IT'S ALL IN THE GENES Part I - Theophilus the Scribe

(This is the first article in a proposed series following the descendants of Theophilus Metcalfe by **George Buxton M003**.)



The most important, charismatic, interesting and influential Metcalfe family during the British association with India were the descendants of Theophilus Metcalfe (hereafter called Theophilus the scribe), who developed and improved Shelton's system of shorthand. Although there were three Theophilus Metcalfes who were alive in the early part of the 17th century, Theophilus the scribe was probably the son of Mathew and Maria (Taylor) Metcalfe, (who were married 2nd July 1593 at Richmond in North Yorkshire)¹ and baptised on the 3rd June 1610 at Richmond North Yorkshire.

Various descendants of Theophilus the scribe claimed to be related to the Metcalfe family of Nappa Hall in the parish of Askrigg. As the recording of the baptisms, marriages and burials had started only just a lifetime before; we will never be able to prove this as the grandfather of Theophilus probably never had his birth recorded. Sir Christopher Metcalfe of Nappa, only had one son who lived to adult hood and produce issue. That son James Metcalfe died when his only son, Thomas, was six months old. The confusion is caused by the fact that Matthew, the father of Theophilus the scribe was the son of a James Metcalfe of Askrigg and not James Metcalfe of Nappa Hall Askrigg. We must not forget that Sir Christopher Metcalfe, who rode to York in 1555 with 300 fellow Metcalfes, was one of the most well

known names at that time and to be associated with the family was more than useful in terms of advancement.

Theophilus the scribe was by 1635 living in the parish of St Catherine's by the Tower (of London) where he made a living as a professional writer. By this I do not mean he was a stock writer for the 17th century equivalent of Mills and Boon, or the Arthur C Clark of his day; more he would have gone to a meeting place, rented a shop or even gone to the local public house, to have letters dictated to him or to compose or write them on a client's behalf in return for a fee. The ability to read and write was not thought to be a necessity at this time. The letter could well have been along the following lines;

My dear wife

Brother Edward and I have completed our fathers probate. I have been unable to book a seat on today's coach. I am therefore compelled to wait until Friday. I expect to be home on Sunday or Monday, so I will be home in time for your birthday on Tuesday next week.

Theophilus the scribe was probably more enterprising than his contemporaries. He could well have taken himself off to the Fleet prison, or other such establishments, where the letter could well have very different:

My dear wife


As I crossed Hounslow Heath I was accosted by six desperate men who took off with the 2 pigs and 10 fowls I was to sell. I walked 15 miles to London to find Cousin James, only to find he had died 2 months ago. As you can imagine I had been unable to purchase a bed or food, I saw a stale loaf of bread, which I took. For this crime I am to be hung at Tyburn at 3 o clock this afternoon. So by the time you have this read to you I will swing in the gibbet and you will be a widow. I have sold my hair and clothes so Mr Metcalfe can write and post this letter for me.

(By the way where the gallows of Tyburn once stood, now stands Marble Arch. This was designed and built for the main entrance to Buckingham Palace. Unfortunately someone dropped off the perch (made a huge mistake) as the state coaches were unable to pass through the arch!)

The living Theophilus was able to earn must have been a little precarious. Probably in an effort to supplement his income he had made copper plates etched with his system of shorthand which he then sold in book form, calling his book "Short Writing: the most easy, exact, lineal and speedy Method that hath ever yet been obtained or taught by any in this Kingdom". The book was printed and sold by John Hancock at the first shop in Popes Ally next to Cornhill in 1652 and at the sign of the Three Bibles in 1674. In 1706 it was printed for John Hancock sold by John M Hotham at the Black Boy on London Bridge.

On the title page of the edition published in 1679 it is claimed that 'a young

man, that lately lived at Cornhill, learned so well by this book that he wrote out all the Bible in this character, this claim is repeated on the title page of the fifty – fifth edition, printed about 1756. These editions were printed from the original plates with the dates and titles being changed. Frederick Henry Van Hove of Harlem (1648 – 1700) probably engraved these plates. A copy of the Bible, written in the system of shorthand writing devised by Theophilus the scribe completed in 1668, is held by British Museum as are several editions of his book.



The only way of composing the picture is by varying the pressure, slightly changing the angle and turning the copper plate on the bag of sand. Any changes were made by the careful use of a hammer and tool. My admiration is untold, when we consider these plates were created by one man sitting for hours and hours etching a thin sheet of copper placed on a leather bag filled with sand using a tool similar to the illustration. Although Theophilus the Scribe's system of shorthand was modified in the first quarter of the 18th century it is largely as he left it and was still in use in the 20th century³.

Theophilus followed a peaceful occupation in turbulent times in the history of England. He and his wife Ann had at least three sons². William who went to Norfolk to be a farmer, (he could have been the one who paid hearth Tax at Kings Lynn in 1664, and even founded the Inglethorpe Hall line of Metcalfes) John who was baptised on 11th July 1638¹ and went overseas seas to make his fortune² whilst the third son also called Theophilus took a grant of land in Ulster in 1688 and was a lawyer in Dublin in 1690. Theophilus the lawyer married Peggy (Margaret) Ormsby and they had several children with all but one dying in their youth or unmarried². The one son to survive and marry was Thomas Metcalfe who became an officer in the British army and married Margaret Williams. Thomas was born c 1695 in Ireland and died in Dublin in the year 1778 aged about 83 years². His son Thomas Theophilus Metcalfe became a director of the East India Company; MP for Abingdon and was created a baronet in 1802. He was also father of Lord Charles Theophilus Metcalfe - of which more in future articles.

Indications are that Theophilus the scribe died in 1668 and is said to have been buried on a private estate near Richmond North Yorkshire. Despite valiant efforts Nina, our archivist, has been unable to locate his burial...

FEDERATION OF FAMILY HISTORY SOCIETIES

The FFHS Computer Committee has recommended Norton Antivirus 5 to protect Societies and individuals data from attack by viruses. Cost around £30. The program detects most viruses in computer memory, on floppy and hard disks, in compressed files and from e-mail attachments

The Data Protection Act 1998will be brought into effect by the FFHS in stages starting from 1 March 2000. It will for the first time cover data not kept on a computer but in other forms of filing systems. Exemptions ought to apply to individual Family Historians although at this stage the full extent of these is not clear. The Data Protection Registrar's Web site can be accessed on www.open.gov.uk/dpr/eurotalk.htm. David Lambert the FFHS solicitor will be writing a booklet on the subject in the near future.

PUBLIC RECORD OFFICE

will only be open on Wednesday 29 December 1999 and closed the rest of the period from 24 December 1999 to 3 January 2000.

From 1 April 2000 postal fees will be reduced by £1 to £8 if the index reference is quoted and to £11 without a reference. The current five year search period for applications without a reference will be reduced to 3 years.

Computer Index: Currently David is inputting the 1881 census data into the computer records. He has completed most of the returns for northern England. A computer donation by IBM means he will be able to more effectively run CD Roms on the more powerful machine.

Publications: Diane has created and distributed a revised New Members Booklet, now known as the 'Members Reference Booklet'. It is hoped to produce the updated Birth Brief Booklet during 2000.

Despatch: Thanks were given to Margaret Metcalfe and to George Buxton regarding their work in despatching the last two editions of the 'Mecca News'. An an

Federation of Family History Societies: Diane had attended the meeting in April in Winchester and the March conference for One Name Societies in Enfield.

North West Group of FHS: Peter reported on the arrangements for the North West Fair to be held at Preston Guildhall on 30th October.

North East Group of FHS: Nina had attended the March meeting and had been elected as Chairman for the coming year.

Conference Secretary: George reported that arrangements were proceeding well for the Muster. It was agreed that the issue of a future change in AGM / Muster venue would be discussed at the AGM this year.

Metcalfe History Book: Diane announced that 710 books had been sold. The Committee felt that the book had been a very successful project.

Metcalfe Records: Charles had had printed 50 copies of these records which he offered to the Society on a sale or return basis. The Committee thanked Charles for his work and was pleased to accept this offer. The booklets will be available at the Muster at £6 each.

Wills: Stephen reported on the early stages of this project. Certain matters of copyright need to be further investigated.

Internet Home Page: This has now received over 2300 visits. The Committee recognised the hard work put in by Susan Harper in establishing the website.

GRO Collection: Patrick was unable to attend the meeting as he is awaiting a major operation. The Committee sent their good wishes to him. Births have been recorded up to 1946, marriages to 1948 and deaths to 1960.

Exhibitions / Fairs: Diane, Nina and Margaret Hodgson had represented the Society at the Northern Fair at York in June. It was a successful occasion.

Future Policy: A subcommittee was set up to carry through initial discussions and to bring back recommendations to the main Committee.



Letter to Hackney Borough Council, London

PREVENTATIVE BOATMAN

When looking at the registers of Kirkby Lonsdale, Westmorland I noticed the following entry:

Anthony Metcalf of the parish of Embleton, Preventative Boatman and Mary Atkinson of Kirkby Lonsdale spinster married by licence 3 Sept 1821; witnessed by John Metcalfe (sic) and Mary Metcalf.

Embleton is on the coast of Northumberland, 100 miles from the inland farming community of Kirkby Lonsdale. I suppose that Anthony was a crewman for the Customs & Excise Officers (unless there is another explanation for Preventative Boatman) but how did he meet his wife? So wrote **Mrs Judith Robinson M631** in a letter dated 4 October 1998.

There was another letter from Mrs Robinson a month later which said

In the 1851 Census for Kirkby Lonsdale, Main Street was the following entry:

Anthony Metcalfe H M 55 Chief Boatman, Superannuation from the

Coast Guard Service, born Wes. Kirkby Lonsdale

Mary Metcalfe W M 56 born Lan. Leck

Alice Metcalfe D U 24 Dressmaker born IRL

She further wrote "So there is the explanation Anthony came from Kirkby Lonsdale joined the Coast Guard Service and was posted to Northumberland, returned to marry a local girl (Leck is quite near Kirkby Lonsdale although across the county boundary) was then posted to somewhere in Ireland, where they had a daughter and then retired back home to Westmorland".



Embleton Church. Embleton capital of an important barony. Created by William II for Odard his sheriff around 1100. John of Gaunt was baron in 14th century, his son Henry IV was supported by the Metcalfes when he usurped the throne in 1399.

The above is a sample of what is called HTML tagging for internet programmers. It looks like gibberish but when viewed on "the net" it represents the top of the opening page of the Metcalfe Society's web page, positions and displays the logo, and establishes the colour of the page, text and links. After Diane Howarth received official endorsement for the pages, secured our "domain name" at metcalfe.org.uk, and sent me a bunch of files to "put on the net", the tedious, time-consuming task of "wrapping code around it all" began for me. As an amateur (and volunteer), I worked late into many nights to get the pages uploaded to the "server" and

available for the world and members to see at the 1998 Muster. Ever since then, I have redesigned and refined it, often responding to suggestions (and proof-reading) by visitors, members and non-members alike. Some visitors were not able to view "frames" (the sidebar) and therefore could not reach the site so I created a duplicate set of pages, each with its own menu instead of the sidebar, so that everyone trying to reach the site was successful.

The aim of the site has been to raise awareness of the society around the world, attract new members, advertise the book and provide readier access to the society resources for overseas members by offering contact details and up-to-date information. Since its inauguration, the site has been visited about 3500 times by visitors from all over the world. Although visitors are mostly from the U.S., Canada, Britain, Australia and New Zealand, we have had visitors from 17 other countries including Iceland, Switzerland, Brunei Darussalam, Nicaragua, Japan and Israel.

At last report, at least 18 new members have joined after finding us on the Web.The pages are ever-evolving and I encourage you to visit often, offer suggestions for improvement, point out errors if you find them or take advantage of the many useful links to genealogical sites around the world.

You may wish to have your name and email address included on the Contact page and correspond with other members individually who are on-line. A page has been created that lists places in the world bearing the name Metcalfe (or var.) and the Miscellany section has been greatly expanded with material gleaned from my own internet surfing or with information sent to me by members and nonmembers alike.

Our Web site now includes links and information about: Blind Jack (at the suggestion of a descendant, Giles Metcalfe); a poem about a possible alternate origin of the name, from a relative of member Ruth Carr; a number of noteworthy Canadian and American politicians such as "the Prince of Goodfellows" and "old Stonehammer"; and part of an article that appeared in the February 1999 edition of the Dalesman about Thomas Metcalfe Moore of Hawes (suggested by Australian member Ian Metcalfe). (The latter was used after requesting and receiving permission from Terry Fletcher, editor of the Dalesman, who sent me a complimentary copy with a note attached: "married to a Metcalfe".) A link had been added, on the Metcalfe Book page, to the Society of Genealogists site where the Metcalfe book could be purchased on-line using a credit card - until it recently sold out.

If you have Metcalfes in Scotland you will be interested in following the link to Origins where the searchable index is on-line for Civil Registration, OPR and the 1891 census entries. Once a record has been located, the site allows one to order a certified copy on-line, as well. (A similar service is in the works for the English PRO by 2001.) Follow the new link to the LDS site where the IGI for North America, the British Isles and Finland (currently) is now searchable on-line. Our site has been registered with "Cyndi's List of Genealogy Sites on the Internet" and at various other sites such as GOONS, FFHS, SurnameWeb, and other "surname interests" lists to increase our exposure and guide people to the Metcalfe Society pages.

I look forward to your comments and hope that you have the opportunity to visit http://www.metcalfe.org.uk once in a while. I have donated a copy of Cyndi Howells' "Netting Your Ancestors" to the society library for those of you wishing to learn more about this rapidly expanding research tool. Your input is also sought. What would you like to know regarding the Internet and what would you like to see in the future on our site? A Society mailing list is being considered to which members with email addresses may subscribe for the purpose of Mte/Mt/Md research discussion. A members-only area with password access is in the offing where privileged information may be made available for paid-up members. Please let me know if this interests you and what you would like to see there. You may contact me at: sharper@interchange.ubc.ca

To help you send SAEs, please note that agents now hold a stock of UK stamps in values to send letters/packages from the UK to USA, Canada, New Zealand and Australia. Please contact your local agent directly to purchase stamps if you require them.

What is new for this year is the instruction about WHERE to send your subscription.

Due totally to the ever-increasing UK bank charges for non-sterling cheques, we have to insist that only UK sterling cheques be sent to the treasurer Margaret Metcalfe in the UK. If you wish to pay in your local currency, do not send a non-UK sterling cheque to Margaret Metcalfe in the UK. You MUST send it to your local agent in the USA, Canada, New Zealand or Australia. Please make your payment payable to the agent themselves, not the society. On receipt of all the local currency cheques, the agent will then send one UK sterling cheque to Margaret for all the members. This process is easier, quicker and cheaper for you and certainly for the society.

Throughout the year, the agents can also receive payments in local currency for any publications and items on the sales order form. Please ensure that when you send payments to the agent that you send sufficient funds in the local currency to meet the local exchange rate.

Due to the kindly generosity of a member, we now own microfilm and paper copies of some forty sheets of North Yorkshire manorial records, some of which contain references to the name Metcalfe.

That's the good part. The rest is that they are manuscripted in 16th century Latin! Can anyone help?? Editor.

'Metcalfe - History of the Clan' A remarkable heirloom is now Sold Out!

As reported in the August issue of Mecca News, the rate of orders for the book were arriving at an alarming rate and so members were advised to order copies as soon as possible. Well, you have had your chances - the opportunity to purchase a



copy of this limited edition of 750 copies has expired. At the October Mecca Muster 1999, exactly a year to the day after launching the availability of the book as our millennium project, the final copy of the book was delivered to M541 Sandra Walton, who also travelled the furthest to collect her copy of the book.

There are absolutely no copies of the book available to anyone at any price. So handle your copies with care!

- at the moment, the committee has reccommended to the society that we do not consider a reprint for at least the next two years for the following reasons:

- although the financial status of the society is very good, we need at least £12-15,000 to pay the printer in advance, to print a further 500-750 copies. A smaller print run would not be financially viable.

- the original print run was feasible due to the advance payment by many members. As our main audience (ie current membership) have already made their purchases, the initial cost of £12-15,000 would not be recovered for at least 2-3 years hence, a longer investment, and greater risk.

Any orders and payments received will be returned to the originator advising that their interest has been noted and they will be advised if/when a decision is made to do a reprint in the future.

So what about the finances of the project. The final detailed reconciliation is

almost complete. It includes a full audit trail of all 750 copies outlining the cost and revenue, order by order. The reconciliation is available from the secretary to any member on receipt of an SAE. The details make good bedtime reading - especially if you are having problems getting to sleep!

The total costs for the project = £19,000 The total revenue for the project = just over £20,000 The profit for the project = approx £1,200 = 6.6%

As outlined in the early stages of the project, the book was the society's millennium project - to deliver the history of the Metcalfe name and family in a way that it would still be available to Metcalfe's in a hundred years. The marketing and financial strategies have enabled the society to deliver a remarkable heirloom without endangering the society itself. The testimonials received by you, the members, and other genealogical institutions are indeed recognition that we have surpassed our objectives and that a remarkable heirloom is now available for future generations to enjoy.


PRESTON (NW) FAIR

DEVON MINISTERS

The Reverend James Metcalfe. Vicar of Teignmouth 1877-1904.

"A few years ago I visited the Church of St James-the-Less at Teignmouth, South Devon and it was interesting to find one of my mother Edith Buckton Metcalfe's ancestors, James Metcalfe, had been vicar. An even more pleasant surprise was to discover the imposing and beautiful stained glass memorial window provided in his honour. It depicts a shepherd leading his flock - sadly not calves. The present church was consecrated in 1861. It is one of the very few octagonal churches in England; James's window being on a northeast face (appropriate for one of Yorkshire extraction)."

The inscription reads 'To the glory of God and in ever loving memory of the Reverend James Metcalfe M.A. Fellow of Christ's College Cambridge; for 27 years Vicar of this Parish. Obit March 11, 1908. AET 81 years.' Presented by his widow 1909.

DRH Major M324

The Reverend William Henry Metcalf. Vicar of Ottery 1874-1890

Found in the Parish Church of St Mary of Ottery the memorial stone below reads 'To the glory of God and in affectionate memory of William Henry Metcalf M.A. Vicar of this Parish 1874 - 1890. This western wall of the church was adorned with carved work by the loving care of his widow 1901.'

Also on the list of Vicars at the same church was **The Reverend John William Metcalfe** M.A. 1908 - 1920.

A Visit to the Promised Land.

Turn around and return with a strong comment from my wife about Mecca Tours and wild goose chases having a lot in common.



All you need to know about Deed of Covenant

The Metcalfe Society is a Registered Charity. This status allows the society to reclaim from the Inland Revenue an amount of tax that applies to subscriptions from members who are UK taxpayers. This provides an additional income to the society **at no cost to yourself whatsoever**.

In order for the society to gain this additional income, we ask that if you or your spouse pay UK Income Tax, whether on earnings, pension, or investments (eg bank or building society interest), then please pay your subscription under a "Deed of Covenant".

How does the Deed of Covenant work?

A Deed of Covenant can be taken out at any time. Because the Metcalfe Society Covenant covers our annual subscription, the wording on the Deed is that this covers the subscription rate due at the time it is payable and is to run continuously as long as there is no power to terminate within the first four years. After this four years, it can be terminated by advising the Covenant Secretary (details below) in writing. Payments made before the date of your Deed are not, of course, covenanted.

How much income will the society receive?

The Inland Revenue will refund direct to the society, the amount of tax deemed to apply to the subscription. For example, for a £5 net subscription, tax of £1.67 is deemed to have been deducted and will be refunded to the Society each year.

What happens next?

After the first year of your Deed, the society will send you a form R185. This must be signed and returned, as without it, we cannot claim the refund of tax. All R185 forms completed by members will then be sent by the Covenant Secretary directly to the Metcalfe Society's tax office, who will in turn, forward each one to the tax office designated on it. They will verify that tax of at least the amount shown (as above) has been paid. Please be assured this takes all of one minute! When all of the verified R185 forms are returned to the Society's tax office, they will then repay the society, by cheque, to the Treasurer. We will make an annual claim for refund of tax, usually in mid-April - this is why it is imperative that all R185 forms are returned promptly. The Inland Revenue will only repay on the R185 forms which accompany our claim.

Changes to the Deed of Covenant

- * If, for any reason, you cease to be liable for Income Tax, then the Deed of Covenant ceases in the last year that tax is due.
- * If a Deed of Covenant (R185) is completed by a spouse because they pay tax and you do not, and the spouse dies, then the Deed ceases. If you pay tax in your own right after this, you can complete a Deed for the following tax year.
- * Higher rate taxpayers should advise their own tax office of the Deed, so that they can ensure that the appropriate tax relief is given in either code or assessment.
- * For family subscriptions, the Deed must be made in the name of the taxpaying member.
- * Subscriptions continue to be made in the normal way, direct to the Treasurer in January and cannot be made by standing orders.

We hope that many of you will decide to covenant your subscriptions, as we are sure you will agree, it is a very painless way of increasing society funds.
