Extracts from letters written by Joseph Brown Metcalf of Ingleton to Miss Anna Haydon ex-Devon in 1881 and 1882. They met whilst she was taking passage in 1881 to the USA with her siblings and widowed father. The letters were provide by their grandson William M D Roe M871.

S.S.Hibernian, Baltimore, December 18th, 1881. My Dear Anna,

I hope you will allow me to call you so, Miss Haydon seems so cold and formal. I was indeed very glad to hear from you. After reading it my mind was at once made up so I went in search of the Captain.....and asked for two days leave. He said the ship was so late this time that it needed our best endeavours to get the ship ready..but that next voyage there might be more time.

I got a letter yesterday from your father. I expected one. What he required was nothing more than any sensible good father would require to know from the man who wants to win his daughter. I have answered the letter to the best of my present ability.

I am sorry you can't have a photograph by Xmas....you shall have one as soon after...as it can be prepared. Of your face, Anna, I need no photograph - a lively recollection of it is always before my mind's eye - but I believe ladies .. have rather a weakness for such things. At the same time I should like you to send me one of your own.

I hope and trust most sincerely that there may be no insurmountable bar to our engagement in your father's eyes, for although necessarily we couldn't marry for some

time to come...

S.S.Hibernian, Portland, February 6th, 1882. My Darling,

Your letter dear gives me infinite pleasure for now I know we are all in all to one another. You mention money matters. Sweetheart when I asked you to be my wife, I asked you for yourself only and never gave the other a thought.....

The ship is advertised to sail from Liverpool on the 5th April. That possibly may be alteredbecause the news has come here that the "Peruvian" is in quarantine in Halifax, having that scourge on board "the small pox". .. When we do get down there again 'twill require something stronger than the captain's consent to keep me from coming. ... Anna you must not go west.

Should your papa think of going do let me know for we are separated far enough now already.

.... Nearly every night the thermometer is at zero. On Saturday night a severe snow storm came on which lasted until Sunday evening. Consequently the streets of the town are covered with snow from 2 to 5 feet thick. This is a pretty little city - in summer it must be beautiful. ..this is the teetotaller state, no spirituous liquor is allowed to be sold. Of course it is done but it has to be subtle..

You said once that you wished you had all gone to Canada to settle... In that case dear what a loser I should have been for probably we should never have met. What church have you at Warrenton and do people get married there. If so is it by license or are the banns published or do they go before a magistrate.

You say Rebecca and Ada are curious to see me. Quite natural on their part. I hope some day this spring to be able to come and be inspected. Don't you think I had better get some new teeth for the occasion?

Halifax, February 11th, 1882.

My Darling,

We left Portland on Thursday evening and arrived here at noon today. When we were coming up the coast this morning we saw a large steam ship going the other way. Well about half after four this evening the "Catalonia", one of the Cunard ships came in short of coal. It turns out that she was the vessel we saw this morning. They were looking for Halifax. This is rather a difficult place to make when unacquainted.

Have felt quite miserable for two or three days. Have got a bad cold right through the system. ... Well dear, you can hardly fancy how disappointed and grieved I was not to hear from you here - more especially as I felt certain you would write. The "Sardinian" left here 14 days ago and has not since been heard of. It is supposed she had broken her shaft. If such is the case we shall be let in for a quick dispatch when we get back....this is only a miserable attempt at a letter. Don't feel like writing a lot.. I live in expectation of a letter from you at Liverpool.

S.S.Hibernian, Portland, Maine, March 19th, 1882.

My Darling Anna,

...At home in England we have lots of nice old lanes with high old hedges and any amount of flowers. Many hours of my younger days have I spent gathering wild strawberries in those same lanes. In our part of Yorkshire I think the country will be wilder than Devon. Some parts are as mountainous and rocky ... Was pleased to hear that my photo gave you all pleasure and I trust ere six or seven weeks passes to be with you...

Next trip we shall probably encounter lots of ice on the banks of Newfoundland which might cause great delay... You might try to find out can I reach Baltimore the same night I leave Warrenton. Suppose I get away from the ship on Friday, well I should have to be back by Monday. I shan't have much grace shall I dear. Well if only

for a couple of hours of each other's company - far better than half a dozen letters... I will tell you what I have been thinking all the passage.... Our engagement doesn't seem natural unless I hear it from your own lips.... your devoted,

Halifax, Wednesday October 25th, 1882.

.... When at the wharf had some divers to see what was the matter with the propellor. They as they thought remedied the matter. Well, we got down the bay a considerable distance and found the propellor was worse than ever... This morning we had the divers again and found the real wrong. I fully expect we shan't get away from here before Friday night. To crown it the weather is so nasty and wet. ... I shall be anxious to get your letter at Baltimore.

I thought you would like some St. John's fish so I got some when there. Hope they will keep all right. I have them sewed in some canvas. ..

In spite of the trials and tribulations of a seafaring courtship Joe and Anna married at St Pauls Church, Haymarket, Prince William County, Virginia on April 16, 1883. They had six children. Joe died in 1916 and Anna in 1929.


Letter M available Spring 2001.

Canadian War Dead of WWI & II

In the Canadian Veteran Affairs website (www.vac-acc.gc.ca/general/) is to be found a listing of those Canadian soldiers who paid the ultimate price in World Wars I and II. Some twenty five Metcalf(e)s are listed (see below). In addition to the general information there is a separate page for each soldier giving brief details which might be of interest to family historians. Examples of the details for two of those listed - Alva Elmer Metcalfe and John Middlehurst Metcalfe - are after the main listing.

Linkages from the site to the Canadian Government Archives site (www.archives.ca) lists all those soldiers of the First World War Canadian Expeditionary Force including some 65 Metcalf(e)s. They indicate the soldiers place of birth and copies of the actual service records can be obtained.

The item A Metcalfe Clockmaker (Issue 60 - April 2000) was very interesting as I have recently discovered a watch and clockmaker in my branch of Metcalfe's. When my father died there was amongst his possessions a very old and tattered business card for H Metcalf, FBHI, Certificated Watch and Clockmaker and Optician with an address in Bayswater, London. I now know that this was my father's

uncle who was born in Newcastle upon Tyne son of my great grandfather Ralph who was also a watchmaker in Newcastle. On the reverse of the card was a small newspaper cutting which read William Metcalfe Watchmaker and Jeweller of Middlesbrough. This is Henry's brother born in 1876 in Whickham, Co. Durham. but I have been unable to find out anything about his business. In my search I contacted a Mr Osborne who has compiled an index of watch and clockmakers. The list of Metcalfe's has been sent to our archivist. (If you are interested contact the Society's archivist - Ed.)



Edward Metcalfe, a retired Yorkshire sheepfarmer, aged ninety-two, recognised that his time had at last come, turned his face to the wall, and prepared to depart in peace. 
From DRH Major M324 information from a non-member George Metcalf that in the past there "was another notorious Metcalfe in Earby as the Minister of Mount Zion Baptist Church which seated 800. The church was full simply because no one knew what this fiery Metcalfe was going to say next." Also around Llanrwst in Caernarvonshire there is a tiny colony of Metcalfes who are Welsh speaking. Apparently there is nothing these Welsh Metcalfes enjoy more than a good family row over their inheritance!

NAPOLEON' COFFIN

They came in the night but it was not until well after daylight they managed to open the mahogany coffin. Even then "....there are still three caskets to unseal: one lead, one wood and the third tin. The lid of the last one is lifted off carefully. The doctor parts the padded satin wrapped around Napoleon's body.".

So reads an extract from **The Dark Room at Longwood by Jean-Paul Kauffmann**. The author was a kidnap victim in Beirut between 1985 and 1988; around the time John Mc Carthy, Brian Keenan and Terry Waite were also captive. A Frenchman, who claims to have no great liking for Napoleon, he is fascinated by him especially his latter years. He goes to St Helena; Napoleon's exile home for some six years till his death in May 1821, to experience the Emperor's emotion at his incarceration on an island so far from civilisation.

I found the book somewhat dark and brooding; St Helena and Longwood seem to be permanently damp, humid and cloudy, with the buildings under constant attack from termites. The author finds little to enjoy and the thought does cross your mind that he is trying to exorcise his own period of captivity. However the book is interesting as we have our own family connection to Napoleon through James Metcalfe

a carpenter on the island in the early 1800's, who carried out repairs to the fabric of Longwood watched by the Emperor (see Mecca News Issue 50). James also made the mahogany coffin enclosing the mortal remains of Bonaparte which is dug up for return to France in October 1840. The coffin is housed in the Porphyry tomb in Les Invalides, Paris. Another instance where the Metcalfe family are involved in major episodes of history.

One disappointment of the book is there is no specific mention of James Metcalfe, who was in and out of Longwood and often around Napoleon, but don't let that or my comments put you off reading it for yourself. It gives a flavour of what life must have been like until very recently for all inhabitants based on an island nearly 1000 miles away from the next piece of land. Published by the Harvill Press in 1999 it is available from all major bookshops (I got mine from Waterstones!) for £6.99.

My Great Uncles

Edgar George Metcalf was born in 1901 and his brother Laurence Bernard Metcalf in 1904. Great grandsons of James Metcalf and Maria Cranney (married in Chelsea, London in 1819), who arrived in Tasmania in 1821, they both joined an engineering firm in Perth Western Australia by 1930. Edgar returned to Tasmania after a time but when in 1933 Laurence decided to start his business he invited his brother to join him. E & L Metcalf Pty Ltd was established and was a very successful venture.

In World War II they were both man-powered between 1939 and 1942 and worked for Government contract submarine servicing and making bomber parts and aviation parts.

E & L Metcalf continued successfully until 1970 when Edgar sold his shares to Laurence and his family. Now Laurence's son Geoffrey manages the business in the manufacture of water pumps which they developed in the 1950's. These are supplied under Government contract to major water schemes of the towns and industry of North Western, Western and South Western Australia.

Our Old Friend Metcalfe

Judith Noel married Ralph Milbanke on 9 January 1777. Their daughter Anne Isabella Milbanke married Lord Byron in 1815 and separated from him the following year.

The Noels and the Milbankes exchanged letters for some 25 years in the late 18th century and a book The Noels and the Milbankes "Their Letters for 25 Years" 1767 - 1792 by Malcolm Elwin was published by Macdonald, London in 1967.

In a letter dated Friday 26 June 1789, Judith, writing from Richmond to her aunt Mary Noel, who had brought up her and her two sisters after their mother died in 1761, says ".. 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
