## A VISIT TO NAPPA HALL

John R. Metcalfe, M.N. 325, of Norton, Stockton, Cleveland, writes "About fifteen years ago, on the occasion of a short stay with friends in Harrogate, my wife and I decided that we would arrange to visit Nappa Hall, the home of the Metcalfes, which is, of course, situated in beautiful Wensleydale.

We duly set off one day during that week, travelling from Harrogate via Ripon and Masham until we reached Wensley Church where we stopped the car, uncertain of whether to proceed left or right at the junction. A local resident proved helpful and we were on the way again, past Redmire and arriving at the large gates with stone pillars, the entrance to Nappa Hall.

We stopped the car and parked just a short distance along the roadway which swung left and descended steeply yo the Hall. As we approached the Hall, we encountered the beautiful chapel attached to Nappa Hall. As we came to the Hall, now seeming more like a farmhouse, the door in front of us was not, in fact, a door. Being a warm sunny day the opening was covered only by numerous hanging ribbons, akin to a curtain effect and bedecked with beads.

I indicated to my wife that there was nothing on which to knock to announce our presence. No bells to ring. We looked through the hanging ribbons and seated at a table in a large farmhouse kitchen to the left and adjacent to the room facing us, was a man oiling a cricket bat. I moved away from the doorway and whispered advice to my wife about the occupant of the room. "If that man is oiling a cricket bat, this is definitely the home of the Metcalfes" was her reply.

I must add that I was a league cricketer in Yorkshire in my younger days and still have a passionate following for my beloved sport. The significance of this happening may well be appreciated most by the readers of Mecca News who have a love of, or an understanding of, cricket.

Finally, we did manage to attract the attention of the occupants of that room in Nappa Hall and they welcomed us and were helpful with some details of the buildings. They explained that they were not Metcalfes themselves, however, but merely tenant farmers ".

Family records show that my great-great-grandfather JOHN MEDCALF and his wife Anne (Gardiner) had six children, all born in Co.Clare, Ireland between 1835 - 1846. Anne Gardiner, according to family recollection, was born in Hampshire, England. John Medcalf's date of birth is recorded in the family bible as 6th December 1811, along with the death date of his mother, Ann Medcalf, 19th March 1867 aged 84 years. No place of birth or death was recorded. The family thought John may have been born in England, but his death cert: of 1879 gives his birth-place as Ireland. The shipping list of 1864, showing his arrival in Australia, states that he was Irish. No county is recorded on either record. John's dau; and my great-grandmother, Anne Medcalf, gave her father's occupation on her mge cert: of 1876 as GARDENER. John's dau; Sarah Jane Medcalf, gave it as POLICEMAN, on her mge in 1859. Imagine my delight when a search of the Irish Police Records held at the GRO London located the following entry:-

Apparently this John was the eldest son of John Mte of Scarborough Yks who in turn was 3rd son of Thomas and his 2nd wife Ann (Green) Mte. Thomas eldest son of William & Anne (Marwood) Mte mge 21.05.1657 at Stokesley and who lived in York. William eldest son of George (Bro to Sir Gilbert Mte, mayor of York in 1695) and his wife Elizabeth Talbot. George eldest s of George of Thornborough Hall who was eldest s of Richard of Northallerton who built in 1584 the famous 'Porch House' - now another guest house. Richard was 3rd s of George of Hood Grange near Coxwold who was son of Oswald 2nd s of Thomas of Nappa Hall et al.

## THE DORNIX WEAVER

Having entitled the article in the last edition, 'The Dornix Weaver - The Sequel ', I should have known that this title was bound to ensure that I received a sequel to the sequel! So here it is! The possible ultimate experience. 'The Dornix Weaver - The Sequel II'. The way we are going it is highly likely that a host of Hollywood producers will be descending upon me at any moment, trying to secure the film rights. (Eat your heart out Theophilus Metcalfe!)

This latest addition to the tale comes from Vera Adams, M.N. 2, of Garforth, near Leeds.

Writing at the end of last year, Vera says " We returned from our American holiday last week after six unforgettable weeks.

We stayed part of the time with friends who stayed with us in 1984 when they were researching their ancestors in the Leeds area.

I discovered that one of them had Metcalfe connections and thought that it may be of some interest to someone in the Society.

I am enclosing a copy of the will for your perusal. Briefly, Michael Metcalfe, born 29 August 1620 married Mary Fairbanks. He was the third son of Michael and Sarah Metcalfe.

Michael and Sarah emigrated to America in 1637. His story is quite remarkable. He was a weaver in Norwich and had been persecuted by Bishop Wren because of his Puritan beliefs. In one incident his wife hid him under straw in the roof of the house so that the Bishop's men could not take him into custody.

He decided to flee to America with his wife and nine children. The ship left London in mid September and was tempest tossed until Chistmas when the Captain veered back to Plymouth harbour.

He was so determined to start a new life he took his family to Yarmouth and they shipped out again on the ship, ' The Rose '. The ocean voyage lasted from mid April to mid summer. They docked at Boston Harbour.

He was one of the original settlers at Dedham, Mass. and was elected Selectman in 1641. (Selectman is a Town Clerk or Councillor.) He signed the Covenant in 1637. In a town vote on the 1st January 1638 he and three others were chosen to contrive the fabric of a meeting house ..... and to order men to work upon the same. The meeting house was built to serve as a church and for town meetings.

The above is taken from the family history written by Alice Fisher Michels who we stayed with.

Michael's son and grandson were also called Michael. The third Michael married Elizabeth Kingsbury on the 17th September 1672, a member of another early Dedham family. Their son, Nathaniel, married Mary Gay on the 17th February 1712 and had a daughter, Lydia, who married Timothy Fisher on the 21st April 1757. They had five children and Timothy Fisher was an ancestor of the above Alice Fisher Michels whom we stayed with. "

Writing of Michael's voyage, Vera says "We did the same journey in five hours. When I think of the jorney that they must have had in 1637, at sea for three months

with nine children, I'm glad that I wasn't born then ! " The copy of the will of Michael and Sarah's son, Michael, who married Mary Fairbanks, the daughter of John Fairbanks senior, is reproduced below: ' Michael Metcalfe senior, of Dedham, being aged, Doe make this my Last will. Wheras, there is a Couenant Between my selfe and Mary my Wife, made before our marriage, bearing Date the 13th of August 1645, wherein it may appear that she reserved to her selfe, and to her dispose, her Lands and Estate, so that I received no Estate with her; yet neuertheless, I give unto her ffor the terme of her widowhood, in household stuffe, and other goods, as shee thinkes meete to Chuse, for her use, not exceeding the ualue of sixteene pounds, and being not such as I shall particularly otherwise Dispose of, in this my Last will; which household stuffe, so Chosen by her, shall Bee to ffurnishe the Roome, which my Executor shall prepare for her, at his house, to Receive her into, after my Decease. All which household stuffe and goods, I give to my Executor, to have, after the Decease of my wife. Unto my wife, six pounds, to be paid to her, within one moneth after my Decease, in Currant pay. Unto Sonne John Metcalfe, of Medfeild, one ffeather bed & Bolster, my second Book of Martyrs, Mr Perkins second Book, Luther on the gala; one siluer spoone, one pair of sheets, one Long Chest, in the upper Chamber, one Diaper Boardcloth. Unto my Executor & his Heires, all that my Land in Naponset plaine, and three Acres Laying in ye Low plaine, next Peter Woodwards. Also, half my Diuident in ye Cedar swampe, neer the Saw mill, & 3 Commons & ye odde. Unto my Grandchild, Michael Metalfe, the Elder, all that my Land and Improvements within the Lott I Dwell in, my three acres in ye wigwaom plaine, my swompe next my house, prouided he give my Executor that Litle parcell of his swampe west end of his house, otherwise my gifte to be uoyd. Also I give him my Naticke Diuidend of twenty three acres, more or Lesse; four Cow Commons; halfe my Cedar swampe, at the Saw mill; my wood Land, at the West end of the Towne; all the particulars I have belonging to husbandry, in one Kind or another; all the Remainer of my Household stuffe not Disposed of in this my Will. Also my first Book of Martyrs, Mr Perkins ffirst Booke, one siluer spoone. To my Daughter, Wilson ffortye shillings. To my Daughter Elizabeth Bancrafte, ffiue pounds. To my Daughter, Martha Stowe, twenty shillings. To my Daughter Joane Waker, forty shillings. To my Daughter Rebecca Mackentosh, ffiue pounds. To my wife's Daughter, Martha Bullerd, twenty shillings. To my Daughter, Sarah Onion, three pounds. All which six Legacyes, Last named, shall bee paid at, in, or Before, the second March next after my Decease, in Current payment.

To my Daughter Stowes Eldest sonne, which she had by her first husband, Wm Brignall, ffour pounds, to bee paid him, when he shall attayne to Lawful age. To my grandchild abovesaid, Jno. Mackintosh & Robert Onyon, all my wearing apparell, to bee equally divided by my Exect, in order as their names bee heer set Downe; my Grandchild to choose ffirst: - To my Granchild, abouesaid, all the Lumber in my House. Moreover, if any of ye p sons that are Legatees in ye my present will, shall by themselves, or by any others, make, or Cause to bee made, any Disturbance, or Contortion, in word or Deed, in Reference to any thing given in this my will; then, all that Legacye, to

that p son, shall be utterly uoyde. Thomas Metcalfe, of Dedham, my sonne, to be my executor, to whom I give all the Rest of my Lands and Goods, not formerly Disposed of.

Michael Metcalfe.

Before the winessing hereof, I give to my Grandchild abovesaid, my single acre of Meddow, also my Largest gray Horsmans Coate, also two oxen, one Cow, to be Delivered to him at Lawfull age. All the Books, aforesaid, given to my sonne John, after his Death, I give them to his sonne Michael, my Grand childe.

#### NAPOLEONIC CONNECTIONS ?

Mr. C.S. Metcalfe, M.N. 305, of Hayling Island, Hants, has come across an intriguing press cutting, although the paper it comes from or the date of publication are not, unfortunately, known.

The cutting is a letter to the Editor from one A. Pringle of 7 Cain Terrace, Wheatley Hill and concerns the fact that the writer, having read an article in the same paper about Nappa Hall, is interested in whether another Metcalfe mentioned in a book he

has read is related to the Metcalfes of Nappa Hall. Apparently the article in the book which he had read mentioned that a James Metcalfe, a carpenter, born at Coverdale, had made Napoleon's coffin, after his death on St. Helena in 1821. Can any of our readers throw any light on this interesting possibility?

### " METCALF FAMILIES THROUGHOUT THE WORLD "

A number of members, including Sandra Metcalf, M.N. 134, of Tring, Hertfordshire, have written regarding this publication, sold by direct mail by Halbert's Inc. The letters, which are personally addressed, tell how "Finally after years of effort and considerable expense, we are ready to publish a new book entitled "Metcalf families around the world "and you are listed in it!" The letter, which is signed by one John E. Metcalf, claims that the book covers specific topics such as:

- How the old and distinguished Metcalf family got its name.
- Why the early emigrants left their birthplace and the fascinating story of their journey to new lands.
- Newly developed statistical information about the Metcalf population in Great Britain, Canada, Northern Ireland, America and Australia and where Metcalfs live in these countries today.
- A unique heraldic blazon granted to an early Metcalf.
- How you can use the Metcalf 1988 International Registry to aid you in tracing your family tree etc.

This book first came to my attention through a B.B.C. Television Consumer Programme which was not, it appears, impressed by the book. It is apparently a compilation in the main of current telephone directories and electoral rolls with only a few very general parts concerning family history at all. Similar letters have gone to most other popular surnames you can think of regarding their family and the signatory of the letter seems confused as to his own identity, being able to change from John E. Metcalf to John E. Smith, Jones, Brown etc., at will.

According to Sandra, the publishers have already been prosecuted in Australia and further prosecutions are pending in other countries. You have been warned!

# METCALFES AT THE MARITIME MUSEUM

John Balderston, M.N. 62, of Silchester, near Reading, Berkshire, writes "recently I spent half a day looking up Balderstons who had crossed the Atlantic, either voluntarily or involuntarily, to seek a new life.

During my research in the Maritime Museum at Greenwich, I also noticed the following list of Metcalfes who had gone to Maryland - and, in addition, Peter Goldham's book on 'Bonded Passengers to America', but unfortunately this lists no destinations, so that some of these passengers could have been sent to the West Indies. Chancery

Lane ( P.R.O. ) holds the Assize records, Bills of Indictment Series of deposition, etc. - which could make an interesting study.

Equally interesting ( I find ) is to enquire of the landing circuits in the Hall of Records at Annapolis.

On the topic of overseas Metcalfes, I did look at the Dominica papers in Kew P.R.O., following Shirley Withers 'Caribbean Connection 'in 'Mecca News'  $2^{4}$ .

Deposited at Kew are some 130 original hand written volumes of the day to day affairs of the island - looking at one book for the year 1787, when George Metcalfe was 30 years old, I found that he was a member of the Lower House in the Government and that he was applying for leave of absence to visit Europe on business. No mention of brother Robert - and I had no further time to search."

John then gives the following details of Metcalf(e)s, he came across during his research at the Greenwich Maritime Museum.

Quite often a person " transported " is also described as a servant, which means that the individual had contracted to repay the cost of their transportation by agreeing to act as his servant for a period of years.

<sup>(</sup>a) "Transported means that someone other than the person indexed paid for their passage.

Under certain Conditions of Plantation, a servant was entitled to claim 50 acres upon completing his period of servitude.

(b) "Immigrated" means that the individual furnished his own transportation to Maryland.

John also gives the following details from Peter Wilson Coldham's volumes covering the history of transportation 1615 - 1775, with specific listings of convicts who passed through London ( Volume III ), the Home Counties ( Volume IV ) and the Northern Circuits, including Yorkshire ( Volume VIII ).

The Gatehouses of London acted as prisons and 17,000 convicts passed through the London Gatehouse of Newgate, including:

Metcalfe James S.W. and T. December 1771 on the ship ' Justitia '. Medcalf 1774 to be T. 14 years. Joseph R. July Metcalfe Michael S. July 1773. Metcalfe Feb - April T. May 1775 on the 'Rose'. Thomas ( alias Smith ) Metcalfe Thomas S. January T. January 1769 on the ship 'Thornton'. Metcalfe William S. Q. Sept. T. December 1771 on the ship ' Justitia '. Metkirk William S.Q. December 1761. Contract for him to be made with Lt. Col. George Ogilvie of 3rd Regiment of Foot Guards re his T.

S = Sentenced T = Transported W = Westminster Sessions Q = Middlesex Sessions

John adds "From the Northern Circuits (including Yorkshire) reference is made to

John Metcalfe S. Lent 1735 but as the Northern Counties contracted independently for
the transportation of their own felons no reference is made to John Metcalfe's

transportation in Mr. Coldham's book. "


