

DEED OF COVENANT - RENEWALS

The Finance (No 2) Act 1992 **RELAXED** the rules for certain charitable covenants. Whereas at the end of the 4 years if we wished the Deed to continue we had to complete another Deed, now we don't. The new rules allow the Covenant to run on without any need for further form filling.

So when you complete your Deed of Covenant you are still entering into a 4 year agreement with the power to terminate at the end of that period or at a later date, but if you don't want to terminate take no further action and the Deed will just run on until you advise me to the contrary. This does cut out a huge amount of unnecessary paperwork for both the Inland Revenue and ourselves. If anyone has sent me another covenant form thinking they had to renew I will have scrapped it, there will be no duplication.

Many thanks to all our covenantors, including the 20 who have taken the plunge since the Muster.

A STROKE OF GOOD LUCK

Or the Making of the Fortune of Joe Metcalfe

It was the Martinmas (St. Martin's Day) hiring Fair which occurred every November. Farm workers and labourers had vied with one another to gain work for the coming year from the farmers who lived around Barnard Castle on the banks of the Tees. That 17th day of November 1791 had seen the heavy rain of the previous days give way to a fine afternoon. Daylight waned, so did the Fair and by the early evening the event was nearly over. As day gave way to night, the moon struggled out of the drifting cloud, fitfully lighting the town.

In the last building on Bridgegate in Barnard Castle, next to the Tees, was located the weaving and dyeing business of Lancelot Newby who also ran an inn from the premises. He was usually busy with his textile operation leaving his wife to deal with the inn but that Martinmas Fair the town had been busy so he had closed the manufacturing down for the day and helped to serve the customers. By 8 o'clock the town was returning to a semblance of normality and the inn was relatively quiet so Lancelot, who was in his early fifties, sat in a corner of the main room of the inn talking with his friends George Ewbank, a tanner, and William Porthouse, a watchmaker. They often sat debating politics and the events of the day. William was one of the few people of the town who took the Newcastle Courant - the only newspaper produced north of the Tees.

In another, sat two strangers, who by their garb looked semi-nautical and so it turned out; they were seamen who had been shipwrecked in Morecambe Bay and were making their way back across country to their native Newcastle to look for another ship. They didn't appear to be short of money but a sinister air didn't endear them to the inn's other patrons. Both were well built and one wore a thick silken neckerchief or scarf which was highly distinctive in stripes of dark blue and scarlet.

Shortly after the friends engaged in conversation another man entered the inn and joined Newby's group - he was **Joe Metcalf**. Joe was in his late twenties and head man for a Mr William Hodgson a well known farmer and cattle breeder at Woolhouse Farm near Barnard Castle. Joe a native of Swaledale had worked for Mr Hodgson for a number of years. He was so well thought of by his employer, who had implicit trust in his head man, that he allowed him to carry out many of his business deals, which he did well.

Lowering his nearly six foot frame into a quickly brought up chair Joe, a fun loving character, soon had his friends laughing at his account of his day at the Fair. After finishing his employers business he had seen the well known conjuror Signor Redeasha carrying

out his tricks including decapitating a man then replacing his head; followed by a display of 'Punch', cock fighting and a dancing bear controlled by two Frenchmen.

After an hour or so Joe indicated he had to leave as he was expected back before 10 o'clock and he didn't wish to be late as he was carrying nearly £200 of his employer's money from the deals done that day. His route into the town that morning had been across the Percy Beck stepping stones but it might be difficult on the way back because of the recent rain. If they were covered he would have to go another longer route.

At the mention of the sum of money William Porthouse noticed a look pass between the two seamen not seen by the others and before he could say anything Joe had put on his hat, picked up his heavy walking stick and moved towards the door. William followed him outside and not wishing to alarm his friend suggested that Joe leave his money with Lancelot but Joe laughed at the idea, promised if his route was blocked by flood water he would return and before William could express his fears strode off into the night. William returned to the inn, discovered that the two seamen had departed and mentioned his worries to the others who thought that his concerns were groundless and in any case Joe could look after himself.

The friends sat for a while longer smoking their pipes but William's concern grew. He remarked that Joe had been gone an hour and the height of the river would have prevented him crossing the beck, therefore he should have returned before then. As the friends started to prepare to go after Joe neighbours came rushing into the inn shouting that there was a man in the river. They had heard a cry for help and had seen a man in the raging Tees hanging onto the platform outside Newby's dye house. They ran urgently down the stairs at the back of the inn to the platform, picking up along the way a coil of rope. There they saw a man hanging on for all he was worth against the buffeting foam capped waves. The rope was rapidly thrown and the man pulled to the bank. At that moment the fitful moonshine was replaced by a broad band of light which lit up the scene and the rescuers were amazed to see a half drowned Joe Metcalfe in front of them. They then rushed him back up to the inn. As they started to sit him down and find dry clothing William noticed that caught around Joe's buttons was a highly coloured neckerchief similar to the one recently seen around the neck of one the strangers in the inn. When asked how it got there Joe was unable to explain. The scarf was removed from Joe's coat and a further surprise was in store as from the folds of the neckerchief fell a number of jewels.

Once clothed in dry garments Joe unfolded the happenings after leaving his friends. As he arrived at the beck it was obvious he could not cross as the water covered the stepping stones, so he made to return. At that instant from the bushes two men pounced. A fight ensued with Joe knocking one of his assailants to the ground with his heavy stick. A struggle with the second man was going Joe's way when he heard a trigger being cocked by the first man. Fearing for his safety he leapt up to escape but tripped and plunged headlong into the river. Although a strong swimmer he was swept downstream and only by a stroke of good luck he managed to grasp onto a platform jutting out into the Tees from

where his friends rescued him. Joe confirmed that his attackers were the two seamen seen earlier in the inn but they had not relieved him of his employers cash. Although a search was made the seamen were not found.

There the matter stayed until a day in 1793 when William Porthouse was reading the Newcastle Courant he saw an item concerning the execution of two seamen in Scotland for their heinous crimes. They were Thomas Hume and Richard Irving natives of Newcastle who in their confessions stated that they had been seamen on slave and pirate ships. Some time earlier on their way North from being shipwrecked they had been in Barnard Castle and had attempted a robbery but had been foiled, in the struggle Irving's neckerchief which contained his spoils from piracy had been torn off and lost. On this news Joe was hailed as a hero and it was agreed that he was the rightful owner of the plunder.

Shortly after celebrating his windfall Joe retired from the employment of Mr Hodgson and returned to Swaledale where he enjoyed the remainder of his life.

THE NOTTINGHAM GALLERIES OF JUSTICE

On 7 April 1995 an exhibition opened in Nottingham's Lace Market area which it is hoped will eventually become the National Museum of Law. The Galleries of Justice designed to become a showcase for the law and to show the role of lawyers will consist of a major exhibition of crime and punishment. They will also give historical background of the development of law, from its earliest modern equivalent in the 12th century, through the various changes to the present day. There will be collections of police memorabilia which should be of interest to family historians with legal and law enforcement antecedents as well as being of general interest. British Telecomms Archive. Preserves the documentary heritage of British Telecommunications plc and its predecessors from the early part of the nineteenth century up to the present day, effectively the history of telecommunications services in the UK and from the UK to overseas. Records produced before the date of privatisation are classed as public records under the Public Records Acts 1958 & 1967. BT Archives undertakes the company's statutory responsibilities under these acts to preserve and make available public records to members of the public after 30 years and for this purpose has been appointed an "official place of deposit for public records" by the Lord Chancellor. Customers are welcome to conduct their own research in person at the Archives PP G09, Telephone House, 2-4 Temple Avenue London EC4Y 0HL. An appointment is essential to reserve a place in the Searchroom. Ring 0171 822 1002 to arrange a suitable time. Open Monday to Friday 9.30am to 4.30pm.

Public Record Office. By December 1996 documents will have been transferred from Chancery Lane and Hayes to the New Public Record Office at Kew. Until then some classes of documents will be unavailable for up to three weeks. A provisional timetable for the moves is available and you should ring 0181 876 3444 extension 2350 to see if the documents you want are available. Central London Reading Rooms will provide access to microfilms of census records, wills, death duty registers and non-parochial registers. Mention of Metcalfe's in other publications.

Beresford FHS Magazine April 1995. **Barbara Metcalfe** (nee Swinbank) married Peter Beresford (bpt18.4.1802) 3rd son of George Beresford at Hubberholme Witness to Peter's will dated 16.4.1869 **WR Metcalfe** of Hubberholme.

Beresford FHS Magazine July 1995. George Beresford (brn 4.1.1859) mar **Jane Metcalfe** (brn 3.10.1868). Couple farmed Cowside Langstrothdale and had seven children.

Alderson FHS Newsletter June 1995. **George Metcalfe** of Askrigg Wensleydale married Sarah Alderson (nee Woodward) of Healaugh Swaledale in the late 1850's in South Wisconsin / N Illinois and had six children.

Alderson FHS Newsletter October 1995. **George Metcalf** auctioneer at the sale of household furniture, stock, farming implements and crops of a Mr Thomas Alderson of Windyhall on 10 November 1851.

Cleveland FHS Journal April 1995. The clock which was the subject of the song "Stopped never to go again" was situated at the George Inn, Piercebridge, Co Durham on the Tees. The publican was a William Lancaster whose daughter **Anne** married **Thomas Metcalfe** (brn 1.11.1862 at Killerby Co Durham) son of **John Metcalfe** and **Hannah** nee Miller.

Yorkshire Family Historian July 1995. Private John Miller of the Lieut. Colonels Co of 2nd North Yorkshire Militia married in Middleton, **Margaret Metcalfe** spinster of Middleton on 16 April 1799.

A Dales Upbringing by WR Mitchell. In the 1800's **Richard Metcalfe** maternal grandfather of Annie Margaret Moson (nee Pratt) of Wensleydale owned quarries in Burtersett.

Dalesman September 1994. **Elizabeth Ann Moore Metcalfe** died giving birth to **Jane Anne Metcalfe** (brn 26.4.1880 at Halfway House Hawes). From L Holmes 55 Monton Sth Bretton Peterborough PE3 9YT.

THE ARRIVAL

Or how the News is produced

This article is dedicated to all those unsung volunteers without whose help you would not be reading this Issue!

Thump, crash, kerplat! "The post has arrived." "Bills, bills, circulars. A letter from your mother." A brown envelope - ah! "The Mecca News has arrived. I wondered where that was. It's usually here by now. I'll just put the kettle on and read it."

"Mm not bad. I will send that article/newspaper cutting/family anecdote I've been meaning to send for a while to the Editor. He evidently needs some more material."

That or something like it is perhaps how many of you greet the arrival of The Society's magazine. But what you receive is many months in gestation and involves a great deal of work before it lands on your mat. Every four months there is a great flurry in various households up and down the land.

Here is a typical example of the life cycle of THE MECCA NEWS:

The December issue comes out (hopefully!) early that month and Christmas is enjoyed. Come early January thoughts stray but not too enthusiastically to the April issue. Check out the items received; see if there are any common themes for use as an article; anything that could be the main feature; set up a draft layout. Once the outline is prepared the next six weeks are a matter of typing, writing and inputting the articles - slowly - into the computer.

"What's the matter with this computer? Technology, huh!"

"Charles - have you finished your page? I need it by the weekend"

"David, when can I have those computer pictures?"

"You know that article you promised? Well can I have it by...?"

"What can I write for the Editorial?"

The last minute flurry over, down to the Chairman's house (he is the one with the super duper printer), print out the master copy (sometimes this only achieved after hours of frustration trying to get the computer to comply with the simplest of commands.). Hooray! Send it off to Diane Howarth. Thank goodness that's over. Thump, splat! "Oh, no a birth brief. It will just have to wait. Now for the gardening / decorating...a rest. Switch on the match. Coming dear."

There is now about four weeks to go. All will be plain sailing. Oh, yes? There is still a lot more to do and many a slip......!

The master copy wings its way to our Deputy Chairman's home where the inhabitants are coping with work, the house, the garden, hobbies(?) and a young lady called Pippa. Even

with the busy nature of the household the arrival of the next issue of the Mecca News is quickly taken to the printer.

"Can I have this by the 14th?"

"What's the delay? Not another priority order?"

"When can you fit the Magazine in? WHEN??"

After cajoling pleading and general pressure the run is produced. A proof reading is carried out then the four hundred or so Issues and inserts are sent on to the Despatch Department in the Midlands.

This is the home of Gwen and Ron Metcalfe. The phone rings and it is Diane. Can Ron and Gwen receive the News? This Issue has a number of inserts and altogether there are four boxes on their way. That should give the Royal Mail parcels people something to think about! Boxes received and emptied. Outside colour page, twenty eight pages of contents and the inserts. 500 of each. Now the job starts.

Cover and contents together, out with the big stapler, hand stapling in two places for each copy. Before they are finished sprained wrists (or staplers wrist, similar to tennis elbow) will be the order of the day. Once the News is complete it needs folding and inserting into the envelopes. Again the wrists suffer. Now comes the turn of the tongue to be punished - over 300 stamps are needed for the envelopes for the UK members. These are relatively easy needing only one stamp; it is those for overseas destinations which need up to four stamps that can strain the tongue. The envelopes have been prepared prior to the magazines arrival with address labels run off and supplied by Nina our Secretary. At least these and the airmail stickers are self-adhesive!

The house is at last getting back to something like normal. The envelopes are placed in large black bin liners and off to the local Post office in the village. The ease of parking reduces the handling and possible hernia but does raise the eyebrows of the local clientele as the bags are passed into the custody of the postal staff. Three days and they are winging their way to your mat. Another issue put to bed now to soak those wrists and slake those tongues!

That in a somewhat tongue in cheek way is how this MECCA NEWS has reached you. However there is one important person who has not been mentioned in this article

Some time ago we had correspondence concerning "Fruity Metcalfe" who may have some connection with our Metcalfe branch.

George Metcalfe born in Ripon in 1809 was the older brother of my ancestor John Metcalfe born in Ripon in 1820. He is reported to have gone to Dublin Ireland. All we in the family know is that Irish Metcalfe relatives visited both Ripon and Nottingham in the twenties.

In the home of FG Metcalfe who had been mayor of Ripon in 1909 was a grandson Frank Hebden who remembers the visit. The grandchildren of Maria (Metcalfe) Linday, sister of FG also remember how displeased their grandmother was because she disapproved of the Irish relatives - perhaps because of horse racing connections.

At this stage we are not sure if there is any connection with "Fruity" Metcalfe.

ANOTHER VIEW OF THE LANDLORD AND TENANT RELATIONSHIP

In Issue 47 (page 10) **Dorothy Pope (M55)** wrote about how William Reynard had treated inhabitants of Muker when times were hard. In this Issue **George Buxton (M003)** tells of an occasion when the landlord was the injured party.

My great grandfather William Buxton was born at Gunnerside Swaledale on 28 March 1815. On 11 April 1844 he married **Mary Ann Metcalfe** of Ivelet Heads Farm. The couple had a family of two daughters - Hannah (1845 - 1927) and Ann (1847 - 1927) and two sons George (1850 -1927) and my grandfather William (1854 - 1932). Great grandfather purchased in 1846 the copyhold of a house in Gunnerside for £60 and later in 1852 a field called Bank for £150 which eventually became co-owned by his sons on his death in 1884. The house was rented to a Mr Sunter who eventually purchased the house in 1916 whilst the field was rented to a William Alderson of Modesty. This tale concerns the renting of the Bank field.

My grandparents were married in 1883 and produced a total of nine children. They moved several times as their family grew and found that they needed all the funds available to bring up their family. The monies from the properties were extremely handy in sometimes trying circumstances but these could not be guaranteed because William Alderson was somewhat lax in the settlement of his rent. Letters from George to my grandfather survive and give a flavour of the problems experienced. Here are a few extracts:-

- 3 March 1898 "I have not got any of their rents yet but if Wm Alderson does not pay it soon I think I shall ask him about as it is quite a time for him to pay.
- 4 February 1899 I enclose your share of the house rent you will see the expenses taken out..... £1-5-5 by post office order. W Alderson has never said anything yet about paying rent.
- 26 April 1899 I saw William Alderson soon after I got your letter and he promised he would pay the rent very soon. He did not do so. I saw him again over a fortnight since and he told me he was going to deliver a cow that week and would come over and bring the rent. He did not do so.
- 6 March 1901 I have not got any rent from William Alderson. I went to his house one night about it a few weeks since but he had not it for me. I heard he was wanting to sell his property he bought about three years since. I understand that someone is calling some money in he borrowed on it. He advertised it in the paper for sale just one week but I have enquired whether he has sold it or not but cannot learn whether he has or not. He promised me to pay

the rent as soon as he had money. There has been talk about him going away. I think it would be better as his family some of them are getting up as he cannot get a living here. I am quite tired of him and thinking of giving him his quit note this month, a years notice as the field will let and I have some good applications for it.

20 March 1901 - I saw William Alderson last week. You will see I have written a quit note out for him, you must sign your name in full below my name. You will note I have left a space for the day of month for you to date, be sure and date it right and send it by post the same day.

18 November 1901 - I was at Gunnerside today and Jane Sunter paid the house rent. I offered the field to Mrs Heseltine as I told her we did not intend to rent it again to the old tenant, so if William Alderson or anyone writes to you tell them it is not a liberty nor who has taken it.

10 January 1902 - I may say that shortly after I let the field to Mrs Heseltine, Ann Rutter asked me about it but I told her that it was let. I find out as I and William Alderson have had a few more words about it he is so vexed and tells me it is not good behaviour because when it was at liberty we had promised it to George Rutter, for which I don't remember. I find they are a bit distant with me since it has been let to someone else. Ann Rutter has been letting her tongue go free about it to some people but never said anything wrong to me. It would have looked better if she had kept her council about us. I am surprised at her but I have not reversed the course we have taken as it was time there was a change. As you know William Alderson and George Rutter are cousins and we are going to let it to the likeliest person. For my part I don't care a fig for them and don't mind what people say."

My grandfather and his brother were cast in a bad light by turning William Alderson out of the field but I think you will agree the question of rent had spread over a total of 4 years. They were understanding of his circumstances - his family consisted of ten children - but life was not easy for anyone who had to work for a living including my grandfather and his brother. I am in correspondence with one of his grandsons.

My Favourite Yorkshire Story



One of the strangest envelopes ever handled by Royal Mail staff at Leyburn bore the words "To any Mr Metcalfe (Jim for preference), aged 68-72 and living in Wensleydale. Please Mr Postman choose a rural area where sheep are pastured."

"It was the vaguest address we have ever had" commented Royal Mail delivery office manager Frank Suttill. "Everyone knows every-body else up here but nobody recalled a **Jimmy Metcalfe**. We decided he must be from the top end of the dale so the local postmen started asking questions."

Eventually the letter was successfully delivered to a retired farm-worker nicknamed "Tetley" Metcalfe and living in Bainbridge.

It was an invitation from Alan Bidgood of Shaftesbury Dorset to attend a reunion of old colleagues who had served in the Shropshire Yeomanry.

Mr Bidgood recalls favourite tales of "Tetley": "He was given the nickname as a 14-year old when he would regularly walk half a mile from Hawes auction mart to the nearest pub to fetch bottles of beer for the local cattle drover. Later when he was standing to attention his uniform never would. He also had his clogs sent from England because foot troubles affected him on long marches!" 
Now - the search for Christopher begins in earnest.

ASKRIGG ST. OSWALD'S

This is the first of an occasional series about the Churches of Wensleydale and Swaledale.

The present Deanery of Wensley, nearly forty miles long by ten miles wide, stretches from the fells above Hawes down to the northern edges of the Vale of York outside Ripon and Thirsk. Originally the parish of Aysgarth covered the whole of upper Wensleydale and was the largest in England. Part of the See of Carlisle it was moved to the Bishopric of Chester in 1541 where it stayed until 1836 when it became part of the Ripon Diocese.

Askrigg is situated on the north side of the river Ure, a mile or so from the Metcalfe's perceived ancestral home of Nappa Hall - indeed James Metcalfe (brn 1389, son



of John and Alice of Nappa) founded a chantry in the church. St Oswald's, named after the seventh century Northumbrian king / saint Oswald, has been a place of worship since at least the 12th century when it was built as a Chapel of Ease (so called as it was easier to get to by the local inhabitants than the usual parish church). The priests were originally appointed by Aysgarth church with the earliest recorded name being Uctred in 1200. However there were undoubtedly earlier churches in the dale (Wilfred the English bishop financed the building of Ripon cathedral, around 670, from confiscated British Church lands including Dent) but information is scarce. The first documented landowners were the Cistercians who briefly stayed near Askrigg then moved to Jervaulx but continued to collect the tithes.

The present building dates from around 1446 and is, for those of you who are architectural buffs, of late Perpendicular style. Restoration was carried out in 1770 followed by a major rebuild in 1853 when the galleries including that for the musicians was removed. However it is considered that the character was not seriously damaged, not like some churches in the Dales, which were changed out of recognition during the Victorian era.

St. Oswald's bells were considered to be 'the finest in the North' and the three oldest date from 1657. They were recast and rehung in 1897 and rehung again in 1992, after the congregation raised £35000. The ringing of the 'new' bells took place on Easter Day 1992.

The Metcalfes have had a recent presence in the church in the form of a bell captain - **Jack Metcalfe** - and before the last war , a bell ringer, **Richard Metcalfe**. There is also

evidence of Metcalfes with a number of graves and inscriptions. From the Great War (1914-18) there are memorials to Drv **John J Metcalfe** - ASC and Rfn **Robert P Metcalfe** - 8th KRR. Whilst there are a few head stones in the grave-yard the number of Metcalfes seems somewhat low for a church so close to the Metcalfe heartland. However this does not detract from a pleasant quiet oasis close to the bustle of the village.

Light on Wensleydale Road Tolls

An article from the D & S Times July 1950. "A letter dated October 7, 1865 found in the stables of an Askrigg hotel by the landlord Mr J Bell throws a curious light on the turnpike road system ." (It was from **John Metcalfe** at Cheltenham to George Winn accepting a part payment of tolls due to him from the Richmond & Lancaster Turn Pike Trust.) "A likely explanation is that George Winn was one of the famous 'Four Just Men' of Askrigg who conducted all the tolls and public matters until the Parish Council Act of 1895. The old town common seal which has been lost for many years was last believed to have been in the possession of one W.E.M. Winn who died in 1924.

Ings House near Hawes was in the Metcalfe family for many generations the family being one of the largest landowners in the district. As the toll roads ran through much of their land it is possible that the letter refers to some outstanding debt to be settled by the Askrigg men."

"It is generally understood that the romantic district of Wensleydale was formerly covered with wood to much greater extent than at present, so much so, that tradition tells of the incredible journeyings which the squirrel was enabled to perform without once condescending to the degredation of earth. Of the date AD 1483 there is extant in one of our public collections a grant to 'Jamys Metcalfe of the officer of maister Forester of Wynsladale, Radale and Bishopdale and the keeping of the parke of Woodhalle'. This document corroborates tradition,......it is to be hoped .. a friendly emulation will arise amongst the owners of the soil......to cover the nakedness of their lands thereby earning them the title The Master Forester." (A somewhat flowery prose - Ed)

The modern Forest Horn of Wensleydale was given to the village of Bainbridge in the 1860's. The previous horn was pensioned off when the new African Buffalo horn replaced it. (I wonder what became of it - Ed) The Metcalfe's were involved in its blowing in the recent past from just after the first World War to the 1950's. The earlier horn blower was **Jamie Metcalfe** who blew it for 30 years followed by **Jack Metcalfe**. The horn blown three times at 9 o'clock in the evening from 28 September to Pancake Tuesday was reputed to be heard up to three miles away. When asked in the 1950's whether this statement was true Jack was reputed to have said he didn't know as he was at the blowing end!

AN ENCOUNTER WITH NED KELLY

On Saturday October 16th, 1880 the following article appeared in the Kyneton newspaper, The Guardian, regarding the death of **George Metcalf***, a brother of Luke White's wife **Anne**.

"Another Kelly Victim"

"A young man named George Metcalf, son of Mr Metcalf shoemaker of Baynton Street, died in the Melbourne Hospital yesterday. He was employed with five others in quarrying stone near Glenrowen and on the morning of the celebrated Sunday was wakened by the Kelly gang and along with his mates compelled to tear up the line. Afterwards he was locked up with the others in the Glenrowan Hotel and when the fight commenced he was lying on the floor near the chimney. He was severely wounded in the eyes in the first volley that was fired by the police but whether by a bullet or some piece struck off from the chimney he was unable to say. After the fight he was sent down to the Eye and Ear Institution at Melbourne from which place he was discharged a few days ago. Last night his father received a telegram containing the announcement that he had died in the Melbourne Hospital but whether from the effects of the injuries received at the fight or not he is unable positively to state from the meagre particulars to hand. It is however most probable that this is the case as previous to that the deceased was a fine strong healthy man. His age was 34 years and he was unmarried. He was well-known in this district where he always bore an excellent character as a steady hard-working man."



Held at the College of Ripon & York St John, Ripon. 14th October 1995

- 1. Chairman's Opening Remarks Charles welcomed our Guest speaker Bill Mitchell and Members and their friends to our eleventh AGM. The meeting warmly welcomed Mr Mitchell who gave a very entertaining talk on Dales Life.
- 2. Apologies: were received from 15 Members.
- 3. The Minutes of the 1994 AGM having been circulated were taken as read and signed as a correct record.
- 4. Matters arising: there were no matters arising.
- 5. Reports:
 - a) Computer Index: Charles outlined our computer resources which were largely due to the generosity of IBM. David Metcalfe will take over the Computer Index from April 1996. We heard that non-members are now charged £20 for extracted information.
 - b) Secretary: Nina told the meeting that we now had 421 members with 90 from overseas. The most successful source of new members being the "Family Tree" magazine advert. 
