Hipswell Mill - Part II

(Continued from Issue 55 - August 1998. In part I Lynda described her links to the mill and her failure to gain English Heritage's approval to list the building as an archeological treasure.)

In 1996, on my annual trip to North East England I stayed in Hipswell with Rosemary Munn. The MOD allowed me an internal viewing of the mill. **Warwick** (M256) and Jean Metcalfe joined me and gave encouragement to reapply for a listing - this time enclosing photographs of the machinery. A second refusal seemed impossible for stepping into Hipswell Mill was like a hundred years step back in time. Ladders in use at St John's Church until the fire of 1811, were to be seen along with the original feeding stalls and the milling machinery. English Heritage promised a review. I was to make immediate contact should the mill be in jeopardy. Months passed.

It was 1997, Rosemary phoned. She had seen surveyors at the mill. I called English Heritage because anything could happen. They said they "would look into the matter". I returned from work the next day to the best message my answer phone has ever delivered - "Mrs Simpson I am pleased to inform you that Hipswell Mill was listed Category Two today". A surprising number of people viewed this event as being the end of the story. To me it was just the beginning. Further protection and maintenance were imperative.

My third autumnal visit to the mill and "Muster" followed. Deterioration in the mill was devastating. Everywhere there was evidence of vandalism. In its isolated position the old mill was in need of urgent protection. I spoke to Hipswell Parish Council and received genuine enthusiasm and support. Fund sources are to be investigated and a meeting is to be held between North Yorkshire County Council, Richmond Council, Hipswell Parish Council and the MOD with a view to purchase and restoration providing the area with a building housing a way of life which, according to an document dated 1228, has continued on the site for eight hundred years.

This article will I hope require an update. My greatest joy would be the following entries in future Mecca News':-

2000 - As we enter our third millennium the old mill on an ancient site at Hipswell has been refurbished and preserved for future generations.

2228 - Hipswell Millennium. During the course of this year celebrations took place marking 1000 years of corn grinding and water milling on the site of the old mill at Hipswell. Anyone interested in the family who lived there for over 250 of those years contact The Metcalfe Society.

Hipswell Mill Update

Further to the recent articles, Lynda approached The Metcalfe Society requesting help - in any shape or form possible, but more specifically for support that the society could provide as a registered charity in applying for a lottery grant.

From the Metcalfe heritage perspective, the society committee agrees with Lynda on the importance of Hipswell Mill, along with Nappa Hall. However, the question was raised that irrespective of the building in question, is the Metcalfe Society the right sort of organisation, charitable or non-charitable, given our constitution, to be looking into the feasibility of trying to maintain an historic building. We are not, after all, a Buildings Preservation Trust (BPT), and according to the lottery application pack (section 7.4 for those of you who are further interested), our constitution must state that we are a BPT, to be even eligible for a Heritage Lottery Grant. But as none of the committee have any expertise in this area whatsoever, they invited Lynda to present her work to date at the AGM, and to request the members' ideas and views. The members were then asked to vote as to whether or not the society should explore the feasibility of supporting a BPT project, or even becoming a BPT.

After her excellent presentation, obviously coming from the heart, Lynda received many suggestions and ideas as to other potential routes for support. After putting it to the vote, the meeting gave its consent to the Committee to examine the implications of possibly becoming a Buildings Preservation Trust so that a report on the feasibility could be presented at next year's AGM. Warwick **Metcalfe (M256)** has offered his support to Lynda in performing this feasibility project. We look forward to receiving their findings next year, which we will report to you.



Earby, September 1998 - some insights into another six hour meeting!

Chairman: Diane Howarth reflected on the Societys keen anticipation of the book launch at the Muster. Besides this, her main work had been in representing the society at Federation and Council meetings, where she had found the Metcalfe Society to have a good reputation.

Computer Index: The database now stands at about 70,000 records.

Secretary: The membership number reached is 967, with about 460 active members. Preparations are under way for the transfer of sections of the Secretary role to David Galloway, Carol Arkwright and to Diane.

Treasurer: Margaret Metcalfe was on holiday but had submitted a comprehensive written report. It was felt that the subscription rate for next year should remain at its current rate.

Mecca News: Peter Dobson was congratulated by the Committee on the Mecca News having been shortlisted for the Elizabeth Simpson Award for the second year running, the only one name society to have achieved this. Peter thanked members for the increase in the number of articles he is receiving and he hopes this will continue. More letters / snippets on matters of interest would be appreciated. The December issue of the Mecca News will be a larger edition to celebrate the publication of Metcalfe – History of the Clan

Publications: We all await **the** book!

Sales / Library: Files to hold certificates will be available for sale.

Covenant Secretary: Unfortunately, owing to personal reasons, Val Metcalfe has had to resign this role. The Committee extended their thanks for all her hard work in this job.

Federation of Family History Societies: Diane Howarth had represented the Society at the April and September meetings.

North West Group of FHS: Peter Dobson and David Lambert had represented the Society at the 21st anniversary celebration in Kendal in June. Next years North West Fair is to be held at the Preston Guildhall on 30th October.

North East Group of FHS: Nina Benson had represented the Society at the North East groups stand at the Yorkshire Show.

GRO Collection: Births have been recorded up to 1927, marriages to 1923 and deaths to 1922. Patrick Malham would like to hear from any members who would like to contribute to this work.

Internet: The Societys domain on the Internet has now been registered and Diane is working with Susan Metcalfe Harper in Canada on details of the web page.

Metcalfe History Book: Warwick Metcalfe reported on the final stages of the publication process. Advance orders are going well, with about 400 placed. The launch of the book at the Muster will be a landmark occasion for the Society.

AGM / Muster: Preparations are well in hand for this years Muster on 10th October. with 77 places already booked. Margaret Condon, the Reverend Thomas Metcalfes granddaughter, and Barbara Smailes, the photographer for the book, will be invited as the Societys guests.

The next meeting will be on Saturday, 6th March, 1999 at Earby.

Pay your membership subscription the easy way

It is so easy to forget to pay bills, payments and subscriptions on time - we all do it at one time or another. Each year the society has to send out many reminders to our members who have not paid their subscriptions by 31st January. We regularly have at least 50 members who respond to these reminders who have merely forgotten to pay. So to help you, and to help the society maintain members, we are now able to offer a solution - but only to our UK members at the moment, due to the UK bank clearing system.

UK members will now be able to set up a standing order with their own bank to pay the membership subscription on a specific date each year directly to the Metcalfe Society's bank account. So you can set it up now to pay your 1999 subscriptions and not worry about paying subscriptions again. The only times in the future you would need to change the standing order would be if you wished to cancel your membership or the amount of money paid on the standing order needs to be altered (eg you wish to change the type of membership or the society increases the subscription amounts).

To help you setup this standing order we have created a standard form for you to complete and send to YOUR bank. Some banks may wish you to complete their own forms instead, but most will accept the enclosed form duly completed, as it will provide all of the information your bank requires to setup the standing order for you.

So all you have to do is complete the form that is included with the Mecca News and send it to YOUR bank - it couldn't be easier.

Have you paid your membership subscription in advance?

Some members (UK & overseas) have already paid their subscription in advance for 1999 and sometimes beyond and so do not need to pay in January 1999 (be it by standing order or via cheque). Please look on the back of the Standing Order Mandate form. Here you will find a list of those members who have paid their subs for future years. If your number appears on the list there is no need to send any subs (unless you want to pay even further in advance - the advantage being that you pay all future years at the current rate).

Retiring Chairman's Report

Some people think that 18 is when you come of age, and some people acknowledge 21 as this momentous occasion. At the Mecca Muster this year, The Metcalfe Society was 18 years old, and certainly came of age. This year, the Muster was the most important date in the history of the society since its inception. The launch of the book Metcalfe - History of the Clan is a momentous occasion in itself, but given that a few members of the society were able to deliver such a quality product certainly recognises the maturity of the society as a whole. None of the individuals could have delivered the book on their own, but the book team as a whole - the sum of the individuals, brought their personal skills to this project to deliver this exceptional book. This maturity was also shown in the vast array of facilities, merchandise, support, and offerings available at the Muster that day - never before have we been able to deliver so many things to our members at a Muster.

As you all know, we have been quite devious over the last few months, and I have to thank all of you who provided a tribute to Nina - I was very happy to present a book containing over 100 tributes to a very surprised Nina at the end of the AGM, along with flowers and the post of Honorary Vice President of the Metcalfe Society - a proposal that was accepted unanimously by the members attending the AGM.

Nina has now officially retired as secretary, but it will take the next year of transition to pass over her workload and responsibilities to 3 people - Carol Arkwright, David Galloway and myself. In order that we can get the work done, I am stepping down as Chairman and moving across to attempt to follow-on from Nina to be the new secretary of the Metcalfe Society. By no means could I say that I am taking over from Nina, because I do not have even a small percentage of the knowledge that she has. Nina will be the society's "Archivist" and will be doing the searches for new and existing members, thereby allowing David Metcalfe to focus on entering the data into our databases.

May I thank you for your support over the last two years and may I ask you to continue with your support to the new Chairman - David Lambert, previously our Vice President, and the current Chairman of the Federation of Family History Societies.

By Their Misdemeanours Shall Ye Know Them from Mrs Rosemary Brown M756

Anthony Metcalfe was born in 1733 and baptised at St Oswald's Church Ravenstonedale on October 13th: "Anthony illegitimate son to Agnes Meckow". The Bishop's Transcripts add that he was "o Brackenber" a farm just above Brownber. The odd spelling of Metcalfe is difficult to understand as it occurs nowhere else.

The parish registers up to this time contain few Metcalfe entries. Notably on 9th February 1582/3 "was baptised Maybell the daughter to John Medcalfe, fornicator". No mincing of words there! There were no further entries until 1639 when Isabell, a daughter of Roger Medcalf was baptised, he had two more children, Mary in 1650 and Wilyame in 1652. In 1679/80 Christopher Medcalfe was baptised, the son of Mr John Medcalfe, who appears to have been the schoolmaster. Over in the neighbouring parish of Orton in March 1715/16 George Metcalfe married Isabel Morland.

It is likely that Agnes Metcalfe came across the border from West Yorkshire; it is unlikely that she wandered in on her own. Parishes were wary of unattached females who might become a burden upon the parish. It is possible that she was connected to Thomas and Margaret Metcalfe whose names occur for the first time in an entry in the Ravenstonedale register of baptisms on 12 August 1733, "Thomas Metcalfe was baptised on August 12th, son of Thomas and Margaret Metcalfe o Brounber". Subsequently they had three more sons, all of whom died. On 26th July 1742 Agnes married William Adamthwaite, they had three children before he died. She may have then married a John Tarlton both of Town, on 15th November 1757.

Who then was Anthony's father? Until recently it had been thought he was of Nappa Hall descent. In a book entitled "Family Notes and Reminiscences" by Mary A Metcalfe Gibson, published in Kendal in 1899 there are several allusions to a Nappa Hall connection. In particular there is a description of the Arms and Crest of the Metcalfe family which was inscribed on the tombstone of Frances Metcalfe, who was second daughter of Anthony Metcalfe of Park House Ravenstonedale. She died on 18th November 1880, aged 59 and was interred at St Peter's Church, Halliwell, Bolton le Moors, Lancashire. However the Anthony in question was born at a different time and the dates do not match.

The Reverend Robert Weston Metcalfe, Vicar of Ravenstonedale and his wife Margaret Wearing Sewart discovered the truth sometime after their marriage in

Sedbergh in 1875. They investigated their respective family trees and discovered they were distantly related. Their common ancestor was Anthony Robinson but they discreetly kept this information to themselves merely hinting at the relationship in a letter which Robert wrote to his brother Edward Parr Metcalfe.

Anthony Robinson was a blacksmith, who lived at Brownber in 1733. He had already married Elizabeth Wharton in February 1732/33. She had their first child, Anne in 1733, baptised 8th of October. This was within a few days of the baptism of Anthony Robinson's unofficial son, Anthony Metcalfe. Margaret Metcalfe, wife of Reverend Robert Weston Metcalfe, was descended from the legitimate line, whilst he was descended from the illegitimate line. No one would have thanked him for revealing the truth at that time.

The proof of all of this can be found in the records of the Westmorland Quarter Sessions held at Michaelmas in 1733. Kendal Record Office has a series of volumes which contain synopses of these records, commencing in 1726 until 1810. The original record is in beautiful handwriting which is perfectly easy to read. Here it is:-

MEMORANDUM that on the third day of September one thousand seven hundred thirty and three and in the seventh year of the reigne of our Sovereigne Lord King George the second Anthony Robinson of Brownbarr Blacksmith and George Jackson of Dovengill slater and John Robinson of Dovengill yeoman, all in the Parish of Ravenstonedale and county aforesaid personally came before me Robert Lowther esgr one of his majesty's justices of the peace appointed in and for the said county and acknowledged themselves indebted to our Sovereigne Lord the King, namely the abovesaid Anthony Robinson in twenty pound and the abovesaid George Jackson and John Robinson severally in ten pounds of good and lawfull money of Great Brittain separately to be made levied of their goods and chattels land and tenements to the use of our Sovereigne Lord the King of his heirs and successours, if the aforesaid Anthony Robinson do not perform the condition below writt, the condition of this recognizance is such that whereas the above bounden Anthony Robinson is charged by Agnes Metcalfe of the parish of Ravenstonedale and county of Westmorland singlewoman, that he had carnall knowledge of her body at severall times and that the said Agnes Metcalfe is now by child by him the said Anthony Robinson which when born will be a bastard. If therefore the said Anthony Robinson shall personally appear before his majesties justices of the peace at their next general quarter sessions to be holden at Appleby for the county of Westmorland then and there to abide and receive what shall be enjoined by the said court concerning the premisses and in the meantime to be of good behaviour that then the condition of this recognizance to be void or else remain in full power force and virtue.

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Some scribbled writing underneath is difficult to read but appears to make a note that he will appear in "sessions next after this". What I believe it means is that Anthony Robinson, together with a relative and a friend, had to pledge forty pounds to the court as a bond or surety that he would appear at the next Quarter Sessions and abide by the conditions imposed upon him. By this time the baby would have been born. However if it had died, or been stillborn, presumably, no further action would be taken. I have found no further reference to this matter in the next session but this needs to be rechecked to confirm the position.

Anthony Robinson and his wife Elizabeth Wharton had ten children altogether. He died at Garshill in 1783 aged 76 a pauper.

As one mystery is solved another appears. Who was Agnes Metcalfe? Where did she come from? If anyone has an Agnes in their family trees born somewhere between 1700 and 1715, who unaccountably disappeared I would be extremely pleased to hear from them, particularly if she had a brother called Thomas.

Finally if anyone else has a missing ancestor they should investigate the Westmorland Quarter Sessions Records, if they have not already done so. They are easy to use and full of fascinating material.

Note: As Mrs Brown says Quarter Sessions are a fertile area for family historians. It is hoped to undertake an article setting out the usefulness of this source in a future issue of the News - Editor.

Launch of The Book

After three years of hard work and nearly twenty years of existence, the Metcalfe Society has produced a book of which we can all be proud, and at the Muster on the 10th of October we reached the 'sold' number of 430.

Only 320 to go before the last copy of 'Metcalfe - History of the Clan' becomes a cherished heirloom!

Going, ... going...

In two overburdened cars, three-quarters of a ton of books were taken to our postal agents in York and to eager Metcalfes in Ripon; each book of nearly one and a half kilograms looking quite impressive in its blue leathercloth cover and plasticised colour jacket. By early Saturday morning copies were displayed on show on a special stand erected on the dais in the large hall where the Muster and AGM were held.

Several special presentations marked both the occasion and also some of the hard work that has gone into this production in so many ways over the past months and years.

Our two founder members, Mary Metcalfe (see the drawing on page 71 of the Book) and Vera Adams (very strangely the suggester of the title picked by the Book Committee, who did not know the name of the suggester until afterwards) were the recipients of copies of the book (given by the Society) in a red leather binding (donated by the President), as were Helen Offer, Nina Benson (both Vice Presidents), the 'book photographer', Barbara Smailes and Margaret Condon, the provider of so much useful material which originated from her grandfather the Reverend Thomas Metcalfe author of 'Medecalf'.

A sad and sorry story of trouble and strife within the book committee then emerged in a tale told to the assembled Muster who found it difficult to believe that committee life was not all tea and biscuits. Apparently over the past year or so a suggestion for the title of the book was consistently put forward by one member to the other five and was obstinately, perversely and persistently rejected by the five - the five members who happened to originate from the south of the Old Cam Road (see page 9 of the book), so it was thought, even though it is not a normal Metcalfe trait, that their unreasonable stubbornness was perhaps inherited. Eventually they battered the lone ranger into submission, but .. *read on* .. the individual whose brilliance was responsible for this outstanding proposal, told the Muster that, as the book committee were adamant in their view, there was only one way to handle the

situation, to make use of the tried and trusted Metcalfe motto - 'If you can't beat 'em then cheat.' With that in mind and corrective action having been taken, the President took the opportunity to present to the Book Committee individually labelled copies (only six having been made) of a red leather bound book "CLAN METCALFE" whose interior bears a remarkable similarity to the earlier 'History of the Clan'.

In the afternoon the hall seemed to be filled with members, purchased books in hand, circulating past the book committee with the objective of obtaining signed copies.

Eventually, after tea, time was called, the book stall was closed, and thoughts began to turn to 'Metcalfe II', or 'Metcalfes Over There'; or is it to be 'Metcalfes in India'?



Federation of Family History Societies

Survey of One-Name Studies. The Federation has carried out a survey to find out if it was fulfilling its obligation to those Societies by providing them with all the necessary advice and service they required. Results so far indicate that around 60% of One-Name Societies take part in Federation functions - mostly on an occasional basis whilst some 70% send in reports to the FH News and Digest. However 12% do not. Over 90% consider the Federation helpful to them but three-quarters would appreciate tailored seminars to their special needs. Topics proposed include The function of a one-name society, how to secure greater participation by members of a one-name society, how to make best use of the new information resources and how better to collaborate with local family history societies. The first seminar is planned for 13 March 1999.

Public Record Office

Heritage lottery funding has been made available to film the remainder of the burnt Soldiers Documents of WWI. The exercise is expected to be completed by 2003. Around 2m soldiers documents will be filmed but this is only about 40% of the original total. Already available are surnames beginning with E, N, O, U, V and Z. Expected by Christmas 1998 are F, X and Y; Spring 1999 A - D and W. *M's will not be available until Spring 2001 - Ed.*.

Electronic access. At a conference on electronic access to records involving representatives from across the European Union in June the PRO indicated its aim was to allow electronic access to readers of public records, not just in this country but around the world. The meeting agreed a programme of common aims under the auspices of the EC which was expected to lead to wider co-operation.

Family Records Centre. Archive Direct Project 2001 has made available many of the Kew class lists from the Census Reference Area in Myddelton Street. It will be introduced on the Internet early in the next century.

Site Tours of the Family Records Centre. Second Friday of the month at 12.30pm. Tours last an hour and give a behind the scenes insight. No need to book just turn up before the due time at the reception desk.



AN EARLY MUSTER

My father and a cousin decided to try and organise a Family Gathering at Eastbourne, Sussex in April 1949 for the descendants of their grandparents Dawson (chris 15 December 1841, St Leonard, New Malton Yorks) and Emily Chittenden (nee Gostick b 1 January 1844, Keighley, Yorks) Metcalfe.

Sixty five out of a potential eighty direct descendants and their spouses attended the event. One branch of the family was sadly not represented at all - no doubt due to the distance involved. This was the family of Dawson and Emily's youngest son Walter Gostick Metcalfe (b Lambeth 1878) who with his wife Julia (nee Henfry - possibly Australian) had emigrated to Canada and were living in Vancouver. They had three children, Don married to Florence (Flora) nee Mc allister; Emily married to James Stewart and Hugh unmarried at the time. Don and Flora had a daughter, Donna (b1945); Emily and James a son Jimmy (b1936?) and a daughter Edith (b1938?). The patriarch of the Gathering Henry Ernest Metcalfe told the assembled company that a cable was being sent to them that day.

In 1948 Walter's eldest brother Harry (Henry Ernest Mt) and his wife Edith (nee Crosland paid a visit to Walter and his family in Vancouver and I have a copy of a diary which Edith wrote about the visit having not seen them for twenty years. Should any descendants or connections of this family be interested I would be happy to forward any information to them that I have in regard to Walter Gostrick Metcalf's ancestry.

A Day Out at Nottingham University

Each spring and autumn a different family history society in the UK host a weekend conference which includes family history seminars and a fair open to the general public. As mentioned previously, these conferences are very well attended by over 200 people for the full weekend, in addition to local people attending the fair on the Saturday.

Nottinghamshire Family History Society staged an excellent conference at Nottingham University with excellent facilities - parking facilities, lunch, and seminar subjects were all of a very high standard indeed. Given personal circumstances, I can only attend the conference for the full day on the Saturday, I was still able to visit all the stands where I introduced myself and the society, and once again continued to build the awareness of the Metcalfe Society to all other societies.

The GOONS (The Guild of One-Name Studies) meeting provided an outline of what they have to offer for one name societies and discussions centred around what the societies wanted from the GOONs - be they large or small societies. In addition, the GOONS are to review the feasability of setting up a competition for one-name society journals similar to the Elizabeth Simpson Award. At the moment, the criteria for this award does not make it easy for one-name society journals to succeed. So this makes the commendation we received again this year even more thrilling.

We have now secured a deal with the Federation whereby they will sell the Metcalfe Book on their publications table wherever they exhibit at a 10% fee. So I am looking forward to the next Federation conference to be hosted by the Hampshire Genealogical Society at Sparsholt Agricultural College, Winchester, Friday 9th - Sunday 11th April. I hope you can attend too!


The Weakest go to the Wall

A fantastic coincidence

I had heard during my childhood that Gt Uncle John had been murdered in Birmingham City Centre, on leaving the pub in Park Street to visit the toilet he was robbed and killed. Apparently an old style mugging. The man reportedly responsibility was a Bob Cherry but I was never really interested until taking up genealogy; a mistake, for both Mother and Father were now deceased. However, my eldest sister had told me that the murder had occurred about the time my parents had first met, this was towards the end of the First World War. I found John was born

1872/3, the 1881 Census gave his age as 8 however no trace of him from that date. I searched records from 1881 of deaths, burials, coroners reports and newspaper cuttings, even contacting the local prison, all without result. It was as if he never existed.

Let me now advance to 9 April 1941. During this period of our lives World War II was in progress and just before I joined the army, I accompanied my father putting out fires in the Small Heath district. (We lived in Whitehall Road). April 9th saw the same procedure until we decided a tea break was in order. The family were all in the Anderson shelter apart from my sister Kate who had remained in the house busy writing. She said she would be down later so off we went to enjoy a well earned cuppa. After ten minutes or so my father said it was about time for another walk about and we rose to go. He climbed the first step when the ground literally shook even the shelter shook and threatened to part at the seams as soil trickled through the cracks. Dad was thrown backwards crashing into me and we both fell to the floor. It was now pitch black. As soon as we could move we scrambled out. We emerged into a cloud of dust that blocked out any vision. As I stepped forwards I heard my father say "Keep still Jim". I stopped and remained so until the dust gradually subsided. We were just off the edge of a crater, the barricade in front of the shelter was smashed, whilst the shelter stood at a crazy angle. When I was able to see further our house had disappeared, no rubble just a deep hole. We would never see Kate again .

During the next day while continuing to search and with father trying to find a place for the night he was approached by a complete stranger who stated that he lived out of Birmingham while the bombing was going on, returning to work during the day (as many did). He offered the keys to his house saying we could live there until we found a place to go and to treat the house as our own. My father was amazed at the offer and said "But we do not even know one another.". They shook hands and introduced themselves. I knew nothing of this until being called to go to our temporary home. The family stayed there for about a week although I only spent a day or so at the house. Because of the bombing all buildings were in short supply however we were sent to a ramshackle house in Green Lane. This became our home for some time.

Many years later, on becoming interested in genealogy I tried to find out just what had happened to Gt Uncle John. Not having a date to narrow any search down it was very difficult. Neither was there any reference to Bob Cherry. Talking to my sister I expressed my frustration in failing to obtain any further information. Her reply puzzled me "A pity you never asked them when you met." I asked her what on earth she was talking about and the reply was "Oh! You never knew. Well you remember when the house was bombed that man had said I'm Bob Cherry." She smiled and said "Why do you think Mother was apprehensive about going in the house?"

What a fantastic coincidence, one generation does the family a bad turn while the following does a wonderful one. I could hardly believe it. This information fired my enthusiasm and once more on with the search. Yes! I still failed, perhaps one day there will be a lucky break.

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



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

All you need to know about Deed of Covenant

The Metcalfe Society is a Registered Charity. This status allows the society to reclaim from the Inland Revenue an amount of tax that applies to subscriptions from members who are UK taxpayers. This provides an additional income to the society **at no cost to yourself whatsoever**.

In order for the society to gain this additional income, we ask that if you or your spouse pay UK Income Tax, whether on earnings, pension, or investments (eg bank or building society interest), then please pay your subscription under a "Deed of Covenant".

How does the Deed of Covenant work?

A Deed of Covenant can be taken out at any time. Because the Metcalfe Society Covenant covers our annual subscription, the wording on the Deed is that this covers the subscription rate due at the time it is payable and is to run continuously as long as there is no power to terminate within the first four years. After this four years, it can be terminated by advising the Covenant Secretary (details below) in writing. Payments made before the date of your Deed are not, of course, covenanted.

How much income will the society receive?

The Inland Revenue will refund direct to the society, the amount of tax deemed to apply to the subscription. For example, for a £5 net subscription, tax of £1.67 is deemed to have been deducted and will be refunded to the Society each year.


What happens next?

After the first year of your Deed, the society will send you a form R185. This **must** be signed and returned, as without it, we cannot claim the refund of tax. All R185 forms completed by members will then be sent by the Covenant Secretary directly to the Metcalfe Society's tax office, who will in turn, forward each one to the tax office designated on it. They will verify that tax of at least the amount shown (as above) has been paid. Please be assured this takes all of one minute! When all of the verified R185 forms are returned to the Society's tax office, they will then repay the society, by cheque, to the Treasurer. We will make an annual claim for refund of tax, usually in mid-April - this is why it is imperative that all R185 forms are returned promptly. The Inland Revenue will only repay on the R185 forms which accompany our claim.

Changes to the Deed of Covenant

- * If, for any reason, you cease to be liable for Income Tax, then the Deed of Covenant ceases in the last year that tax is due.
- * If a Deed of Covenant (R185) is completed by a spouse because they pay tax and you do not, and the spouse dies, then the Deed ceases. If you pay tax in your own right **after this**, you can complete a Deed for the following tax year.
- * Higher rate taxpayers should advise their own tax office of the Deed, so that they can ensure that the appropriate tax relief is given in either code or assessment.
- * For family subscriptions, the Deed must be made in the name of the taxpaying member.
- * Subscriptions continue to be made in the normal way, direct to the Treasurer in January and cannot be made by standing orders.

We hope that many of you will decide to covenant your subscriptions, as we are sure you will agree, it is a very painless way of increasing society funds.
