

Computer Notes

Another Family History Fair the May '94 Society of Genealogists FHF held at Victoria, London had the Mecca Computer & Index on display for random enquiries at the Metcalfe stall. Many thanks to George Buxton & to David, Stanley & Sally who all gave their time in an attempt to 'spread the word' ! personally am not sure that the apparent return is worth the time and effort that the 'few' put in, no doubt our committee will decide at the next meeting if we should continue with this type of effort, and, if we do as to whether we should be more selective over venue. It is of interest to note that John Alderson, of a lesser known Society!, told me just this week that they have decided to drop out of such exercises.

I'm still getting loads of data on disc from the above David Mte he does the Lists while Members trees are gradually being entered by me (These are the L's & M's e.g. L1325 or M305 which are shown under 'Indices: ' on the printouts I send out.). We are still finding that around one in three of the entries is a change to an existing one rather

than being totally new; so that some of these changes result in a printout to members being sent at the rate of about two per week. The message therefore is Hang on to your membership, that significant bit of data could turn up next month! Perhaps more importantly keep your Birth Brief up to date by sending an accurate, clear copy to Nina or myself as changes are made by you.

Queries are still coming in at a containable rate, even though some members may feel that the answer is very slow on occasions. One request recently caused me some surprise, it was for information on a Lionel (or any of its many variations). There were none to be found in our IGI'88 and only one in our Index and he was perhaps a Leonard anyway! That's less than 1 in 60,000 entries. Does the Clan not like the name?

Another note to answer a recent query - the program I prefer to use for tree diagrams, for my own tree, is a Shareware program called Brothers Keeper (it used to be called Family) and is distributed by John Steed, in the US of A of course. I have V2 but V5.2 is now available (\$45?).

If anyone cares to send me either 2 formatted discs and a SAE or just a SAE, I will return a V2 copy of the program with documentation, or just an application form. Pedigree also is highly recommended and I hope to get hold of a V2.5 copy from David in the near future.

We still are using IGI'88 to answer your queries. Is there anyone out there with the time. and within reach of a Latter-day Saints Family History Centre. who can copy down all Metcalfe's & variations onto 3c" discs. I have a list - somewhere of those in the UK. If there is someone able to do the very valuable job that Susan in Canada did for us a long time ago I would be very glad to hear from them. The task is time consuming but not difficult, the Centre staff are extremely helpful in starting one with a task. Waiting - - - - .

"Michael Flynn, PO Box 501, Newtown 2042, Sydney, Australia is preparing a biographical dictionary of the Second Fleet (ie Convicts sent out from England to Australia in 1790). His notes include the following:-"

James Metcalfe (c 1756 -), a tailor of Leeds, was sentenced to seven years transportation at the April 1787 Leeds (Yorkshire) Quarter Sessions for the theft of 11 yards of broad woollen cloth "of a drab colour" from Edward Ireson. In July 1787 he was sent to the "Ceres" hulk at Langstone Harbour, Portsmouth, age given as 30. On 30th November 1789 he was embarked on the "Suprize" transport. No record of his presence in the colony has been traced.

A Letter from America

Member M631 Judith Robinson has sent us the following letter written by John Fawcett, on 10th March 1844, to his Mother-in-Law Elenor/Eleanor Metcalfe of Sedbergh.

Apart from her own family line Judith has an interest in the history of an Esther Metcalfe of Sedbergh who married John Fawcett of Kendal on the 27th April 1843 at Dent and then emigrated to the USA around 1844.

From the names and family relationships mentioned in the letter together with records of the Sedbergh Parish registers (collected by M242 Sara Illingworth) the following family profile has been compiled.

August, we went into a house of his close beside them. we have A house to live in and plenty of wood for nothing Est has plenty of knitting one shilling A pair for socks, women stockings,2,s A pair because they are as long as yours she has knit 3, jackets at 2, shillings a piece that is English money she has as much knitting as she could doo she will have more jackets to knit next winter E made 2 pair of britches, we have made our own soap it will last hus one year and if you had it would last you two years Esther is going to lern to spin next summer they all make their own wolen dothing hear, unde and Aunt cousin Elizabeth me and Esther made, 120 pound of sugar in three days, for helping them to make sugar we get one third of all that is made of what we have mad all

ready is 45 pounds that would look a fine big lump of sugar if you had it now if the seson continues we shall make more this seson, sugar making starts after the breking up of winter after the ground gets soft sugar making only continues while it freses and just warem a nuf to melt the ground trees starts dropen, we have one hundred and fifty four trees tapt they boer one hole and puts a bultre spile we cook out then we set a wood trough to kep the water that runs out we can make about 8 pounds of sugar out of on barrel we boil our water in three twenty gallon pans we make a fire besides the trees and boils the water down sweten a nuf to make sugar Esther and me wishes we could send you some of it to sweeten your coffee and tee, unde and Aunt has been very good to hus they have given hus as much bacon as we could eat all this summer milk and cree buter and honey egs and as many chickons as we could eat we have plenty to eat hear you may set your mind at ease about hus all that we wish is and has many a hundred times that you and all our relations and friends could get as good A living as we doo and as easie if a man works only one or too days aweek the year

round let him be married of Single he can get a good living. I was not able to work till harvest was nearly over I worked 6 days in harvest i got 1, bushel of wheet per day I think if I live till a nother harvest as much as any of them that is 2, bushels per Day, after harvest I went to help thrash with a thrashing machine and it took nine men to kep it going I thrashed three days and a half i goot one bushel of wheat per day one bushel of wheat is to be 60. pounds weight we take one bushel of wheat to mill and we get 40 pounds of flour when the onest miller has taken his mooter out of it so we get a bushel of wheet it day that caled half a doller or is caled four shillings of English money 2 shillings or 2 bushels of Indian Corn I have been thrasing at another place since 2 1/2 days and I shall have 3 or 4 days more yet, place that unde Isac Metcalf lives on is thicks woods he has only 5 Acres deared 80 Acres of best of thick wood land their is different sorts of timber sugar tree and wallnut, beech poplar cherrietree Ash hickre and varies others cinds too tedious to mention he keeps this farm for fire wood and for rails that is to make fenses on his other farm he has 160, Acres of open land here

that never had a tree on and is drie land and the best land I ever so in America as level as a boweling green that 160 Acres is in 4 fields square they make their fenses of split rails here is no runen water here within 4 o 5 miles thay have to dig for water 10. or 12. yards and sum times more. Uncle Isac Metcalf has rented his farm out hes going to take some of it into his ow hands now, as soon as sugar makin is over I shall have to start plowing for Uncle Isac Metcalf I shall have 26, Acres to plough for 2, shillings per day of English money I shall have about two or three months this first year and the next year he told me he would have constant work after this first year, we have been keepen house for cousin James Metcalf we had 6 cows to feed two of them to milk 9 sheep 6 pigs to lok too while the went to see her Mother 200 miles south from hear, Uncle and me we went eight miles west to gether cronberries and they ware the finest cronberries i ever so and as rank we can gather them up in handfuls we got About one measure and then after uncle aunt me and other five went out cronbering and some of them to hunt and shoot dear and hunt bees we staid two nights and gathered cronberries two day the

third we hunted bees we found one tree that had bees in we cut the tree dow and got the honey out it had thre or fou.r gallons of honey in it 4, of hus joined at the honey.

Here is not such laws here as in England About catching game and Fishing people here is quite at liberty this country is rightly named we have liberty, here is alake a bout 4 miles i went one day but it was not very good day to fish we catched thre or four pounds we have canoos to fish in and sail a bout on the water in some times they bit as fast as they can take them of the line and some of them very large and the best fish I ever eat some times catch as many as thay can bear in 5 or 6, hours. Uncle and me we went out to hunt one monday with his gun the right name is rifles these is the guns for shooting dear and wild turkes we hunted about after a bit we spied too dear uncle shot at one of them and made blood flie and a piece of a bone come out of it we soon lost it we had no dog with hus we went home for two dogs of hunt it but we could not find it, after a bit one large buck got up but he could not shoot at it the dogs hunted a bout we still thought of finding the dear that he shot at after a bit the

dogs started barking as if they was woring the dear their when I got to them i seed it was not a dear i did not not what it was it was in a very thick place uncle seed it he cried out its a wolf, their the dogs w...... fighten it I believe the dogs could not have I run up and got my foot on to its neck while the dogs had it on its back i kiled it wi my knife, their that is better than a dear cried uncle that is worth two dollars, one dollar a piece the state gives that man that kiles a wlf 2 dollars I made a cap of the skin I have worn it all winter, me and Cousin Isac and a man went 8 miles to hunt racoons and bees we got 2 coons 4 bee trees coonskins is woth half dollar bees and racoons is in very large trees, here is squirrels here and they are good to eat and plenty of other game too numerous to mention, I doo like my change I wood not leave America and come back for one hundred and fifty pounds Esther does not like as well as i do she wants to see you all because she nows you want to come to America, she has wished as many times you was in America as you have mary and Isac, Esther wishes mary you may stay we her mother as long as she lives I have got into this

country at last where I long wanted to be, now brother james stay at home and behave well to Mother and Father, and stop with them as long as they live, and then I shall be content I shall write once A year I will write to you the next Letter. When you have red this letter send it to my Father and mother send it with James Garlick to kendal that he may give her it his self on saterday.

Their are very religious people in this country they go to the metings very regular we have seen several babtised here uncle is very religuous it is caled cristian religion they take them to a lake or rever puts them overhed in the water, Aunt and cousins does not no that Esther has any sisters. Est has not forgeton matte and Eden and wille we send our best respects to all enquring friends, Brother James Fawcett you must tell John Taylor to come to your house and hear the letter read, anybody that comes here doo not load your self with luggage clocks is cheap hear, so no more at present from me, John Fawcett and Esther Fawcett Direct your letters to me the next time, this is my own riting I believe I can get no more writing in hear

Whilst staying in England recently, my cousin showed me a book named 'The Industries of Yorkshire' Part II in which were entries for two METCALFES; C.L.Mte - Pharmaceutical Chemist, and H.J. & H.Mte - The Farm Produce Warehouse.

On returning to Australia I consulted my copy of the 1891 census for the Myton district of Hull and found the following entry:-

11 Clyde Terrace, Anlaby Rd. Christopher Metcalfe, H, mar, 62yrs, Pharmaceutical Chemist, b Malton, Yorks. Ann, wife, 58yrs, b Manchester, Lancs. Arthur, son, unm, 33 yrs, Pharmaceutical Chemist, b Hull. Amelia, dau, unm, 28yrs, no occupation. Grace, dau, unm, 28yrs. (?twins). Barbara, dau, unm, 26yrs. Blanche, dau, 21yrs. All b Hull. And Mary ETTY, sister-in-law, unm, 62yrs, liveing on her own means, b Manchester, Lancs. Plus 2 servants.

Also noted on this census; Rose MTE, 12yrs, visitor, b Hull, in the house of a Tom GRANT & Rachel his wife, 93 Campbell St.

His wife was Mary, nee Sharpe, born 12 Aug 1781 St George in East Stepney, daughter of Peter & Rebecca Sharpe. Mary is a widow on the 1851 census return, age 70 residing at 135 Jamaica Road, Stepney, with a daughter Margaret Ashbee and grandson Richard.

Mary's children were: Richard 19.091805, Mary Ann 21.11.1806, Eliza 19.01.1809; all baptised at St. George in the East, Stepney,

Thomas Robert, Rosetta & Margaret; all baptised St. Mary, Lambeth on 22.09,1824.

Rosetta is my Great Grandmother who married William Nash, a carpenter on 14.10.1848 at St. James, Ratcliffe, Stepney. They came to Australia circa 1854, spent a couple of years prior to this in New Zealand.

There is a Richard MTE mentioned, in the London Directory 1804-5, of 39 Strand Street. There are too many Richard MTE deaths in the GRO's records to be able to choose one. I have consulted a large number of archives, both professional and district but to no avail.

Richard states on the baptismal records of the last three children, he is a chemist, abode being Kennington. Rosetta's marriage certificate states her father is an Apothecary whilst on Richard's birth in 1805 he is given as a Chemist and Apothecary of Cannon Street Road.

"Craven's Part in the Great War" compiled & edited by John T. Clayton (ed of The Craven Herald, Skipton) and published in 1919 lists all the men who served or, and were killed in action including, in many cases, photographs. The following MTE's are included:

Major John Chayter MTE, Cheshire Regiment, killed 3rd July 1916. Only son of the late Major John MTE of Ings House, Hawes.

Lance Corporal A. MTE, Durham Light Infantry, killed 27th July 1916. Son of Mr Stephen MTE.

Private Joseph MTE, Duke of Wellington's Regiment, of Skipton, killed July 1916.

Sargeant James MTE, Duke of Wellingto's Regiment, died of wounds 3rd September 1916. Son of Mr & Mrs Sylvester MTE of Paradise Row, Ingleton.

Private George MTE, Duke of Wellington's Regiment, killed 3rd May 1917. Son of Mr & Mrs W MTE, Clapdale Hall, Clapham.

Gunner R.G. MTE, R.G.A.. 1 Watkinson Street, Skipton, killed 4th September 1917.

Private Irving MTE, Highland Light Infantry, killed 31st August 1918 age 43. of 20 Beech Street, Barnoldswick.

Private John MTE, R.F.A. killed 3rd October 1918. Grandson of Mr & Mrs John MTE, Hawes.

Private J.J. MTE, Duke of Wellington's Regiment, wounded & missing 19th April 1918. Eldest of sixteen children of Mrs Mary A MTE, Gills Farm, Tosside.

Private William MTE, Duke of Wellington's Regiment, died of wounds November 1917. Late of Long Preston.

Private Herbert MTE, Royal Irish Regiment, killed 20th November 1917, aged 19. Son of Mr & Mrs William MTE, Countersett, Askrigg.

Private John MTE, West Yorkshire Regiment, killed 5th December 1917, aged 20. Son of Mr Joseph MTE, East Parade, Steeton.

Lance Corporal E. MTE, Duke of Wellington's Regiment, died of wounds 3rd December 1917. Son of Mrs MTE, Glenroyd Park Avenue, Skipton.

Private James MTE, New Zealand Corps, died of wounds December 1917. Formerly of Kettlewell.

Private William M. MTE, Duke of Wellington's Regiment, killed 30th March 1918, aged 19. Son of the late John & Mrs MTE, Weathercote, Ingleton.

Metcalfe Will Abstracts

The will of Alice Metcalfe of Snaizholme in parish Aisgarth, dated 1 Jun 1705, mentions brother Francis Whalley (to get her dwelling house in Apperset), brother John Whalley, brother

William Whalley (to get Mathew Metcalfe bond), brother James Whalley, sister Hannah Simpson, and Thomas & John Simpson (sons of Henry Simpson). Estate admin. for Alice Metcalfe, dated 7 Feb 1706, was granted to William Whaley, yeoman of Burtesett, and Jacob Whaley, yeoman of Snaizholm.

The will Ann Metcalfe of Askrigg (admin., dated 24 Mar 1702, to Thomas Metcalfe) mentions son Thomas Melcalfe (sole executor), grandchild John Winn, dau Phillis Cargill and her son Edmond Cargill second, and a Mr. William Thornton and Mr. Peter Lamson (will wit. were Anth. Smith, Margaret Taylor, and Wm Leeming).

The will of Elizabeth Metcalfe of Ashes in Wensleydale, relict and late wife of Thomas Melcalfe of the same place, dated 3 Oct 1671 (probated 16 Oct 1671), mentions son Richard Metcalfe (executor). son Thomas Metcalfe (he and brother Richard to receive most of their mother's goods), son James (also noted as Jacobi Metcalfe on probate endorsement), and James Rucroste Itwice mentioned by full name in will and noted separately from Jacobi Metcalfe in probate endorsement], daughters Dorothy & Elizabeth Metcalfe, daughter Margaret Routh (with children John, Joseph, Christopher, & James Routh), Thomas Watson, and John Watson (son of Peter Watson of Skelgill, parish

Aysgarth, to receive ten shillings when he return to England).

The will of Elizabeth Metcalfe, late wife to Philip Metcalfe, late of Hawes deceased, dated 6 Jun 1699, mentions brother-in-law Mathew Metcalfe (to get £1) and her two sisters Margaret and Isabel Applegarth, bolh of Hawes, to be executrixes (will witnessess were James Whalley & Math. Wetherald). Elizabeth's estate bond, dated 29 Jul 1699, to Margaret Applegarth, spinster of Hawes, and James Rogers of Setbuske.

The will of George Metcalfe of Birkrigg, dated 30 Jun 1708 (admin. 25 Apr 1710 to grandson Jacob Fawcett), mentions, as executor, grandson George Fawcett (son of son-inlaw James Fawcett of Rawnslondall, county Westmorland; to get his property in Birkrigg and Mosdall), grandson Robert Fawcett, granddau Ann Fawcett, sister Agnes Metcalfe, a John Metcalfe of Blue Bridge, another John Metcalfe ("that is gone to be a soulger, one pound ten shillings if he ever comes for it"), a James Metcalfe (to get one pound ten shillings), and Ann Metcalfe Livinge? of Long Abed. Will witnesses were Thomas

Metcalfe, Richard Fothergill, William Fawcett, and James Fawcett (estate papers at Leeds Archives).

The will of Isaac Metcalfe, shopkeeper of Hawes, Yorkshire, dated 8 Mar 1784 (proved 15 Jun 1791), mentions sons Robert and Thomas Metcalfe, and servant Amy Moore.

The will of Isabell Metcalfe of Burtersett (probably unmarried, as there is no mention of children), dated 20 Mar 1708, mentions brother Thomas Metcalfe of Cavond? (to get her house in Burtersett, and a bequeath is made to his dau Jane Metcalfe), Alice Metcalfe of Cavond? [Camonl?] house (and her dau Dorothy Metcalfe), and a John Metcalfe (joint executor with above Thomas and Alice Metcalfe).

The will of John Metcalfe of Carperby, dated 3 Mar 1634 (probated 6 May 1635), mentions wife Christian Metcalfe, his five children Bryan Metcalfe, James Metcalfe (executor), Elioner Metcalfe, Dorothie Metcalfe, & Joan Metcalfe, his father-in-law Roger Simpson, Roger Moore of Bendsbank in Co. Westmoreland (gentleman, from whom JM's lands at Symonston are to be

received), brother Henry Metcalfe, Symon Rudd, Mychaell Wray, property of Askrigg Mill (to be sold). Matthew Jobson, eldest son Ralph Metcalfe (to get estate at Nappay Skarr). Father James Metcalfe (living), mother Ann Metcalfe, his wife's Father-in-law Leonard Metcalfe, his wife's son Jerome Metcalfe, servant William Olefant, and supervisors Roger Simpson, Henry Metcalfe, Symon Rudd, & Michaell Wray (wit. were John Simpson, Roger Simpson (his mark), Jerome Metcalfe). Probate papers, dated 27 May 1635, for this John Metcalfe mentions debts owed to Christopher Todd of Midleham (£15) and to John Machell (13 s.) and debts owed him from sisler Alice Pratt (£7, 10 s.). cosen John Pratt, brother Henry Metcalfe (£3), John Hawkens, Sir Thomas Metcalfe (4 s.), jean Harrison (18 s.), Edmond Pratt (26 s.), and Roger Moore (20 s.).

On 7 Nov 1670 John Metcalfe, yeoman of Eshes [Ashes], late son of Thomas Metcalfe of the same place whose will was dated 14 Dec 1663, agreed with Elizabeth Metcalfe, his stepmother and widow of the said Thomas Metcalfe, to permit her to reside in 3 rooms at the east end of the dwelling house called Eshes and to pay 4 pounds 3 shillings each

year to each of his sisters of the half blood, Dorothy Metcalfe and Elizabeth Metcalfe, until they attain age 17 years, apparently in return for the properties of Spilliam Greene and West Close End (wording vague, but appears that John received these).

The will of John Metcalfe of Hardraw in Askrigg, dated 24 Dec 1696, mentions brother Christopher Metcalfe (to get his house), sister Alice Metcalfe (to have remaining messuages. brother Robert Metcalfe (if he be living and come into the kingdom again, he is to have half of messuages given to sister Alice). and sister Dorothy, who married Thomas Metcalfe of Hardraw and had two children, each of whom is to paid £5 by [John's] sister Alice Metcatfe (will witnesses were Philip Smith, Thomas Kirkbride, and Christopher Metcalfe). John's estate inventory was taken by William Hillary, Edmund Metcalfe, William Dockway, and James Lickthall, and showed gross value of £33, offset by debts of £32 and funderal expenses of £2 (net loss of £1).

The will of John Metcalfe of Gayle, dated 3 Feb 1709/10 (admin. 1 Feb 1710/11), mentions wife Catherine (to have grounds

called Mosshaw and Parrock), dau Elizabeth (now wife of Richard Taylor), dau Dorothy, and son George. Estate admin., 1 Feb 1710/1 to Catherine Metcalfe and George Metcalfe.

The will of John Metcalfe of Hawes, dated 7 Jul 1768, mentions wife Ann, nephew Rev. George Metcalfe, brother William Metcalfe, brother Francis Melcalfe, nephew John Cragg, and neice Frances Metcalfe (wit. Robert Whaley, James Sidgewick, Charles Udal).

The will of Matthew Metcalfe of Hawes, date 14 Sep 1760 (admin. 25 Oct 1760 to executor James Sedgewick of Hawes), mentions dau Ellenor Furnass. her two sons Thomas Furnass & John Furnass, her daughters Isabel Furnass, Mary Furnass, Ellenor Furnass. & Alice Furnass, his four grandsons Thomas Pratt, Mathew Pratt, William Pratt. & John Pratt (latter two under age), granddau Jane Pratt, and his dau Alice Harrison (will witnesses were Richard Metcalfe, John Thompson, and Charles Udal).

The will of Peter Metcalfe of Hawes, dated 7 Jun 1687, mentions wife Mary, brother Thomas Metcalfe (to get 1 s.),

brother John Routh, sister Bridget Routh, nephew Thomas Routh, nephew Christopher Routh, neice Jane Routh, John Metcalfe (relationship unspecified), and Edward Applegarth (will wit. Oswald Routh, John Routh, Math. Wetherald). Peter's estate bond was granted to Mary Metcalfe. widow of Hawes, and to John Routh. Peter's estate inventory. dated 20 Jun 1687, showed negligable value and was signed by Christopher Dinsdale, Oswald Routh, Richard Routh, and Philip Metcalfe. Probably had no children as his will said after his wife's death most of his goods were to go to his nephews John, Thomas, & Christopher.

The will of Richard Metcalfe of Apperset, dated 20 May 1685, left property to his brother Mathew Metcalfe's four sons Michael (with children Grace & Richard), Richard (wilh children Matthew & Ann), Luke, and Thomas (S. Wither's notes). He was called Richard Metcalfe Elder, yeoman of Apperset, and great uncle of the Richard Metcalfe (son of Michael Metcalfe, Clerke) who in 1710 sold the inherited properties of Green, Low Close, Netherside, New Close, Adam Closes, and Rawfold Close to Thomas Pratt.

An indenture was made in 1710 between Richard Metcalfe, grocer of Parish of St Paul Covent Garden, Middlesex, (son and heir apparent of Michael Metcalfe. later of Little Thorock, county Essex, Clerke), and Mary his wife of the one part and Thomas Pratt, innholder of the parish of St Buttolph wilhout Bishopsgate. London of the other part. In this indenture Richard sold to Thomas Pratt, for the sum of £250, his lands at Apperset which had been held by his father Michael Metcalfe (who was granted them by the will of Richard Metcalfe, dated 20 May 1685). The lands sold included parcels called Green, Low Close, Netherside, New Close, Adam Closes, and Rawfold Close.

The will of Richard Metcalfe of Apperset, dated 30 Jun 1719 (admin. 16 Jul 1719), mentions wife Mary, dau Esther (executrix), son Mathew (to get 10 shillings), and grandsons Richard, Thomas, and Michael Metcalfe (to get 5 shillings each). Will witnesses were James Allen, Robert Metcalfe, and John Allen.

The will of Robert Metcalfe, yeoman of Birkrigg, parish Aisgarth (Yorkshire), dated 9 Jan 1732 (probated 30 Jun 1733), mentions son Robert Metcalfe (co

-executor), who received the new dwelling house and property. including a close of ground called Hill, a close called Bottom (with a house), a close called Buzzock (with a house on the north side of the River Ure), a pasture called Howgreen, a pasture called Inlack, a pasture at Apperset called New Close, and a house at Hardraw. The will also mentions Robert's son Issac Metcalfe who received the old dwelling house and property, including a close of ground called Faw?, a close called Green, and cattle gates in the pastures of Howgreen and Inlake. The will also mentions Robert's wife Agnes (co-executor) and daughters Margaret Metcalfe. Elizabeth Metcalfe, Ann Metcalfe, and Jane Metcalfe (will witnesses were James Whalley, Elizabeth Whalley, and Thomas Metcalfe).

The will of Robert Metcalfe of Hawes, parish Aisgarth, dated 16 Mar 1768 (admin. 29 Apr 1768), mentions land in Birkrigg and Apperset and names esteemed friends and kinsmen Isaac Metcalfe of Hawes, Henry Chapman of Thornton Rust, and Thomas Davis of Mosdal to be executors and to hold his estate in trust for his minor son George. His will also mentions elder dau Agnes Metcalfe, younger dau Margaret Metcalfe,

and young son Robert Metcalfe (will witnesses were Rachel Jackson, James Metcalfe, Charles Udal).

The will of Thomas Metcalfe. veoman of Eshes [Ashes], dated 14 Dec 1663 (estate inventory 9 Feb 1663/4), mentions son John (to get the whole estate of Ashes), son Richard (to get a table and a chest), day Agnes (to reach age 17 in 1668-69). dau Dorothy (to reach age 17 in 1673-74), dau Elizabeth (to reach age 17 in 1676-77), wife Elizabeth, property of Spilliam Greene and West Close end. Anne Harrison (to get a hog). and will witnesses Nynian Metcalfe, Oswald Routh, Richard Routh & Anthony Hodshoning.

Thomas Metcalfe, thelder of Hawes in Wensleydale, parish Asygarth, made an indenture, dated 12 Dec 1663, naming sons Richard and Thomas Metcalfe to receive 4 land parcels in Hawes, these being a close of about 3 acres called Thornes, a parcel of about 6 acres (with a house) called great Westclose, a 2 acre parcel called Baylan Hill, and a parcel of about 2 acres called Intack. The indenture also mentions 2 land parcels in Apperset, containing about 2.5 acres total, called Birkhead and



Fawbushe (including a pasture called Oavis? or Vaux?), all [six] land parcels being part of the "Manor of Middleham". The indenture also mentions a manor of East (Oueenswitch) in the county of (Kent), and was witnessed by Oswald Routh. Richard __, and John Metcalfe.



Minutes of The A.G.M. held 9th October 1993 at The College of Ripon & York St. John, Ripon

- 1. Chairman Charles S. Metcalfe presided over 60 members and invited guest Mrs Carol McLee from Federation of FHS.
- 2. APOLOGIES were received from :- Ken & Rita Banks. Sheila Barley. Dorothy Galliford, Eunice Herring, Margaret Hodgson, Diane Howarth, John & Edna Hyndes, George Buxton, Lillian Lawrence & Rosemary Metcalfe, Barbara Medcalf, Basil Metcalfe, Colin Metcalfe, Christopher Metcalfe, Joe Metcalfe.
- 3. Minutes of the AGM held 10th October 1992 were taken as read and duly signed as a correct record.
- 4. MATTERS ARISING: none.

5. REPORTS

- a) Chairman: Charles Metcalfe welcomed all present, particularly the three from the USA. He had recently returned from a holiday in Salt Lake City and had tried to obtain a copy of the 1992 IGI for the Society, however it was not yet available. Thanks were expressed to all the committee and helpers with projects, especially to Stuart Metcalfe, editor since March 1990. He pointed out how much the Mecca News had improved.

- e) Computer: Charles Metcalfe appealed for help with inputting data. We now have over 38,000 entries occupying 12 megabytes of disk space. Also there are all the entries on the IGI. There are 450 Lists to be entered. Around 200 family trees have been entered with at least 175 still to do. Enquiries tend to average 1-2 per week and are dealt with fairly promptly.
- f) Deeds of Covenant: Valerie Metcalfe reported that there is a total of 48 members in the scheme. Total tax reclaimed last year amounted to £82.76.

6. PROJECT REPORTS:

a) GENERAL REGISTRATION INDEX (GRI): Dorothy Pope (co-ordinator) appealed for more volunteers. Work is continuing with the BIRTHS and the situation is as follows:

- b) NEW METCALFE HISTORY BOOK: The last book on this subject had been published towards the end of the last century. The Committee feels it is time a more comprehensive family history should be written and published. John Holden and Warwick Metcalfe have undertaken to help with this task. It is imperative that all the facts are fully authenticated & that it is written in a universal style. We hold so much data that could be used but it will be very time consuming work to decide and edit what should be published. A publication date of the year 2000 was generally agreed as feasible. The Chairman proposed and the Secretary seconded that John Holden be nominated to oversee this project.
- c) METCALFE INTEREST NOTIFICATION (MIN): Stanley Metcalfe co-ordinates the collection by members of Metcalfe mentions in FHS journals etc. He had been notified of 45 Metcalfe researchers and sent them information on the Society, of these two had subsequently joined.

7. PUBLICATIONS:

- a) Wills Book 5. This publication lists the Metcalfe (& variants) Wills proved during the years 1900-1940. The Book is available @ £5.
- b) Index to Lists. Work continues.

- c) Birth Brief Booklet. A new edition is now available. New members will still get a free copy, existing members will have to pay cost price (32).
- 8. ELECTION OF OFFICERS: Vera Adams & Stuart Metcalfe stood down & were thanked for their work for the Society. All other Committee members were willing to be reelected were proposed by Stuart Metcalfe, seconded by Joan Metcalfe & were re-elected en-bloc. Peter Dobson was duly elected.
- 9. SUBSCRIPTION RATES 1994: Committee recommended that they remain unchanged and this was duly accepted.
- 10. APPROVAL OF ACCOUNTS: The audited accounts had been published and were duly accepted as correct.
- 11. APPOINTMENT OF AUDITOR: Mrs Josephine Gould was duly re-appointed.

12. ANY OTHER BUSINESS:

- i) Warwick Metcalfe pointed out that subs may have to be increased to provide money for some admin/secretarial help. The work load is carried by a very small number of members.
- ii) It was proposed by Nina Benson, seconded by Charles Metcalfe and duly passed unanimously that Vera Adams, Mary Metcalfe and Helen Offer should be granted free Life Membership of the Society in recognition of their services to us.
