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FROM THE EDITOR



As I end my fifth year as your editor I wonder where the time has gone. I did wonder at times what I had let my self in for and whether it was worth it! However as I have grown into the job I have found a high degree of satisfaction in the task. I have made changes to the layout over the period which have been in some part rewarded with three recommendations by the FFHS under the

Elizabeth Simpson Award; the third this Spring.

Given constraints on the size of the magazine I have attempted to give a layout pleasing to the eye. However, whilst presentation is important content is more so. You will see from the FFHS feature in this News that costs have rocketed for wills. Whilst I understand the pressures on the public service to cover costs I cannot see what commercial values are driving the recent announcement. The wills are not usable in a commercial way and for family historians, who must be the bulk of the users, to be charged such prices seems ridiculous. I for one agree that those responsible should put the wills in a repository, preferably locally and make the records readily available, especially those over fifty years old. To save some money you can always consult the Society's Wills Booklets and find out their locations thereby minimising cost.

A MEETING DOWN UNDER

After reading Mecca News number 55 (August 1998) I wrote to Patrick Malham (M444) to congratulate and applaud his efforts he and other members of the Society were undertaking in recording all the births, marriages and deaths of Metcalfes (with all the variations) in the United Kingdom. A truly mammoth task for the benefit of the Society. I also offered to help in any way, if I could, albeit from some considerable distance. I was indeed surprised to receive a very quick reply from Patrick saying thank you and even more surprised to hear that he would like to talk to me about his efforts when he was in Auckland in a weeks time. So, through a mutual contact (the person Patrick and his wife were staying with in Auckland) we organised a time to meet at Auckland's Museum of Transport and Technology (MOTAT). This is where I learned of Patrick's other hobby - tramcars. Outside MOTAT a working model in fine condition still operates and travels the couple of kilometre route from MOTAT to the Auckland Zoo. After this Patrick and I had a look around the museum and stopped for a coffee and a chat about our mutual interest/hobby. It was here that Patrick suggested I might like to look at undertaking a similar gathering of the BMD's for New Zealand. I agreed that it would be an interesting task. After a very pleasant couple of hours we parted - I went home and I'm sure Patrick plied the route between MOTAT and the zoo a few more times

The following week I started looking into how to collect the BMD's for New Zealand. I initially thought the New Zealand National Archives would be a good starting point but was quickly put onto the Auckland Public Library and subsequently the Takapuna library on the North Shore of Auckland where I live. I was pleased to find that the library had a good genealogical section and all the BMD's starting from 1840 (the year the Treaty of Waitangi was signed between the indigenous Maoris and the Crown) are recorded on microfiche. With a good source that was local I began copying the birth details of the New Zealand Metcalfes and the variants.

My next problem was deciding how best to record these details electronically in database form. Patrick had advised me that he was recording the UK records on a Rapidfile database. I had seen this database some years ago but decided to stick with Access (version2) which I have on my home computer. I initially thought that three databases would be the best way to go (one for births one for marriages and one for deaths) but after speaking with a friend who is database literate I have put all the records onto one database. With the option to query records it becomes relatively easy to make fairly accurate conclusions about the matching of births marriages and deaths (especially considering the much smaller number of records that I would be dealing with, around 3,500 in all). To date (February 1999) I have completed collecting the details of all births and marriages and am up to 1945 on the deaths. Once all the records are on the database I will transfer them to a disc and forward it to the Society.

In Patrick's recent letter he asked if I could explain the New Zealand history of BMD's. Well, very briefly, as stated earlier the records started in 1840. In general they all give the date of B/M/D, the surname (alphabetically) and registration numbers. Birth and death registration numbers can be refined by consulting booklets produced by the New Zealand Society of Genealogists (NZSO) which give the registration district and the quarter of the birth/death year up to 1955. From 1960 onwards birth records give the mother's first name(s). From 1957 marriage records give the spouse's surname and from the 1960s death records give the age of the person when they died. The best source of how to find out more about New Zealand genealogy is "Tracing Family History in New Zealand" by Anne Bromell or by consulting the NZSO (http://www.genealogy.org.nz or http://home.clear.net.nz/pages/ian.clapham/).

THE RICHARD III FOUNDATION, Inc.

Last Saturday evening (15th May) Michael & I drove up Wensleydale to Akebar and to the Friar's Head where we met Joe Ann Ricca, her husband Michael T. Ricca and Judith Dickson all over from the USA to celebrate Richard III's life & times. Before this meeting I had no idea that anyone, and Americans in particular, were so interested in King Richard.

The four aims and objectives of the Foundation are:

- * To cultivate the life and times of the medieval period, with emphasis on King Richard III, his contemporaries and era.
- * To secure the advancement of education on the medieval period of the Wars of the Roses with emphasis on the 15th Century.
- * To enhance and promote scholastic studies of the 15th century.
- * To sponsor and encourage research, scholarships, medieval conferences and publications showcasing the 15th century, with particular emphasis on King Richard III, his contemporaries and era.

The Board of Directories are CEO/President Joe Ann Ricca; Exec. Vice President/Scty - Susan Mahoney; Chief Financial Officer - Michael T. Ricca and Data Base Administrator - Judith Dickson. One of the benefits of being a "Patron" (a qualification for which could be any one of the three following, served at least 3 years on the Board or a Committee productively; be a Lifetime Member; or bring into the Foundation as least 20 new patrons) is an annual draw at which a USA Patron could win 2 Round Trip Tickets to England, if a UK Patron wins they could have a Luxury Four Day Weekend in York - this makes our raffle prizes seem tame!

NEWS

Earby, March 1999.

The meeting began with a short silence in memory of Ron Metcalfe.

Chairman: David had represented the Society at the Federation Open Day in the Mormon Library in Salt Lake City last year. He has heard many favourable comments about our book "Metcalfe: History of the Clan" from Federation colleagues.

Secretary: Diane reported on the handover arrangements and thanked Nina for her help in ensuring these have progressed smoothly. Most of Diane's time has been spent on book orders and Internet enquiries.

New Members' Secretary: The membership number reached 1010. Active membership was 345.

Archivist: Nina's new role! She is keeping busy answering your enquiries.

Treasurer: Following a detailed report of the finances, subscription rates were discussed, particularly whether there should be an increase in the rate for overseas members and whether there should be a higher rate for the first year of membership. It was agreed to defer a decision on a Committee recommendation until the September meeting. There were 64 covenants last year and a further five new ones this year.

Editor: The August 1998 edition has been submitted for the Elizabeth Simpson Award competition.

Conference Secretary: Arrangements were proceeding well for this year's Muster. It may be necessary to find an alternative venue in 2001 because of student pressure on the College facilities at weekends. The idea of a coach tour round Wensleydale on Muster Sunday was discussed. It was felt there was not time to organise this for this year but that the idea would be raised at the Muster. The idea was suggested that there be a Mecca picnic at Earby on the Sunday following the spring Committee meeting. Other suggestions were to attach such an event to a family history fair or to hold informal regional meetings. The viability of these ideas will be explored and the membership consulted.

Computer Index: There were now 70,500 entries on the computer with approximately 300 lists still needing to be entered. Much of David's time is now taken up with checking entries. Family tree queries should be sent to Nina, not David. She will forward to David any family tree data needing entry onto the computer.

Publications: Diane was thanked for her hard work on updating a number of publications, forms and posters. It was agreed to send out the updated New Members booklet to all current members so that you are fully informed of what is currently available from the Society.

Federation of Family History Societies: Diane will be attending the March conference in Enfield.

Council of Family Societies: Diane reported on the meeting she had attended on 14th November.

North West Group of FHS: Peter reported on the Stockport Fair. This year's North West Fair is be held at Preston Guildhall on 30th October.

North East Group of FHS: Nina will attend the March meeting.

Metcalfe History Book: Diane distributed a detailed financial report to the Committee. This was discussed at length. 597 book orders had been dealt with. It was agreed that the Society is not currently in a financial position to commit itself to the production of a second edition. This is a matter which will be the subject of future review, when the sales position over the next few months can also be taken into account. It was agreed to submit the book for the millennium competition on family history.

Internet Home Page: Diane reported that the web site has been busy.

GRO Collection: Patrick reported that almost 100,000 records are now held. Births have been recorded up to 1943, marriages to 1925 and deaths to 1954. The goal is to reach 1983.

Exhibitions / **Fairs**: The Society will be represented at the Northern Fair at York racecourse on 26th June, 1999 and at the North West Fair in Preston on 30th October, 1999.

The next meeting will take place on Saturday, 4th September at Earby.

North Yorkshire County Record Office Publication No. 62. Review 1997. The Metcalfe Family of Nappa.

This publication will be of interest to members as it lists the papers held by the last of the Nappa Hall Metcalfes - Thomas, who died in 1756. Some of the records were not used by Walter and Gilbert Metcalfe in their 1891 book which was used heavily by the Society in Metcalfe - History of the Clan. The publication is available for £5 + £1.75 UK p&p, £5 + £5.50 airmail or £3.50 surface overseas, {must be in Sterling} and contains some 80 pages of text and detail including micro-film numbers for all the documents.

The records were sorted and microfilmed in 1997 and include deeds, correspondence and other papers such as Thomas Metcalfe's letter book 1747-48, a letters patent appointing James Metcalfe as overseer of Middleham Castle 1527 and a Bainbridge mining agreement 1695. They give details of everyday life in the dales in the mid eighteenth century and pen portraits of per-

sonalities of the time. Many of the letters/documents are quoted at some length, all are listed, giving interesting insights into the dales mining industries and the necessity to guard lead ore overnight in certain circumstances; the sale of Nappa rabbit skins for the manufacture of hats etc. One letter in particular says 'John White a miner committed to Carlisle Castle for stealing black lead: he is said to have lived (if not been born) at Gunnerside and about seven years since basely killed Metcalfe Smith, a godson of Thos Metcalfe, at Gunnerside Barf and escaped the hands of justice'.

One further piece of interest which came out of the visit was the discovery that copy No 34 of Walter and Gilbert's book which Warwick Metcalfe had not been able to trace and was seeking its whereabouts (see Mecca News No 57) is owned by the NYCRO!

Metcalfe School Masters by Charles K Mercer (M754)

My Great, Great Grandfather James Metcalf was born in 1802 at Kilburn, near Thirsk, the eldest son of William and Dorothy (Hunter) Metcalf. Initially working as a farm labourer he became the schoolmaster of the village of Scawton, between Thirsk and Helmsley, when the post became vacant in the late 1830's. Prior to the Education Act of 1874/75 anyone could apply for the post of schoolmaster. Taking lodgings with the Thompson family he soon began courting Elizabeth their eldest daughter. They married on Christmas Day 1837, a paid holiday. Any other time he would have lost pay. A house went with the job and they took in lodgers to help with their income. The couple were buried in Scawton in the 1880's.

Their eldest son William Hunter Metcalf was born in 1838. His father ensured that he received a good education. In his early working life he was a farm labourer working part of the time in Lockton near Pickering. However when visiting his parents in Scawton in 1867 he heard of a vacant schoolmaster's job at Old Byland, applied and was appointed to the post. As a house was provided with the job he took the opportunity in August 1868 to marry Margaret Middleton, whom he had been courting in Lockton. His diary for that time mentions his "salary" as £6-10s per quarter, the house rent free and £2-10s per year for cleaning the school. Riches indeed!

Before 1871 he had transferred to Hawnby school and in 1878 he was appointed schoolmaster at Saltersgate living in a cottage at Wilton near Thornton Dale. He walked ten miles to Saltersgate each morning and back each night, summer and winter alike. William and his family moved to Lockton two years later when he took over the school there. He also ran the village shop with his unmarried daughter Elizabeth.

A great walker, William, returning from a visit to his parents set off from Scawton at 3.30am, walking the 23 miles to Lockton in 5½ hours, arriving in time to open the school at 9am. By way of celebration on his 70th birthday he walked 16 miles to Whitby, with a friend. They spent the day there, returning by train to Levisham Station (on what is now the North Yorkshire Moors Railway) and then walked the two miles to Lockton.

A talented man, as well as a scholar, William was quite an artist and a builder. He built a dry stone wall with a recessed gateway at Lockton cemetery when he was 74, which is still standing today. A monument to a grand old man.

None of William and Elizabeth's eight children followed him into teaching. He died in 1924 aged 86 and is buried near his wall in Lockton cemetery.

Society of Genealogists to sell the book on our behalf both in their bookshop and on their internet site. Further details on this deal can be found in the Status Report on the Book in this edition.

FEDERATION OF FAMILY HISTORY SOCIETIES

News from the Federation

As of 26th April the prices charged by the Principal Registry of the Family Division (PRFD) for copies of wills/admons 1858 to date will be going up. For per

sonal applicants at First Avenue House or a District Probate Registry, any copy of a grant of probate, including a copy of the will, if there is one, will cost £5.00 (Five pounds). This is an increase from the current prices of 25 pence for a grant and 75 pence for a will. Any extra copies ordered at the same time will be £1.00 (one pound) per document. If you want to read the will or grant in the searchroom, the fee will go up up to £15.00 (fifteen pounds), from the current rate of 25 pence. An increase of 5,900%. Postal applications to the sub-registry at York will be £5.00 (five pounds) for a search of up to 4 years, including a copy of the grant, and the will if there is one. Additional years will cost £3.00 (three pounds) for every four year period. There is no refund for an unsuccessful search. There are changes to the prices of their other services, but the above are the ones of most relevance to family historians.

Time is Running Out - Have YOU got a copy?

Looking back to the 1997/8 Mecca News articles you will find reference to our cautious, though optimistic view on how many copies of Metcalfe - History of the Clan could we sell, and so how many should we produce. We were astounded when advance sales meant that we could produce 750 rather than the original 500 copies.

Well, I am delighted to announce that after only 8 months since the launch we have sold over 90% of the 750 copies!!! Yes - we have less than 75 copies left in stock. So do you have a copy of this limited edition? Time is running out to buy a copy for yourself, a family present and heirloom.

At the last committee meeting, we deferred the decision as to whether or not we should, or could, do a reprint for the following reasons:

- * We do not have the £8-10,000 available at this moment to do a reprint (unless someone wins the lottery and the society becomes a benefactor!)
- * We have funds tied up in the outstanding stock and the rate of sales varies.
- * We have met our objectives for this, our millennium project, and need to review financial priorities

Hence, the committee will be reviewing the book sales figures at the September committee meeting and making a reccommendation to the AGM. But do you want to gamble - don't leave it too late to buy a book. As the saying goes..... 'whilst stocks last'.

Where there's a will ...

Many members have bought copies of the various Wills booklets which help locate Metcalfe wills held in various UK-based repositories. This enables you to seek out these valuable sources of very varied and interesting family history data. But imagine the wealth of data the society would hold if we could hold actual copies of these wills so that we could include this data into our computer records, and also make available these wills to you directly.

This opportunity has been made possible by a semi-anonymous donation from an Australian member in memory of his late mother, who was grand-daughter of Captain Thomas Metcalfe Thompson (1843-1917) of Kendal and Pooley Bridge in Westmorland.

The cost of collecting wills from these repositories varies dependent on the repository itself and the size of the will. But before any of this valuable donation is spent on this project, we thought that a large number of wills could be collected by making a plea to you, our members, to send copies of any wills that you may have that relates to a Metcalfe (or spelling variant of course) to Stephan Newman M824.

To aid the cataloguing of the wills, when you send it in, please identify the person mentioned in the will by one of two ways:

- * If you know that the will is listed in one of the five Wills booklets that we have already published, then please identify which page/booklet it is referenced. This helps the cataloguing of the will greatly.
- * If not, identify the will belonging to a person who appears in your birth brief.

We are focusing on wills held in UK-based repositories as this would provide a greater service to the majority of members as most families do originate from the UK. But we would be more than happy to receive non-UK wills, and possibly generate a further Wills booklet identifying this collection.

When is a will not a will?

We are all generally familiar with the term 'will', its intentions and contents. However, the English probate system generates other legal documents in this area which will be of equal interest. For instance, the term 'intestate' is used for someone who dies without having left a valid will, and so letters of administration known as 'admons' are available. So please don't just send wills, please send the following if you have them available.

- * Admons for intestate estates
- * Affidavits, bonds for admons, inventories (very useful for signatures etc)
- * Will books, Act books, court records detailing the grant of probate. These are the official record of wills and sometimes easier to read than the original wills.
- * Calendars court-produced indexes to probates/admons.

Please do NOT send originals. They are far too precious to be at the mercy of the postal system.

So what are we going to do with all of these wills?

Look out for part two of this project in the next Mecca News when we let you know what happens to all of this valuable data, and how it can help you in your family history research.



To the Manor Born II

In the last issue (no 57) an overview of the manorial system was given. This issue we give a flavour of the content you are likely to find in manorial records.

As explained in the last article the Manorial courts regulated the administration of the manor by enforcing local customs and agricultural practices, settling minor disputes and debts and transferring property rights, notably copyhold tenure where a tenant's legal title was based on a copy of an entry on the court roll. All tenants of the manor were meant to attend and could be fined for not doing so.¹

Manorial records include minister's and receiver's accounts, rentals and surveys, court rolls as well as details of fines, estreats, admittance books, sheriff records, account rolls and reeve's/bailiff's accounts.

George Buxton M003 has used the records to great effect in tracing the land holdings of his ancestors in Swaledale, from the late 1690's through to 1922. These records have helped to fill in gaps and expand the brief details obtained from other sources. In 1698 the records for the Manor of Satron in Swaledale noted the surrender of a piece of land in Satron by Anthony Kearton and the renting at one penny (1d) per year plus a fine (fee) of one shilling and eight pence (1s 8d or 8p) by Jane Cottingham. Her daughter Margaret born in 1699 married Thomas Metcalfe (d1778) and he became the tenant with his wife.

The manorial rolls record the various transactions down through the years. At the annual meeting in May 1767 (the court was held around the beginning of May each year) Thomas Metcalfe rented more land in Wharton Close "with a cow house thereon with two cattle gates in Satron pasture" at a fee of £2 plus an annual rent of two shillings and a half penny. The two holdings were endorsed in the court in 1772 when the rent went up to 2s 2d and a fine of £2 3s 4d.

The property passed down to George Metcalfe (d1823) in 1790 and then his son George (d1824) who added land at Ivelet to his holdings. The entries in the 19th century are much more detailed and the annual renewals continue to 1922 when Elizabeth and Amy Metcalfe - mother and daughter - were granted the copyhold.

The entries make fascinating reading and give a record of a family, listing a variety of relatives, where they lived and the property they held for over 220 years. Another example of the type of information contained in the manorial records relates to the mineral rights of the area. The Manor of Bainbridge received royalties from coal and lead mines and from stone taken from quarry and beck.² At Storth, west of Gayle near Hawes in Wensleydale a coal mine was developed in the 18th century. In

1770 Edmund Dinsdale of Busk Farm was granted the lease, at a Court Leet (meeting), for the mine. In 1789 Thomas Routh, by now the lease holder, issued a complaint about unofficial working at Storth, at the meeting in that year. Details of subsequent leaseholders down through the 19th century are also recorded.

As you will appreciate this little used source could help to track down that elusive ancestor or put meat on the bones of their lives, so why not give it a go you never know what you might turn up. Details of the manorial holdings from the PRO for Arkengarthdale, Swaledale and Wensleydale, which run to 21 pages of records, with the earliest dating from 1255 (for Skelton) have been extracted for the Society. The list gives the location and the appropriate reference number. If you are interested contact the Society's Archivist Nina Benson who has a copy (don't forget a sae). If you need the locations of other manorial records you should consult the Manorial Documents Register held by the Royal Commission on Historical Manuscripts, Quality House, Quality Court, Chancery Lane, London WC2A 1HP.

In another section we are treated to the occupations and lives of 79 branches. These branches, each with their own trees, are based on the evidence of two or more ancestors of society members being alive in 1850 who can be traced back to a common source. The closing section is on the Metcalfe Coats of Arms, also well explained with illustrations.

This is a beautiful publication. The Metcalfe Society is to be congratulated on producing such a masterpiece."

RASPBERRY JAM

Put raspberries in one pan and castor sugar in another - lb for lb. Place both in oven, no water with fruit or sugar, cover pans with lids or plates. George and Ann Stephenson had seven sons and the family emigrated from Liverpool to Melbourne on the Kalmia in 1852. George Stephenson was b 1799 at Gap Shield Farm, Haltwhistle s/o William and it is claimed that Wm was a brother of "Owd Bob" the father of George Stephenson "Father of the Railways". John b c 1862 Aiskew 1/9 of Thomas & Hannah (Burry) Mte m 28 Nov 1857 Bedale. Matthew & his 2nd wf Ann Whitfield m 29 Feb 1864 Richmond had a further 6 children. Matthew b c1832 Aiskew, Bedale 2/10 of Thomas & Ann (Simpson) Mte m 10 July 1830 Bedale and see above. Connects to XM35; XM236; XM273; & XM516.

Thomas was apprenticed to a feltmaker and was of Dockendale Hall, Neville House, Westmorland House, Newcastle. Thomas & Margaret's eldest son John (b 1719) was a surgeon of Newcastle when he died 1771, his will mentions "estates in Wensleydale". Thomas bpt 16 Nov 1690 St Johns, Newcastle? 3/6 of John & Isabel (?) Mte. At each of his children's baptisms he is described as MR John Metcalfe & from 1699 - 1706 as one of the "Free School" masters. In the will of John of Newcastle dated March 1717 (proved Durham 1720) he left "....lands in Wensleydale, monies due from Matthew Metcalfe's estate in Apperset, lands & tenements in Orton Parish; at Skales & (unreadable) adjoining places; monies due from "his brother" Edward Birbeck at ... in the parish of Orton; monies out of lands or grounds called Standingstones in the county of York....lands and tenements at Six Acres; The Carrs; Closes, the West Closes & cattle gates belonging to West Parracks & some lying in the parish of Aysgarth;... I give to the inhabitants of Busk the sum of £20 towards the opening of their chapel and £5 to the poor of Bainbridge to be distributed...£20 to my "cousin" John Spar/ Scar's eldest son, he paying unto Metcalfe Sheldon? £7 out of the same...."

I've taken the liberty of adding all this data in the hope that some of you may be able to recognise places and/or names and be able to assist in tracing the John of Bainbridge c 1650. **Connects to XM36**.

Minutes of the AGM of the Metcalfe Society 10th October, 1998

Held at the College of Ripon & York St John, Ripon.

1. CHAIRMAN'S OPENING REMARKS:

• Diane Howarth welcomed all members and guests. She felt that now that the Society was eighteen years old it was a fitting 'coming of age' that the meeting was to witness the launch of the "Metcalfe: History of the Clan". She thanked all those contributing to carrying out the work of the Society and moved on to outlining the resources available for consultation during the day.

2. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE:

Helen Offer, David Lambert, Leo Metcalfe, Joan Grundy, Mr & Mrs Alan Thwaites, Julian Metcalfe, Margaret Condon, Lilian Lawrence, June Cutting, Eunice Herring, Arthur Metcalfe,

3. The Minutes of the AGM 1997, having been circulated, were signed as a correct record.

4. MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES:

There were no matters arising from the minutes.

5. REPORTS:

CHAIRMAN:

- This had been the busiest year to date for the Society. The coming year would see the resumption of projects put in abeyance while the concentration was on the Metcalfe book.
- This meeting marked Nina's official retirement as Secretary, though she will continue as a Committee member and as archivist. The process of handing over her work will take some time, there being three members who are taking up sections of it. Diane paid tribute to Nina's
- On behalf of the Committee Diane welcomed ideas from members for further development of the Society.

SECRETARY:

- The membership to date has reached the number of 971, with an active membership of 455. Of these 101 are overseas, with 32 in the USA, 27 in Australia, 19 in Canada, 19 in New Zealand, 2 in France, 1 in Jersey and 1 in South Africa. 50 members failed to renew their subscriptions in January but there have been 56 new members so far this year.
- There have been two long Committee meetings during the year. Nina had represented the Society in a piece for Yorkshire television on Metcalfe history.
- The Society was sorry to lose, for personal reasons, Val Metcalfe as Covenant Secretary and she was thanked for all her work in this role.
- Nina thanked all those who had supported her during her sixteen years as Secretary.

TREASURER:

- As at 9th October, the Society holds £2913-84 in Barclays Bank and £830-40 in National Savings, making a total of £3744-24.
- The income from the catering charges was £1245, £14,962 had been paid to Deanprint for the printing of "Metcalfe: History of the Clan". £156-15 had been received as a tax refund regarding the Deeds of Covenant.
- There had been a change in the balance sheet initially circulated to members. This was due to a mistake by the auditor. A new balance sheet and a letter from the auditor explaining the changes were available for members to view.

- Margaret gave a personal thanks to Nina for all her support over the years.
- Diane pointed out that the borrowing from the Society for the book had been within the amount approved by the 1997 AGM. Advance sales of the book had gone well.

EDITOR:

- Peter continues to try to improve the quality of the "Mecca News", especially this year in the
 use of pictures. He thanked members for their contributions and asked for more items for
 inclusion.
- He informed the meeting that the Metcalfe Society had been the first one name Society to again be shortlisted at the beginning of the year for the Elizabeth Simpson Award.

COMPUTER INDEX:

 There are now about 70,000 records on the computer. There are about 300 - 400 lists still to be entered.

PROJECTS:

GRO INDEXES:

- Patrick explained that births had now been logged up to 1928, marriages to 1925 and deaths to 1930. Altogether this adds up to 84,917 references.
- Patrick thanked Betty van Arkady and Julian Metcalfe for their valuable work in checking
 those references at Middleton Street which were difficult to read on microfiche. He also
 thanked the small group of other members who had helped him in this project and he asked
 for more volunteers to help with the work during the coming year, which has the target date of
 1960. The target for the following year is 1983.

INTERNET:

Diane explained the importance of placing the Society on the Internet and its potential for
increasing the membership. The cost to the Society had been about £150. Susan Metcalfe
Harper in Canada had designed the page, which had gone live during the previous week.
Those accessing the page can communicate at the moment with three members, that is Diane,
David Metcalfe and Susan Metcalfe Harper.

PUBLICATIONS:

• The Metcalfe book is the publication of the year.

6. ELECTIONS:

Following the appropriate procedures the following were elected to the stated offices.

Chairman - David Lambert Business Secretary - Diane Howarth

- The rest of the Committee were willing to re-stand in their current roles and they were re-elected by the meeting. David Galloway has agreed to also take on the work of Covenant Secretary. Carol Arkwright has taken on the New Members role.
- There were some vacancies on the Committee and volunteers were asked for.

7. SUBSCRIPTION RATES:

 The meeting accepted the Committee's recommendation that there should be no change in 1999

8. APPROVAL OF ACCOUNTS:

• Following due process the accounts were approved by the meeting.

9. AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION:

- This amendment proposal had been published and sent to all current members of the Society with the August edition of the "Mecca News".
 That sub-clause 9(C) of the Constitution be deleted and that the following new sub-clause be substituted: "Once, at least, in every year the statements of account of the Society shall be audited or examined by one or more qualified auditors or independent examiners. The results of such audit or independent examination shall be presented to the members of the Society."
- The above was put before those members attending the AGM and after due process was
 passed unanimously.

10. A.O.B:

- Lynda Simpson gave a resume of her work to save Hipswell Mill and asked the Society to
 support this cause. Following some detailed discussion the meeting gave its consent to the
 Committee examining the implications of possibly becoming a Buildings Preservation Trust
 so that a report on the feasibility of this could be presented to next year's AGM.
- A member, who wishes to remain anonymous, would like to donate some funds, as yet
 unspecified, to finance the collection of copies of some Metcalfe wills. It was agreed by the
 meeting that the feasibility of this should be explored. Jean Metcalfe, member 316,
 volunteered to look into this matter.
- Charles Metcalfe showed the meeting the three books of Metcalfe interest which had been
 temporarily lent to the Society. One was a school exercise book with notes on armorial issues,
 one had some glued in cut-outs from the "Craven Herald". The third book had more
 interesting content, specifying the lands of the Reverend John Metcalfe. The documents will
 be copied by the most appropriate means before being returned to their owner.
- Diane presented Nina with a book of letters from members showing appreciation of all her dedicated work for the Society in her sixteen years as Secretary. Charles presented Nina with a special red leather bound edition of "Metcalfe: History of the Clan". Diane gave Nina a basket of flowers on behalf of the Society. The meeting voted unanimously in favour of making Nina an honorary Vice President of the Society.

11. DATE OF 1998 AGM:

This will take place at the same venue on Saturday, 9th October, 1999.

The meeting was officially closed at 12-00 noon.

This was followed by the launch of "Metcalfe: History of the Clan" and presentations of special leather bound editions to the Book Committee, to Barbara Smailes, the photographer, and to Mary Metcalfe. Vera Adams and, in their absence, to Helen Offer and Margaret Condon.
