UNKNOWNCOUSINS

Part I by Dianne Fox M113

(The following article is taken from a paper prepared by Dianne Fox and whilst it is primarily about discovering "Unknown Cousins" from those who went to Australia the methods can equally apply to any emigrant families and indeed any that have left their traditional family areas. Part II will appear in the August issue.)

SYNOPSIS

Finding your *Unknown Cousins* can be a wonderful source of information for a family history. People did not generally come to Australia alone, siblings, cousins, parents, uncles and aunts also migrated. Tracking down the descendants of those who migrated and finding these *Unknown Cousins* can be a wonderful source of information. They can be living in the same city, state or interstate and can be located using local resource centres, some keen logical research and lots of patience and time. Once these resources become familiar it is easier to apply this type of research to other family branches.

INTRODUCTION

It is a daunting thought to leave family and friends and move to the other side of the world even in this day and age of modern telecommunications and transport. The thought of not speaking to loved ones and seeing they again is quite frightening but what of our forebears who travelled to Australia in the 1800's from England or Europe where the journey each way took some 100 days. When many people left their native country letters were not even exchanged after arriving in Australia.

Most families did not immigrate alone. Close relatives were already in the colony or joined the family in the years after their arrival. It is necessary to identify these other close relatives and their descendants, *Unknown Cousins*, to build up a better picture of our ancestors lives.

So why try to find other descendants of our great, great, great grandparents? Because all sorts of bits and pieces, such as photographs, letters, Bibles, stories and family memorabilia would have been split up over the generations and passed down. Hopefully some of these items still exist and will be with some of these *Unknown Cousins*.

Records in Victoria are excellent for tracking down who is who. In particular Birth, Death and Marriage indexes and certificates, cemetery records, parish records and early church record indexes, shipping records, probate indexes, newspapers, Post Office directories and electoral rolls are all wonderful sources of information and most can be looked at free of charge.

With a very common name it may be more difficult to identify relatives but even so this process can be successful. Do not forget some golden rules of research—when tracing a particular name do not forget that spelling can vary considerably, so check all possible spellings. Also remember that new records and indexes are continually being published .

Ancestors are found by working backwards one generation at a time with names, birth and death details of our direct ancestors siblings all recorded. These siblings are

the ones to look for and maybe more distant relatives such as cousins, uncles, aunts and grandparents. If you try to explore the lives of these relatives you may find they have also emigrated. These people are all families like ours, some siblings are close to each other some are not. Hopefully over the generations some item or stories of past generations have been handed down. These *Unknown Cousins* may have information that will lead back to your ancestor's origins.

WHERE TO LOOK

Using resources in Victoria at the State Library, Victorian Public Record Office, Genealogical Society of Victoria, Australian Institute of Genealogical Studies, Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages, Cemeteries and local municipal libraries it is possible to trace relatives to the present day.

When visiting research centres for the first time check the how to do it manuals and catalogues. Try making a list of items to search before starting a session, with a set of goals more will be accomplished. It is necessary to know as much as you can about the family to be researched before starting the process.

The usual starting point is with Birth, Marriage and Death Indexes and certificates. Compulsory Civil Registration commenced in Victoria on 1 July 1853 and it included the option of registering earlier events. Prior to this time churches recorded baptisms, marriages and burials. The Victorian Indexes to Births, Deaths and Marriages cover different periods - births 1853-1913, marriages 1853-1930 and deaths 1853-1980. Depending on how common the surname copy out all the entries under that name. The birth, death and marriage indexes are the core of the research.

The Victorian Pioneers Index 1837-1888 is a consolidated index of births, deaths marriages and early church records. It contains similar information as the Indexes to Births, Deaths and Marriages but all events are grouped together by surname then Christian name.

Many of the Parish records have been transcribed and have indexes so it is easy to locate names. It is worth checking as many indexes as possible one never knows where baptisms, marriages or burials took place. Parish records cover events before and after civil registration.

The early church records (for an example see page 10) commence 1 January 1837 and end 30 June 1853. They cover baptisms, marriages and burials in the Port Phillip District of the Colony of New South Wales up to 1851 when the area became the Colony of Victoria. The records should be used in conjunction with the Pioneers Index.


..... and finally - please don't mention a word of this to Nina or Margaret before the Muster!! Any guilty party will be banished from the society for life!

East Indies Connections

or

A Riot of a Very Damaging Nature

(largely based on information provided by George Buxton M003)



The East India Company was possibly the greatest collection of merchant adventurers. It was granted its charter on 31 December 1600 by Elizabeth I with "exclusive right to trade with the East". Initially the Company had to compete with the Dutch, French Spanish and other European countries trying to exploit the riches of the lands of the Indian sub-continent and the islands and archipelagos of the China Sea. After a number of set backs in the Far East the Company tended to concentrate on the Indian sub-continent and in February 1640 built its first viable location in Madras at Fort St George. Even then the Company teetered on the edge of extinction with only twenty five officers and men in 1655. However from this low point the Company began to rise to its place of pre-eminence during the 1700's.

This collection of merchants and their appointed civil servants, known as Factors who acted on their behalf were the backbone of the Company. As time wore on the their rules became established and in 1672 the first corporate livery (uniform) was adopted. The method of appointment after 1714 was by a system of patronage exercised by a Court of Directors. These directors appointed the civil servants and each had a annual patronage quota in relation to his seniority. The age limit was fixed in 1784 at 15 to 18 or 25 for those who had spent a year in the army.

As befits a clan who were always ranked with the first families of the land, the Metcalfes were also heavily involved in India. One of the first mentions is in

1681 of Charles Metcalfe in Madras. (George Buxton has uncovered a great deal of information which will be used in future issues of the Mecca News.)

As the traditions of the Company grew the training methods also expanded. However after nearly two hundred years of existence the need for reform was evident and pressure built up from those in India. In 1800 Lord Wellesley founded the first overseas college based on the Oxford and Cambridge models to provide a three year course. The idea for a college overseas soon proved impracticable and so a site was sought in England. Initially the Court of Directors took a lease on Hertford Castle in 1806 but they quickly decided they needed something more suitable, so the nearby Haileybury estate on Hertford Heath was purchased. Haileybury was refurbished with the help of the designer William Wilkins, who was later to become the architect of the National Gallery. In 1809 the College opened for its first students.

The pupils entered at about the age of 16 provided they knew 'Two Latin classics, the Greek testament, principles of grammar and canon rules of arithmetic'. The three year curriculum covered history, law, maths, military tactics and Oriental languages. Fees were 100 guineas per annum.

The Reverend Dr Samuel Henly was the College's headmaster from 1805 to 1815 but ragging at both Hertford and Haileybury "verged on the sadistic". Hertford was "painted red" on a number of occasions and the professors were routinely pelted by the students when going between classes. In 1811 the College suffered it most serious outbreak of lawlessness when a riot took place. Needless to say one of the ringleaders was a Metcalfe!

"On 8 November 1811 *a riot of a very damaging nature* broke out in the East India College during which nearly ninety young men, many of them of the first families of the country participated in acts of the atrocious nature." So the report from the Rev Dr Henly to the East India Court on 14 November stated. Even at that stage there was still some ferment as the students were apparently planning to "proceed in a body" to the College the following day. However by the time the East India Court sat on 12 December 1811 the College was relatively calm.

Before the Court were the five ringleaders including Thomas Theophilus Metcalfe son of Sir Thomas Theophilus Metcalfe, a College committee member. His brother Charles Theophilus Metcalfe was also at Haileybury at the same time but appears to have played only a minor role as he was not harangued by the Court. The examination of the riot's instigators Messrs Farmer, Metcalfe, Hayes, Marstack and Drury lasted through the remainder of December into January 1812 before on 22nd of that month, after all their past misdemeanours had also been considered, the Court passed its decision. All five were expelled.

It must have come as a great surprise and a shock to these young men and undoubtedly there was a great deal of lobbying behind the scenes for less than three months later on 8 April a motion was voted by the Court to grant amnesty to the ringleaders. This was accepted with great alacrity by Thomas Theophilus as at the Court's meeting a week later his letter "expressing grateful acknowledgement for the Court's clemency" had been received. However the matter rumbled on for a while longer with some of the College committee in dispute with the decision to give clemency but this disagreement did not affect the revised decision and Thomas Theophilus went on to a career in India.

Haileybury remained the College for the East India Company's civil servants for another 46 years (until 31 January 1858) but the writing was already on the wall. The Company's monopoly was being challenged and the Indian Mutiny spelled its death knell with its disbandonment occurring shortly after the closure of the College.

ROYALIST METCALFES

Supplied by Mrs Delphine McDonnell M497

I read with interest in the March 1996 issue of the Family Tree magazine, an account by Robert Daniel about various records pertaining to the 17th c. Civil War. The article gave the PRO reference to many Civil War sources including indexed records of petitions to have lands, which were sequestered by the Commonwealth, returned to the original Royalist owner. I engaged a professional researcher to obtain these records, filed under SP24, concerning the Metcalfe name then I abstracted the Metcalfe entries (from printed pages of a 19th C book of the original documents) and provided a copy for the Society. Below are brief details.

Wicked Bailiff

In reading Burt & Grady's 'Illustrated History of Leeds' 1994, I came across John Metcalfe who was the 'wicked bailiff there in the early 17th century who appropriated much of the rent of the Moot Hall to himself when it should have been used for the relief of the needy. Even more he disregarded the custom that corn levied as a toll should be used substantially for the poor as well as for the repair of the highways and market. He was also reported by the church for failure to attend and this seems to have been connected to his encouragement of drinking and merry making at the St Bartholomew's Day rush bearing ceremony.

The Red Hall was built in 1628 for Alderman Thomas Metcalfe on a site which became Schofields. There was another John Metcalfe in 1846 who was Chairman of the Board of Guardians.

Do any of our members claim (acknowledge might be a better word) any of these ancestors or do they know any more about these interesting characters?

Irene Baker M758 writes "When I joined the Metcalfe Society three years ago, little did I realise just how fortunate I was going to be. My joining coincided with the start of the research into the Metcalfe family in India, where members of my family had lived and worked since 1829.

My great great Grandfather was Henry Cranston Metcalfe who was a judge. When he died he left to his son - Henry Howe Metcalf "My family pedigree which is emblazoned and on rollers to be held by him for use and reference by each and all of my children". Henry Howe in turn left it to his son Cranston William who again left it to his son Percy Ignatious Howe Metcalfe.

The Borthwick Institute of Historical Research, St. Anthony's Hall Peasholme Green, York YO1 2PW. 201904 642315. Has copies of parish register transcripts for most of Yorkshire, parish registers for the Archdeaconry of York and most of the Yorkshire marriage bonds.

East Riding Archive Office, County Archives and Record Service, County Hall, Champney Road, Beverley HU17 9BA. **☎**01482 885005. Wide range of items including parish records.

Wakefield Local Studies, Balne Lane Wakefield. ☎01924 371231. Has over 32,000 items including trade directories, poll books, census returns and the Wakefield census of 1723.

There are also record offices in Sheffield, Middlesborough Doncaster and Barnsley plus reference libraries in Hull, Rotherham and Todmorden.

HOLY TRINITY WENSLEY and other Wensleydal Churches

Previous articles in this series have covered the churches within the ancient parish of Aysgarth - namely Aysgarth itself, Askrigg and Hawes. However there is another old parish to the east of Aysgarth - Wensley

Wensley was the market town of the dale until it was ravaged by plague in the 16th Century. The amrket was moved to Leyburn and the village lost its commercial importance but still remained the local religious centre. Whilst Wensley is cut by the, at times busy, Leyburn to Hawes road the village itself sits semmingly serene in the dale that bears its name. It has the rare privilege of a village naming the dale rather than the river running through it.

The parish church (dedicated to the Holy Trinity) lies to the south of the road and is one of the few missed by the great Victorian renovations which changed, and in many instances destroyed the character of the churches they were supposed to "improve". The present church was erected in 1245 on the site of a Saxon Church. Its

tower was rebuilt in 1719 but the original remains largely intact. When entering the church for the first time one gets an impression of a dark interior but there are many nuggets to brighten the gloom.

The church has a number of artifacts originally located at Easby Abbey and brought to Wensley after the Dissolution of the monastic houses in the 1530's. Amongst them is a wooden rood screen (not as impressive as Aysgarth but worthy of a look nonetheless), pre-reformation nave seats and a large wooden box known as a reliquary. Supposedly the only one in England it is thought to have held the relics of St Agatha. The choir stalls date back to 1527 and were made by craftsmen from Ripon Cathedral whilst the family pew of the Scropes of Castle Bolton is also in the church. The two decker pulpit (original a three decker) has seen many preachers amongst them John Wesley (1743) and Oswald Metcalfe, rector in the 1540's. Well worth an hour of your time.

There are a number of other churches in mid-Wensleydale including Bellarby,

Leyburn, West Witton, Redmire and Castle Bolton. The first two are relatively new both being built in the 19th century. West Witton is mainly 19th century with some 16th century aspectsbut by far and away the oldest are St Oswald's at Castle Bolton and St Mary's at Redmire.

St Oswald's lies in the shadow (literally) of Castle Bolton and pre-dates the castle. It is a simple building with no break between chancel and nave. At one end of the church is the colourful window dedicated to the wife of the 4th Baron Bolton. Built about 1325 the remnants of a beamed roof is evidence of an older history back before the 12th century. Although close to the castle there is a certain serenity in the

church.

About half a mile from the centre of Redmire village down a small lane and not seemingly part of the village it serves, lies the Church of St Mary the Virgin. Built about 1150 the windows have shards of old glass depicting the shields of the Nevilles and Scropes. Another of the churches restored by the Victorians in 1894 its beauty does not seem to have been adversly affected. Here near the main door of the church lying against the wall is a gravestone to two Metcalfe children. The stone reads "Here lies the bodies of Leonard and Isabella Metcalfe. He departed this life April 3, 1761 aged 9(?) years and she 20th March 1766 aged 11. All you that come our" (the remainder is inelligible).

A second gravestone records "James Metcalfe who died November 15(?) 1864(?) aged 64

years also Elizabeth Metcalfe wife of the above died August 6(?) 1837 aged 37(?) years. Also John Metcalfe their son who died November (?) 1824 aged 3 weeks. Also Margaret Metcalfe their daughter who died March 17, 1823 (?) age 3 years. " (The next series will cover churches in Swaledale any contributions to the Editor as soon as possible.)

WILLIAM METCALF POTTER OF LINTHORPE

(In the Mecca News Issue 52 we featured an item about the potter William Metcalf. Now we have received further information from Alison Collin M894.)

William Metcalf was my grandfather's brother and a potter at the Linthorpe pottery before moving on to the Crown Derby works. I never met him but my uncle Harold Edwin Metcalf owned several pieces purported to be from him, one of which is now in my possession. The ones that I remember best from my childhood were creations of bisque porcelain of the most incredibly delicate structure. My favourite was a complete bridal bouquet which was mounted on a pedestal and covered with a glass dome. Alas, I fear it must have got broken, as through the years it somehow disappeared. The piece that I possess is of a posy of flowers, again in white unglazed porcelain and consisting of a rose, cornflower, lily of the valley and stephanotis in a beautiful arrangement, mounted on brown velvet in a deep picture frame. The flowers are life sized and every petal of the cornflower delicately quilled, impressions of the potters thumb are just discernible on the rose petals and the lily of the valley are amazingly realistic.

Unfortunately the piece is not signed but was given to me as a family heirloom and I have no reasons to doubt that it was by him. My uncle told me "Uncle Willie did beautiful work" and anyone who has struggled to make a lopsided pot in pottery classes could only marvel that anything so delicate could be created in clay!

My cousin **Sheila Metcalf M78** has painstakingly transcribed my Grandfathers diaries running from 1876 to 1810. After hours of research she found that William is buried in a pauper's grave a sad ending indeed. The diaries give a wonderful insight into life at the end of the 19th century and mention many of the Metcalf's around Middlesbrough and Ebberston. Extracts from the diaries mention William but stop abruptly in 1902 when he was going through hard times. If anyone can shed more light on his later life or his works I should love to hear about it.

Here are a few extracts from the diaries: (William was born in 1864)

1880 May 11 Willie commenced work at the Linthorpe Art Pottery

1883 May 21 My brother got a 5/- rise at the pottery, is now getting 13/- per week

1883 Aug 16 Willie took over Tooth & Ault's pottery

1889 Apr 20 Willie arrived from Derby

 $1890\,\mathrm{Apr}\,9$ Gave Mr Stevens a St Cecilia modelled by Willie and framed in oak

1891 May 3 Willie and Rosa (Fogg) married at Derby yesterday.

1892 Apr 11 Willie working half time for 8 weeks.

1894 July 13 Willie has notice (with many others) to leave

1902 Dec 26 Willie moved to Stoke

Found Dead in a Wood

Mr George Metcalfe of Pateley Bridge who had been missing since the previous Sunday night and for who's discovery £20 was offered, was found dead on Friday night in a wood at Ravensgill, one of the most attractive parts of Nidderdale and about a mile from his residence. The body was accidentally discovered by a man who was out for a walk with his wife. It had been previously been passed by a search party.

At the inquest Herbert W Metcalfe stated the deceased was his brother aged 39 years. He last saw him on Saturday night at 11 o'clock when he left his brother reading a book downstairs. The following morning he knocked on the bedroom door when there was no reply he entered and found nothing had been disturbed. From then until his body was returned they had not heard from him. The coroner then asked for a post mortem to be carried out. The result showed the body had not suffered from any fatal disease or external wound and death was due to syncope. (*Pears Cyclopaedia - 59 th edition 1949 says the condition of syncope is a loss of consciousness due to a lack of blood to the brain caused by exhaustion or emotion.*)

A revolver was found on the body with letters, field glasses and keys. The letters were gone through in the presence of the deceased's brother but nothing in them had any bearing on the case. It was stated that a rumour had been started that he had lost money in stocks and shares. However it appears he had never dealt in them.

Summing up the coroner said finding the revolver in the pocket of the deceased led to a lot of suspicion - the findings of the post mortem removed this. The jury returned the verdict - The deceased was found dead and died from syncope.

HAWES in 1754

M805 Arthur Metcalfe tells us that in 1754 there were 210 families in Hawes, Wensleydale and according to a local clergyman of the time, there were no Papists, 10 Quakers, 12 Methodists and 188 Church of England.

The Council of Family Societies

As you can see from the inside cover of the Mecca News, the Metcalfe Society is a member of a few family history organisations. Have a quick look because I am sure most of you will have by-passed these references to get to the juicy bits of the journal - we know how eager many of you are!

In my capacity of chairman, as I represent the Metcalfe Society, I will give you an insight, albeit personal, into what these organisations are, why we are affiliated to them, and how they can benefit the Metcalfe Society. So my first port of call has been to attend the Council of Family Societies meeting on Saturday 8 November 1997 at the new Family Records Centre in Islington, London. The location proved to be an added incentive to attend. So although I only live 40+ miles west of London, like 90% of you, I never really go to London!

Founded in 1993, today there are 14 one name/family societies in the council - Bliss, Davidson, Hamley, Harmer, Metcalfe, Stockdill, Swinnerton, Witheredge, represented at the meeting, whereas Alderson, Appleby, Beresford, Courtenary, Grubb, Martin & Morgan were unable to attend.

Whereas the Metcalfe Society coordinates, produces and makes available information of interest and value to its members, the objectives of the council is as described by the title of its newsletter - "Forum" - it is a forum for one name societies of a similar nature to share ideas and problems, and help each other. So I percieve it to be more of a 'listen & learn' than an 'action' council. As I have not attended such meetings before, I was surprised and proud to discover that, together with the Beresford Society, we are the largest one-name society in terms of number of members, skills and resources available, what we have produced and made available to members etc.

Societies have members ranging from 40 to 400+ (us!). The examples that some of the societies outlined in their summary of what they are doing today certainly reminded me of our own society history, for example, moving from a card index to a computer database, development of an A4 or A5 newsletter, ideas to generate funds etc. The term '....got the t-shirt' comes to mind!

So what can the Metcalfe Society offer the Council and its members, and how can the Metcalfe Society benefit from being a member of the Council of Family Societies? The biggest thing we can offer the council is recounting experiences of why we did something one way as opposed to another. This will help the smaller societies avoid the pitfalls and so further their own development for the benefit of their own members, for example, ideas for generating funds besides subscriptions can be done through merchandising (Metcalfe Society badges, Nappa Hall & Coat of Arms pictures etc).

So how can the Metcalfe Society benefit? As one of the largest one name

societies, personally, I believe it is our duty to participate in this larger 'family' We all need to help each other - no one in any of the societies does it for profit or gain - purely out of love for the subject. Participating in just this one meeting has made me realise that as a society, we are going in the right direction. I found out about a number of specific 'snippets' that could help us in various projects:

- * Did you know that BT publish a disc which will provide names of Metcalfes everywhere......(get info and correct details from Stockdill paper)
- * I received a copy of the new "From the Desktop" guidance on creating and publishing newsletters for one name societies. We know Peter Dobson has done a super job on the look and content of the Mecca News as justified by being a finalist in the Elizabeth Simpson Award last year. But there may be even a little something here that Peter could use!
- * The message came across loud and clear that the Internet is definitely a good route for finding potential new members given the experiences todate. We are currently exploring proposals for the society venturing on to the world wide web.

The council is planning to resurrect the "Forum" courtesy of the skills and resources of Roy Stockdill of the Stockdill Society. We will endeavour to provide articles wherever possible.

So we live and learn by our own, and experiences of others. The Metcalfe Society will continue to send a representative to these council meetings (diaries & commitments permitting of course), and we will share with you any news and actions in the future. Lookout for an insight into the Federation of Family History Societies in the next issue of Mecca News as I represent the Metcalfe Society at the Federation AGM!



A DAY OUT IN METCALFE COUNTRY COURTESY OF YORKSHIRE TELEVISION.

I always said I would never do it - but - last night saw the beginning AND THE END of my career in television! Those of you who have seen themselves on the "box" may understand. As usual it was my enthusiastic wish to spread the word that allowed Katy Metcalfe to persuade me to appear in the first of a short series on "Surnames" which began last night on the Yorkshire TV "Tonight" programme. It entailed a full day's outing to Nappa Hall, the Rose and Crown in Bainbridge and to the Coach House in Northallerton - mainly in wind and rain.

It was all very exciting and after trying to promote our Society, I tried to right some of the misinterpretations that have arisen over the years with the various "stories". This included the tale of the 300 Metcalfes on White Horses which rode into York led by Sir Christopher Metcalfe. Although I mentioned that, a) they were not ALL bearing the surname of Metcalfe and that, b) the horses they rode were more likely to be Yorkshire Greys - the original story was repeated. But then Metcalfes always did like a GOOD tale!

You may not believe it but this was the first time I had been to Nappa Hall. On a cloudy wet day it was looking very grey and cold with wellies imperative. Trying to imagine life there in the days of long dresses made me fully appreciate our modern fashions, washing machines and central heating. Mrs Thompson brought out four large mugs of welcome hot coffee and wedges of fruit cake which we enjoyed whilst looking at the Hall.



I don't know what steps are taken to preserve these old buildings - perhaps someone in the Society can tell me. Although it appeared fairly sound, obviously (in parts) it is in a dangerous condition - hence the ban on entering.

Our next stop was at the Rose and Crown in Bainbridge where we were welcomed into a cosy bar with a roaring fire. After the interviews were over, the two horns were filmed. It was unfortunate that no-one could be found to give us their full history although other facts came to light after the day.

The day came to an end at the Porch House in Northallerton which is still open for bed and breakfast accommodation by the new owners, Mr & Mrs Beardow, whose greeting very quickly made us feel at home. The brief views shown on the television could not do justice to the air of welcome in such beautiful surroundings. I can think of no better place to stay if you were wanting to do research at the Northallerton County Record Office.

My day was full of surprises. Katy Metcalfe was at her best helping us all with great patience - the cameraman and the sound recordist, both of whom had, occasionally, to double as furniture removers, Gaynor Barnes asking the questions and myself bungling along. Amazing the amount of time it all takes, after being out for over 10 hours there was still the editing and cutting to do and all for seven minutes viewing!

Update 31 March 1998

At the Metcalfe Society Committee Meeting on 28 March 1998 the Committee agreed to proceed with the publication of the Metcalfe book. The project which has been in progress for the last three years and led by Warwick Metcalfe (M256) is in the final stages of completion. Warwick and his Book committee have been putting the finishing touches to the book and subject to final scrutiny over the next six weeks will have finished their mammoth task of writing a history of the family from early times.

The concerns regarding the financial situation have largely disappeared as a result of the excellent response from the membership. To proceed with the printing of the book it was agreed at the AGM that at least 250 pre-paid copies should be requested by members otherwise the printing would not proceed. The response has been such that by 28 March the monies for 325 books had been received, with more orders being received daily. This endorsement by the membership has meant that the monies collected and currently available through Society funds will enable the order for the book to be placed in the next few weeks. Thank you to all of you who have made the commitment to purchase the book.

When looking for a title it was decided that those purchasing the book should have an input. The Committee was seeking a title which would reflect the special nature of the Metcalfe family (and its derivatives) yet at the same time appeal to a wider audience. At the Book committee's meeting on 27 March the title which met those aims was decided as METCALFE - History of a Clan. The closest submission was Metcalfe - The Story of a Clan. The titles had been provided - as shown on the reverse - without the names of those submitting them. There was a great deal of interest in discovering who had supplied the title and it was revealed that the person was none other than Vera Adams M002!

The book is to be launched at this year's MECCA MUSTER at Ripon on 10 October. Those that have preordered their copy and who are at the Muster will receive it on the day. Those unable to be present will receive their copy as soon as possible after the Muster. As part of the Muster celebrations there will be a Muster dinner, probably at the Ripon Spa Hotel on the evening of October 10. If you wish to be present please let your Secretary Nina Benson know by 1 August 1998 (or sooner if possible).

It is pleasing to know that all the hard work that has been put into the Book now appears to be bearing fruit and more details will appear in the August edition of the Mecca News.


