to ye care of Govener Franklin at Halifax Nova Scotia.

Directed to Mrs Ann Gill with Mr Thomas Wilkinson, Martin Lordship, near Ganongwould (Easingwold) in Yorkshire, England.
