Gina wonders if any researchers have come across the name LINDAY or LINDOW, as they disappear around 1840.

James M Metcalfe, MN 20, Badcock House, Old Boars Hill, Oxford. OX1 5JQ. writes to give news re Hertlington - arms - a Stag. (See pages 6 & 7 in Mecca News Dec 1989).

"Fulk de Panell had vast territories in England and among them the rich manors of Hert and Hert-le-pol, Durham. His dau Agnes de Panell intermarried with Robert de Brus and the estates passed into the hands of the de Brus family. They had two sons and a daughter, :-

Adam, progenitor of the Bruces in Skelton. Robert (3) ancestor of the Bruces in Annandale and Lord of Hert and Hert-le-pol. Agnes married Ranulf, son of Ribald, Lord of Middleham, Co Ebor, receiving as her dowry the Manor of Aibewic in Herte'pol. Robert retained his Lordship of Hert and Hert-le-pol, (my opinion is that Ranulf took the title 'of Hertlington'). Proving who possessed Manors in Durham is difficult because Durham was not included in the Domesday Book. York forms part of the record, although large parts of Yorkshire suffered from the same misfortune. (v Bawdons Domesday of Yorkshire).

Their son Christopher married 1846 Stalling Busk to, firstly Jane Metcalfe* of Countersett and 2nd Esther Alderson, widow nee TIPLADY.

*Jane Metcalfe bpt Nov 1823 dau of John & Margaret (Moore) Metcalfe, mge Nov 1815. John a mason & joiner born Oct 1793 son of William & Ann (Tomlin) Metcalfe. William bpt May 1759 son of John Metcalfe of Marsett.

Along these lines they also connect into the families of MNs 296 & 297 Mrs C.E. Sykes and Mrs Shian Waugh and to MN 54 Roger Clough.....and.....

if we go back to the mge of Margaret Metcalfe b 1850 (dau of Christopher & Jane) mge 20 Mar 1873 at Stalling Busk to John Outhwaite....this John was the son of John and Agnes (Metcalfe) Outhwaite mge 2 Jan 1844 and see MN406 Miss Edna Outhet.

COMPUTER UPDATE

Visible signs of progress were the address labels on the previous and this copy of your Mecca News, produced from a list held, updated and printed by a computer. It took four or five minutes to perform a previously tedious task and lighten the distribution load of Jean and Frank Bradley.

Entry of the name index is going ahead quite swiftly, though at the time of writing - January - the daunting task of entering 'J' is being taken on by President Helen Offer, some 4,000 entries!!

I'm writing this in January as for the next two months my wife and I are off to Fiji and New Zealand - anything to avoid the keyboard and 'J'.

'A' to 'I' have been entered already as you might gather from the above, some 8,000 entries and over two million characters of computer data. The thought of losing all the work done so far keeps me from sleeping. However we have taken some precautions, the data is currently held on both the Mecca machine and on mine, and on two different sets of floppy disk — another kind of storage — so that we have four computer copies of the index as well as the current 4x3 file cards.

It has taken many, many hours of work at the keyboard to get this data into a useable format. If anyone has access to an IBM compatible machine and is prepared to lend a hand in data input — say four or five hours a week — could they please get in touch with me at the address on the back page.

Some interesting ways of using the new index are already being found, for instance a search of entries for a particular maiden name or place name would be extremely tedious, if not impractical, with the card index by hand, but is a matter of ease on our computer data base.

In the above entry for instance, it is possible to search for any of the highlighted items either separately or in combination. However, if the search is to be thorough for all dyers for instance, it is necessary to look for that item in all possible fields (Parents: Married: Data:) one by one. A little time consuming but much, much better than by hand. Doing a search in one field through a thousand entries takes just under 19 seconds by computer! I just wish we had finished 'Z'!

Whilst on the subject of Dec.s Newsletter I should also like to put on record my regret, that an otherwise intelligent and friendly editor, David Urwin, should resort to cheap jibes at others expense. We are not all perfect in spelling and grammar and I would have thought it better if he had exercised his rights as editor, corrected the errors, and like a true Yorkshireman, "sed nowt".

To one of those I have been able to give extensive information regarding baptismal dates and places. To another I had already given information through his enquiries.

May I ask members, on behalf of Mrs. Wadsworth and myself, to make their copies of Family Trees as neat and as legible as possible, using a ruler for lines? Some trees have been sent on rather scrappy paper and have been very difficult to disentangle, especially where several different family names are involved. Also could they give the fullest information that they have — all dates, places (with county in the first instance) and occupation when known. These will help the Indexer to perhaps identify that person — say a John in four drawers of Johns.

When the Indexer incorporates the cards from Mrs Wadsworth, a link with a person already entered, with additional information may be found. Would members sending in trees enclose an S.A.E. or International Reply coupon, so that the Indexer can send this information to the compiler of the tree.

"The Making of the English Middle Class - Business, Society and Family Life in London 1660-1730" by Peter Earle, published by Methuen, 1989.

Dear Editor,

In response to repeated editorial requests over the years for "feedback" - if members don't supply it how can you guess what they think? So here goes!

I greatly enjoy receiving Mecca News, and thank you for all the hard work you put in to producing it. That's the more important half of what I want to say, even if it's soon said. The lesser half - criticisms/suggestions/enquiries - are meant to be constructive, and I hope you will accept them as such.

Mecca News is probably the way the majority of members want it, and I fully realise that as an academic medievalist, who laps up rigorous research, I ought not to expect my minority interests to be catered for, but Mecca News could do with being stiffened up with more serious articles on the earlier centuries of Metcalf history. Each member's ancestors are obviously of lively interest to him, but only of very incidental interest to others unless they happen to impinge on their own lines of enquiry. Yet there should be topics of common or shared interest, in Metcalf family history. As I see it, that means looking for generalizations or patterns in the occurrence of members of the family, and it means attempting to set those patterns into their context of social history. There is always, as I see it, going to be a premium of interest in the earlier centuries and the core areas of Wensleydale and adjoining dales, and Yorkshire generally - because that's where our family, and our shared interests, mostly converge.

In issue no.29 Terry Allinson was surely on the right lines in wanting details from the wills of Miles Metcalfe and his wife to be rigorously correct and exact. It's a pity, nevertheless, to deliver one's hay unbaled. Before coming out with detailed criticisms, its obviously desirable to double-check the original

and, in an ideal world, the appropriate editorial input would have been to persuade a competent paleographer to have a careful look at the original document, and then get an authoritative statement onto the record in Mecca News. But Terry is definitely pointing his nose in the right direction.

I groaned a bit on p.14 about Middleton Calf Top, which I take to be the unacceptable face of amateurism, and O.K., it was just being quoted in a nice letter from a member, but has the Society debated (in Mecca News) and reached its view on T.Metcalfe's book "Medecalf" 1930? - I feel hampered by only having joined the Society with issue no.24 and not knowing what was in the back numbers. So perhaps I'm talking out of turn. But I suspect that a serious name-person today would not be amused at that derivation of the name. Has any earlier issue of MN carried a critical discussion of T.Metcalfe's ideas, p.66, where he says that "William, second son of John Mte of Tanton, led a considerable number of related Metcalfes back to first Leyburn and West Witton, then to the Hawes district of Bainbrigg - The large number of related Metcalfes with their horses, cattle, and sheep found room at Hawes but became overcrowded [a generation or so later]. A further move was then made to the

Ingleton Fells, led by William, a younger son of William son of John. He bought an estate called Philpin in 1716, then Weathercote, 1721, Southerscales 1726 etc.... The various Metcalfes enclosed many lands which prior to the reign of Henry VIII had been the property of the monks of Furness Abbey." It doesn't sound very plausible but one would like to get to the bottom of it.

Approaching this same early history from another angle, I thought it might be a way forward to use our Society's volume of Wills (1.Yorkshire) as a database to map the changing distribution of Metcalfs by 25 year periods, e.g.1550-75, 1575-1600, and so on, to see if one could focus in on early centres of dispersion of the surname. I quickly ran into the difficulty of not finding all the place-names on a map. So a small, self-contained piece of research, using place-name studies, might be to construct an accurate map of early Metcalfs in Wensleydale.

[The writer goes on to offer to undertake such a piece of research during this year and to ask one or two questions concerning the printing of Mecca News].

So, drawing to an end, I would like to put the case that amassing facts is essential, but kicking ideas around is much more fun, - and it's a mistake to delay the ideas part of the exercise until all the facts are in, because that's a way of saying never-never.


