Is it summer or is it Christmas!!



An American Line

On the 17th February 1848 at Melbecks Chapelry, Swaledale twenty four year old Lister Washington Metcalfe married Elizabeth Peacock seemingly in a hurry as on 14 June 1848 she gave birth to a son - John. Whether Lister thought it expedient to put distance between himself and Elizabeth's parents, particularly as they had obviously anticipated marriage, is nor clear, but within a short time

they and the baby left the Gunnerside area where they had been born and made their way to Liverpool.

There they took a ship to New Orleans and then the Mississippi paddle steamer intending to sail up to Wisconsin to join other Swaledalers who had emigrated either to buy land and begin farming or to work in, or in



some cases, own the leadmines in the area.

Like the others that had gone before they were hoping for a better life but it was not to be. The New Orleans area at that time was an unhealthy place with yellow fever and cholera rife. About half way through the journey to Wisconsin, in the vicinity of St Louis, Elizabeth contracted cholera and died. She was buried near by and Lister continued on up to a mining camp with his young son. There he worked for two years before making enough money for himself and John to return to England. How he managed to cope with the loss of his wife, and keep the baby alive in a new and strange country is a mystery. Help may have come from friends or even relatives from Swaledale who had gone before him. Nonetheless, he must have been a very strong and determined man, like the rest of the Metcalfe clan.

Arriving back in England by early 1851, Lister, whose mother was dead, took young John to his late wife's parents in Gunnerside. There he lived until when about fourteen on the death of his grandparents he had to fend for himself. Later he married, went to Liverpool and became a successful corn merchant.

John seemingly never returned to America but his father Lister married for a second time at Grinton Parish Church in 1854 and in 1861, he with his wife,

Elizabeth Harker and his two daughters (Margaret Anne and Mary Isabella) emigrated again to the USA. They went to Schullsburg in Wisconsin where they had four girls (Rose Hannah, Elizabeth, Laura and Annie Rebecca) together with a boy, Joseph William and so an American line was formed. Lister Washington died in Schullsburg in March 1904 aged 80 and was buried in the local Evergreen Cemetery.

As previously reported, the members at the last AGM voted unanimously in favour of a reprint of the book under the following guidelines:

- *It could be done on a similar financial basis
- *The appearance would be of the quality of the first edition
- * The only changes to content would be a few error corrections and the provision of an index
- *The index would also be provided to all those who had bought the first edition, as we hold all contact details.

Since then the project has been taken forward. Derek Copson, a professional indexer, has now created an index free of charge, and so we are extremely grateful for his time and services. Warwick Metcalfe (M256) and our President. Charles S. Metcalfe (M305) are compiling the corrections.

Once the corrections have been finalised, we will then be able to advise you of the proposed cost and availability. Assuming the cost proposals are feasible and the project is approved to proceed, the book could be available in 2002, but certainly not this year. As before, Diane Howarth (M409) is coordinating the marketing and financial aspects of the book project. When the book has been produced, Alan Vickers (M843) has very kindly offered to manage the order process and liaise with our shippers to deliver the books around the world. So watch this space for the next instalment!

REPORTS:

CHAIRMAN: David thanked the Committee for their continued hard work. He will represent the Society at the Federation AGM.

FRANCIS HENRY MEDCALF

Toronto's first County Master

Francis Henry Medcalf was born May 10, 1803, in Delgany, County Wicklow, Ireland. He came to Canada as a boy in 1819, remaining until the age of twenty-one. At this time he moved to the United States where he lived until 1839, during which time he married, before returning to Toronto. He trained as a black-smith and millwright becoming a pioneer of the foundry and machine business, one of the first of that line in the city of Toronto, and he established his first foundry on Queen Street East between Yonge and Victoria Streets. He also built on at the Don River, known as the Don Foundry and Machine Shops. This foundry built threshing machines, steam engines, grist and sawmills. Later he purchased another on King Street.

His home was close to his business - a large house at King and Queen Streets in the east end of the city. Prominent in the financial world of Toronto, he was

also a member of City Council and served as alderman for St. Lawrence Ward in 1860, St. David's in 1863, 1867, and 1868. On January 6, 1864 he was elected mayor of the city of Toronto. He later represented St. John's Ward in 1870 and 1871 and was re-elected mayor in 1874 and 1875. During his term of office he represented the city as mayor at the Lord Mayor's banquet held in Guildhall, London, England on July 29, 1875.

A staunch Conservative, he was an active member of the Church of England in Canada. He was for a time the Master of L.O.L. No. 275 before becoming, in 1860 became the first County Master of the newly created County Orange Lodge of Toronto. He later became the Grand Mas-



ter of the Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West from 1862-1864, the second person to hold that office.

One of his sons, Edward Medcalf, was also an Orangeman and a member of the Royal Black Knights, served on the gunboat 'Rescue' on Lake Erie during the Fenian Raids under a Captain Master McMaster. During these same raids Mayor Medcalf served in one of the Canadian regiments at the Battle of Lime Ridge. Edward held the office of lodge master of Temperance L.O.L. 301 in 1884 and 1885.

Francis Medcalf died on March 26, 1880 at the age of seventy-seven in Toronto.

We didn't think it could better but it was!

We often repeat the phrase, 'if you have a family history in Yorkshire, a Metcalfe will pop up somewhere in your line'. That comment is substantiated each and every year as visitors talk to us at the Metcalfe Society stand at the Yorkshire Family History Fair which is always held at the end of June at York Racecourse. The following can be added to the above phrase: '....and you can't afford to miss the Yorkshire Family History Fair'. This is not just if you are interested in the Metcalfe line.

Over 3,000 people attended this year's fair on a hot summer's day. With well over 100 stands, there is a great deal for everyone - from the beginner to the expert at a location with excellent facilities and access. We surpassed our own previous records on all fronts - 4 new members, 1 rejoined member, over £300 revenue and 16 current members visited the stand to say hello.

Normally we would list all your names but we just don't have the space for you all! So thank you to each of you for taking the time - we thoroughly enjoyed meeting you all.

Checkout the diary of events in this journal for many new fairs that are coming along over the forthcoming months, many of which in the North of England are being organised by Northern Family History Fairs, the same organisers of the York fair. "TO ESCAPE THE MONSTER'S CLUTCHES"

NYCRO Pub: 15 Nov. 1977

Fright of a Napoleonic invasion 1792 onwards.

In response to the circular a meeting was held at Richmond on 25 April 1799 and warrants were ordered to be issued to constables of townships for the collection of information required by the act. Lists of men aged between 15 and 60 were to be compiled, distinguishing those in volunteer caps and those willing to be armed or otherwise employed in the defence of the country, the Quakers, aliens and infirm people; and numbers and quantities of boats, waggons, horses, provisions etc. were to be collected. Returns of this information were evidently made for on the following 21 May a general meeting of Lieutenancy ordered that imperfect returns which had been received should be sent back to constables for amendment, but (apart from the single example printed below) they do not appear to have survived among local records.

William Chaytor drafted a plan of action for his own village of Spennithorne in case of invasion in close conformity with the forms circulated by government. Subscribers to the plan promised that "we will mark our cattle sheep and horses with the initial letters of our respective names & places of abode drive the same and remove our waggons & carts & other live & dead goods to such places of security as may be pointed out to us by any of the Deputy Lieutenants a Justices of the Peace "

In each of the constituent townships of the parish, Spennithorne, Harmby and Bellerby, a named individual was to remain in his residence "so long as the same shall not actually be in the possession of the enemy for the purpose of pointing out to His Majesty's forces where supplies of provisions are deposited & to take receipts for the use of the proprietors.., & to assist in destroying" parts which would otherwise fall into enemy hands. Subscribers were to render useless the mills, by breaking the upper stones, and the ovens, by breaking their crowns. And finally they were to form themselves into a company of pioneers and to offer to serve in various capacities.

He also drew up a list of the men of Spennithorne aged between 15 and 60. Example from a list of 44:-

Edwd. Metcalfe, farmer Provisl. Cavalry. West York Militia. having:-2 cows; 2 young cattle or colts; 4 sheep; 1 pig; 1 draft horse; 1 cart.

Also in document:- Captain Richard Metcalfe of Loyal Dales Volunteers commanded by Col. Turner Straubenzee (In 1809 Straubenzee had enrolled

1203 men and paid their 2 guineas bounty before he heard that he should only have 1080, and wanted to know what to do with the surplus 123 men: if not permitted to remain or be transferred he would lose 246 guineas bounty money and nearly as much more in clothing.)

Among a list of 426 persons in Hang West Division 1799 who paid for horses may be found -

Burton & Waldon - Wm. Metcalf. Avsgarth - Georg. Metcalf. East Wittain - John Metcalf Carperby - Bryan Metcalf. Thornton Rust - Richd. Metcalf. Chrs. Metcalf. Thoralby - Jas. Metcalf. High Abbotside - David Lambert. (The Chairman ???)

In case of an invasion - for Kirkleatham in October 1801, 113 men were between 15 and 60; 9 were incapable of active service and 176 were incapable of removing themselves. Among the latter was Mary Metcalf's family of 5.

- for Marske, Thos. Metcalf, farmer was one of 89 between 15 and 60.
- the same group for Skelton included John Metcalf, clogger.

The constable of Westerdale added the following note - "I have asked several in what station they would wish to serve in in case of Emergency. Some wish to be drivers of Cattle, others of Wagons, & others not thinking themselves competant to make the wisest & best choice, therefore leave it to his Majesty, or whome he may appoint to choose for them & if better weapons are not provided, they will take their threshing instruments to defend his Majesty and their own property."

Beacons:- It was proposed that beacons particularly at Huntcliff, Rowcliff, Roseberry Toppin, Eston Nab & Hambleton End be erected with "an intelligent steady serjeant and three men, who should encamp and be stationed at each place". "The serieant employed on this important duty will be allowed 1s. 6d. per day and each man 9d., and 9d. per day will be allowed to provide straw and fuel to the party."

Problems followed in March 1805. "Frank Dennison of Thornton [Watlass] came to inform me (Timothy Hutton acting commander Masham Volunteers 125 men) the beacon had been lit in the night. Took the alarm & call'd the volunteers out at Masham & prepared with all possible speed down to Thirsk where we found the alarm was false."

However some problems had their compensations:-

"That the sum of ten guineas be remitted to the commanding officer of the Masham Volunteer Infantry with a request that he will present the same to the non-commissioned officers and private men in the name of this committee as a mark of their approbation of the great zeal and activity of the corps in assembling and marching fully equiped on service to a considerable distance upon the occasion of the late alarm of the beacon being fired."

A footnote can be found - "The usual custom of burning heath, ling or whins which universally prevails in the more elevated districts of this county, **Charles Metcalfe M305** cannot, I am afraid, be entirely suspended."



The reference to Nappa Hall in issue 63 reminded me of a visit I made around 1940 when I was stationed in Bedale.

Part of my equipment was a 500cc Norton motor cycle. One day on patrol up the dale I called on the tenants (whose name I have forgotten) who lived in the main tower. On the ground floor was a big kitchen/living room. The thickness of the walls was quite impressive. The bedrooms were on the floors above and the daughter showed me her room. It was big and oak panelled, behind the panels were storage cupboards. All the woodwork was painted blue which to me gave it an authentic look. When the house was built all exposed woodwork would have been painted. The current fashion for oak beams and panels to look dark stark and aged is comparatively new. Connecting the main tower with a smaller one was a long room referred to as "the banqueting hall". It was furnished with a long dining table and chairs and little else. The small tower at the far end was unoccupied and in a neglected state.

I rode back to Bedale happy to have seen the ancestral home and began another journey which would end in Emden, North Germany.

Also after George Metcalfe married in Hawes 1786, then lived in Garsdale but where was he baptised? 


