

Computer Notes

CSM

Summer holidays (holidays in retirement??) have been and gone since the April issue and many more Metcalfe's are written to hard disc, hopefully to be of interest and use in the future.

A few were found to be of interest during the Society of Genealogists' Fair on 16th May; a queue round the building, in which people waited for 2 hours, ensured that there was hardly enough room to move inside! Nevertheless it was a good day for our society with plenty of queries and interest shown; plus being an enjoyable one for those present.

I have recently been contacted by, and have met with, a member of the 'Farthing' single name society who is now setting up a data base with a very similar construction to our own-anyone out there with a Farthing in their past (Funny remarks may be printed.). It's strange that so far we have found entries relating to other societies and have passed some on, but none have come the other way to add to our data base.

As you should know we have on computer a copy of IGI'88 which was provided some time ago by M266 Susan Metcalfe Harper. IGI'92 has now been available for some time and I have just received a letter from a Mr. Bert J Rawlins, who is the British Correspondent of the

Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, to tell me that he looks forward to seeing me in Salt Lake City in September. While there I hope of course to replace Susan's data with an updated version - just what the changes are I'm not certain, but hopefully Christopher 1712 is in there somewhere.

I'm currently in the process of making several changes to my computer - for the information of those that are interested in PC's. It's still a PS2 56SLC but now has 16M of memory with the hope of seeing the full benefits of this when I install O/S 2 2.1 in the near future. The Desk Top Publisher used for this and other articles in the News is Aldus PageMaker 4 and again change is imminent as version 5 is on order.

The benefits of PageMaker are too widespread to cover here but one benefit is to allow others to produce articles using their own word processor and then to pass them through a PageMaker filter to prepare standard presentations for the News in either single or double column form, just pour them into a preset format. Sounds so simple but I've found that the chances of making errors increase exponentially with complexity - that means it's easier with a card index and pencil and paper.

No, those days have gone although I still have 20,000 cards in my attic over which past President Helen Offer spent many hours - what will be the media of the future to replace PC's?

Saturday: Full breakfast Packed lunch (optional)

Day in and around Hawes, commencing with a visit to the Dales Folk Museum which is excellent and very realistically portrays the past life style of dales folk; e.g. hill farmers, lead miners, quarry workers, cheese makers, etc. The museum is opening a new Local Studies Room in November and it is envisaged that members may well want to spend a few hours in this, making use of the facilities.

This project is being partially funded and set up by the North Yorkshire Library Service and they hope to have film and fiche raders to make micro films of local census returns and parish registers, possibly the IGI too, available to visitors. Perhaps of even more interest, is the fact that the room will be home to the McFie Collection, which is a very large library of local and natural history books. They were collected by Mr McFie, a well known inhabitant of the Hawes area, back in the 1920-30's. Also it will house the Kit Calvert Collection of books and manuscripts. Kit was a 'legend in his own lifetime', having saved Wensleydale cheesemaking back in the 1930's when there was a dire depression in the dairying industry. He was a native of the locality and durin his long life span, was an avid collector of local history books and papers. As the Local Studies Room will not be large, if all the party want to spend time in it, we will probably have to devise a rota whereby 3 or 4 of us use it together and the rest go off and do their own thing until it is time for their turn to browse through the collections.

Hawes is very much a tourist 'hot spot' with a number of antique, gift and book shops. The recently re-launched Hawes Dairy may have it's proposed public viewing gallery open by next April, where visitors will be able to watch Wensleydale cheese being made and purchase it, plus other items, from the Dairy's Visitor's Shop. Close by Hawes are many Mecca strongholds, e.g. Appersett, Burtersett, Hardraw, Askrigg and Bainbridge to name a few. Only a couple of miles from Hawes is the famous Hardraw Scar waterfall.

At the end of the day, dinner will be back at Countersett Hall, hopefully followed by an illustrated talk on the history of the dale.

Sunday: After a large breakfast there could well be two options, one to attend morning service at Askrigg Church and have a wander round Askrigg, much portrayed in the Vet films OR to go on a guided walk 'In the Footsteps of Mrs Robinson'. This would be approximately a four mile hike from Raydale House, from which Mrs Robinson escaped to raise the alarm that the Metcalfes had laid seige to her home and family. The party will then

get together for a pre-booked Sunday lunch in the Aysgarth area, after which it will be possible to visit Aysgarth Church, the famous museum of horse drawn vehicles, close by Aysgarth Falls and it may also be possible to squeeze in a quick visit to Bolton Castle, once a place of captivity for Mary, Queen of Scots.

Tea-time Sunday, 17th April the party will disperse to travel home in their various directions, hopefully after a very interesting and comfortable week-end.

All Members please Note:

It was originally hoped that we could pay a visit to Nappa Hall, but this will not be possible. Nappa is a private house and is also very much a working farm - busiest in the Spring of the year when lambing time is in full swing. It may be prudent to point out to members, at this stage, that the present occupiers do get a lot of people of Metcalfe descent calling on them unexpectedly, often when they are extremely busy. Therefor, please be very tactful and considerate, if you do ever go there. If possible, be content to take a photograph of Nappa from the roadside without troubling the family concerned.

Lincolnshire Metcalfes

Mrs P.A.Cook submits the following collection of references to Metcalfes in the Kirton Lindsey Quarter Sessions, Lincoinshire.

Luke Metcalfe - Assault, committed 17 June sentenced 30 June 1842. Magistrate Sir John Nelthorpe. 2 cal months hard labour.

Elizabeth Metcalfe 8 yrs. Committed Jan 4. Stealing at Kirton a watch, a steel chain, a steel key, property of John Dixon. Magistrate H E Smith. Sentence 1 cal month. Court held 8 Jan 1847.

Robert Metcalf 21 vrs committed Nov 6 stealing at Gainsborough 5 pairs of shoes, property of George Richardson and stealing at Gainsborough twenty keys and three stones weight of brass, the property of John Turner. Further charged with stealing at Gainsborough 1 cwt of cheese, 3 bushels 7 lbs of sugar, 1 lb Spanish juice and various other art-icles, the property of Edward Burwell, Also at Gainsborough 30 spoons the property of Charles Grant Kelvey. Magistrate W Hutton esq. Charged along with Henry Pearson 21yrs. Samuel Perkins, 21 yrs, Harriet Dawson,19 yrs, Emma Metcalfe, 21 yrs. Metcaife and Pearson were sentenced to 7 years transportation. Emma Metcalfe was

sentenced to 6 calendar months hard labour by the judge of assize.

From the History of Nineteenth Century Brigg by Frank Henthorn:-

page 3 "Metcalfe and Cole, tenants of Elwes, were contemplating putting up new buildings in 1759. Elwes encouraged them. Metcalfe has agreed to rebuild his house at a cost of £300 so it must be a fairly big one"

page 7 "Holgate made an agreement to allow Metcalfe to have land adjoining the Poor House (its orchard) for a building, thus cutting off the poor house inmates from the river. The Brigg Jury had strongly opposed this action and Elwes therefore intervened, suggesting that Metcalfe should be persuaded to build elsewhere.

page 26 Anne Metcalfe was concerned in an agreement with Mrs Cliffe to convey manor at Twigmoor. Robert Cliffe had conveyed this in 1777.

page 26 Dr Metcalfe lived in Wrawby Street in 1812, his house had a rental value of £11. He alone received the prefix "Dr" in the Church Bill, but there was a Dr Beatty who was one of the stewards in the Brigg Bill in 1819.

From M587 Jack Davies

(Jack is particularly interested in the early 1700's in the area around Leeds and Halifax in the West Riding of Yorkshire and sends us some interesting snippets from the oldest newspaper in Yorkshire, namely the Leeds Mercury. Of particular interest to me is that one Metcalfe is actually referred to, in the newspaper article, as "Meccah". Ed.)

26.12.1775 Notice to creditors of Susannah Wilby, of Birstall, Widow.

To be sold at auction in several lots.....sundry messuages, with the lands and grounds therewith occupied, situate in Hunslet in the occupation of Mr Urbane Metcalf and Mr Joseph Middleton and their respective undertenants.

30.11.1773 To be peremptorily sold to the highest bidder....Lot 111 - Two freehold crofts adjoining the River Aire and Turnpike Road at Hunslet, with the dwelling houses and other buildings, orchards and gardens, occupied by William Metcalfe and undertenants. To be put up at 500 pounds

15.8.1769 Yesterday afternoon one John Smith, about 18 years of age, apprentice to Mr Caleb Meccah, of Hunslet, was

unfortunately drowned as he was bathing in the river at that place.

(Note from Jack Davies)

This Caleb Metcalfe was a clothier who left a will in 1772 leaving 400 pounds to executors Urbane Metcalf of Hunslet, clothier, and John Rothery, of the same, clothier, and John Penney of Leeds. ironmonger. Caleb Metcalf's father also a clothier of Hunslet called Caleb left a will in 1760 in which everything went to his widow Hannah (Horsman)Mt. The will's inventory is very detailed with fifty items listed both in his dwelling, wool chamber and workshop. Though Caleb and Hannah were married in Leeds in 1716 there were banns read at Grinton also, giving a possible clue to Caleb's origins. The Urbane Metcalf seems to be the one who married Anne Nettleton in Leeds 1734 and was baptised in Hunslet in 1704, his father being a John Mt. I believe this to be the only Urbane Mt anywhere! My own ancestor Joseph Mt who left Halifax to work in the cotton mills of Kendal, Preston and Walton-le-Dale (and whose parents were David and Ann (Rothery) Mt were married in Halifax 19.9.1748. David was a collier, possibly from Swaledale stock. Can anyone add any information?

Odds and Ends

Over the years I have received all sorts of odd bits of information about our clan. I have not always had space to include them in the Mecca News. Here are just a few which didn't make it until now.

Did you know, for example, that Jeff Metcalfe of Liverpool, was receiving his second driving lesson soon after his 17th birthday when his instructor had a severe heart attack. Jeff drove him along one of Liverpool's busiest roads, through the lunch hour traffic to the Royal Liverpool University Hospital. By doing so he undoubtedly saved the life of his instructor. The newspaper article does not state whether Jeff has now passed his test or not!

Staying with the subject of motoring, Wilf Medcalf can still be seen driving his 1937 Standard Flying 9 bought new just before his wedding to provide transport for the honeymoon. He paid £167 10s. for the car and reckons that it's now worth £1,500 (although he has no plans to sell it). It still does 35 miles to the gallon despite having over 200,000 on the clock!

Changing tack, I remember an article some years ago explaining the connection between our family and Stan Laurel of Laurel and

Hardy fame. Stan's mother, who came from Dewsbury was, if I remeber rightly, a Metcalfe...or was it his grandmother. I shall have to dig out my back numbers. However, did you know that Shirley Bassey is also connected with our clan. I have been sent a newspaper cutting showing a copy of her birth certificate giving details of her birth in Cardiff on 8.1.1937 to Henry and Eliza Jane (formerly Metcalfe) Bassey. Surely we have some members somewhere who can elaborate on this titbit of information.

For those of you (like myself) with a Bedale connection, Denny Gibson came across an interesting funeral card, details of which she is willing to pass on to anyone interested. It concerns <u>Jane Metcalte</u> of Low Salutation, Bedale born 15.4.1819 died 17.3.1905.

Although Jane lived until she was almost 86 she comes nowhere near the record set by Helen Robertson (Metcalf) of Upton, Mass., USA. She jus failed to make it to 105! The town of Upton celebrated her 100th birthday by proclaiming Dec 31st (her birthday) Helen Robertson Day. Among her interests were breeding racing pigeons and family history. She had traced her ancestors back to the Mayflower settlers!

MINUTES OF THE A.G.M. HELD 10TH OCTOBER, 1992.

- 1) Opening: The Chairman welcomed everyone and asked that we especially remember John Balderstone & Sid Pope who had died recently.
- 2) Apologies: Diane Howarth, Helen Offer, Eunice Herring, Joan & Bill Metcalfe, Valerie Metcalfe, Gina MacKenzie, Elizabeth Asser, Sheila Barley, Joyce Wilkinson, Richard & Edith Metcalfe & Sara Illingworth.
- 3) Minutes: Copies of the Minutes of AGM 1991 had been circulated and it was proposed by Gordon Metcalfe, seconded by Dorothy Pope, that they be accepted as a correct record-passed unanimously.
- 4) Matters Arising: The secretary reported that the Society is now a full member of the Federation of Family History Societies.

5) Reports:

- a. Chairman Charles passed on the good wishes of ex-president Helen Offer and of Frank & Jean Bradley who has also pointed out that it is now more than ten years since our secretary took her post, which was applauded by all present. Charles continued by observing that the past year had been a successful one with membership holding and facilities for members much improved. Gratitude was expressed to the committee and several other members for their help and hard work but these members cannot be expected to soldier on forever and new volunteers are desperately needed, particularly for the post of Editor, which is to be vacant in a year's time.
- b. Secretary Nina began by giving a brief resume of the day's schedule and went on to point out that we have gained 51 new members this year; making a 'paid up' membership of 362, of whom 72 live overseas. However, 48 members had not renewed their subscription in 1992. A total of 455 letters had been dealt with since 1st January 1992. A very worthwhile weekend was spent at the F.F.H.S. Conference at Hull and the secretary hoped Members had read her report in the Mecca News. Thanks were expressed to all who had helped in the running of the Society over the past year, particularly to the chairman for his constant support and assistance. A desperate plea was made for a voluntary Vice Secretary whose role would not necessarily be to help actively but to familiarise themselves with the way in which the secretary dealt with the administration of the society, in order to bridge any possible gap should the need ever arise when the secretary was unable to attend to her usual duties.
- c. Treasurer Margaret gave a full report of various items of income & expenditure, between 6th April and 9th October 1992, concluding with the fact that our funds remain adequate with £1,593.30p being on deposit plus a very small amount of overseas currency in hand. There were no queries from the floor on any aspect of the Society's accounts.
- d. Editor Stuart reported that it is now 3 years since he took office and he has enjoyed the work of producing the newsletter but feels that editors should move on and

make way for others to implement new ideas. He is happy to continue for the coming year, which should provide adequate time to find a new volunteer for the post. In the meantime, he wishes to thank all who had submitted material for the Mecca News and hoped to encourage members to continue with their offerings.

- e. Computer Index Charles expressed grateful thanks to all data entry helpers. A handful of members were approached who were found to have compatible computers in the survey carried out on the membership renewal forms. The response was good and now members, Mike Richardson, Valerie Hepworth, Andy Kerridge, Bob Metcalfe in UK; Barbara Stephenson in Australia and Doug Metcalfe in South Africa are already helping to clear the backlog and to supplement the efforts of Helen Offer and David Metcalfe, the latter having entered a huge amount of data and collected even more during his work on the Monumental Inscriptions in North Yorkshire. Today we have about twice as many Lists entered as were originally on the old Index cards but there are still approximately 500 Lists to enter. We also have in the region of 200 Family Trees to enter. In all this gives us a database of 30,000 records or almost ten million characters.
- f. Deeds of Covenant Valerie Metcalfe sent in a written report. Deposit Covenants, which were the subject of a query in 1991, are those when Covenant subscriptions are paid in one sum but which cover several years. To date 49 members have taken advantage of our covenant scheme. Last year %54 was reclaimed from the Inspector of Taxes, from the 30 Deeds signed by that time. Deeds of Covenant formerly were valid for 4 years after which they had to be renewed. The four year rule has now been forsaken and covenants can last indefinitely, though they can be terminated at any time by written notice to the Covenant Secretary. Deed of Covenant forms are always available at the Muster, or from the Secretary at any time.

6) Project Reports:

- a) St Catherine's House Index Recording: Sara Illingworth sent in a short written report in which she said that the indexing has progressed only slowly, due to checking discrepancies, but did not state which years had been completed. She promised a full report by the end of October. The Secretary reported that she did know that Sep 1837 to June 1840 is completed and that Pam Widddowson of Northallerton had finished 1870 to 1881. The Committee is to re-evaluate the situation on receipt of the full report. Further volunteers were requested to sign up.
- 7) Publications: Diane Howarth who has done sterling work on Publications was unable to be with us today. Thanks to her efforts with printing and thanks to recording by Frank & Jean Bradley, Joan Metcalfe, Peter Dobson and Charles S. Metcalfe and again thanks to Mary Metcalfe for artwork on the title page; WILLS BOOK 4 is available on the Sales Table today. It covers all the Metcalfe wills in the National Index from 1858 to 1899. Diane intends that Wills Book 5 which continues from 1900 will be ready by October 1993. The INDEX TO LISTS is in the process of being up-dated and will be printed next Spring in a slightly different format. The BIRTH BRIEF BOOKLET is also undergoing up-dating and hopefully should be ready in Spring 1993. Members whose entries require fresh information adding should ensure that this is passed to the Secretary before 1st March 1993. Any items for inclusion in the December issue of the Mecca News must be with the Editor by mid November.

8) Election of Officers and Committee Members :

President - JOHN HOLDEN - not for re-election; 3 year term, first year completed. Chairman - Charles S. Metcalfe - proposed Nina Benson, seconded Ron Metcalfe Secretary - Nina E. Benson-proposed Charles Metcalfe, seconded Gordon Metcalfe Treasurer - Margaret Metcalfe - proposed Gordon Metcalfe, seconded Nina Benson Editor - Stuart Metcalfe - proposed Charles Metcalfe, seconded Carol Arkwright - all passed.

- 9) Subscriptions 1993: As our finances are reasonably healthy, the committee recommended that no change be made in the rates for 1993. No other proposal was received from the floor. That the current rates remain was proposed by Charles Metcalfe & seconded by Carol Arkwright and approved unanimously.
- 10) Approval of Accounts: A set of 1992 accounts had been circulated to all members and the Treasurer's Report accepted without query. At this point, the Chairman pointed out that depreciation of the Society's assets, e.g computer and equipment etc is now written off over a five year period. It was proposed by Denny Gibson & seconded by John Holden, that the accounts should be approved as correct, and this was approved unanimously.
- 11) Nomination of Auditor: The matter having been discussed by the committee it was suggested that this was the right time to change our Auditor. Mrs Nina Benson proposed that the Society should accept the offer of services from Mrs Jo Gould (10 Albert Road, Hale, Cheshire, WA15 9AN), to act as auditor. This was seconded by Denny Gibson and approved unanimously.
- 12) Any Other Business: The Society of Genealogists is organising a Family History Fair to be held in the Royal Horticultural Society Old Hall, Westminster, London, on Sunday 16th May 1993. Societies nationwide have been invited to take a stand at this event. The matter had been discussed by the Committee who felt that The Metcalfe Society should be represented. The Chairman had been told that the Alderson Society are also keen to participate and a suggestion was put forward that as both families have their roots in the Yorkshire Dales, we take adjoining stands and endeavour to get some sponsorship, or help of any kind, from the Yorkshire Tourist Board and the Dales National Park Committee, to promote our 'native area' and family interests.
 - 13) The date of the next A.G.M. is Saturday 9th October 1993, same venue. There being no further business the meeting closed at 11.40 am.


