Family's Twin Record : Likeness that led to Amusing incidents.

(The following is a copy of a newspaper item that my mother preserved for many years from the "Daily Chronicle" Dec. 31, 1926. The people mentioned are her father and uncle and two cousins. **Joe Awmack M379.**)

Two pairs of "Identical" male twins belonging to one family, and the four men composing them still living and still mystifying relatives and friends by their extraordinary similarity in appearance and habits, must surely be unique in twin history.

Dr. G. P. Crowden of the Institute of Physiology, University College, London, who is investigating the subject of the psychology of twins, may be interested to hear that these two twins are two uncles and two nephews, And that the latter, although now living miles apart, have remained exactly alike in every way.

The uncle twins, aged 73, are: Councillor F. G. Metcalfe, a retired draper, of Ripon, and his brother John James Metcalfe, also of Ripon. The nephew twins, aged 42, are: Walter Henry Metcalfe, of Edlington (Doncaster) and his brother, Francis George Metcalfe, of South Bank, near Middlesborough.

The identity of the two younger twins puzzles even their mother, who admitted to me to-day that she is not quite sure which of her sons she is

living with at South Bank. She told me that when they were children she differentiated between them by pinning a pink ribbon on one and a blue ribbon on the other. "But," she added, "I never could tell whether I once accidentally changed the ribbons or not." In view of this, the twins themselves are uncertain as to "which is which."

Although these twins have been living for years past in different towns, they are, I'm told, still exactly alike in appearance, feelings, and even hobbies, particularly that of bell-ringing.

Tales of the uncle twins include the following: When Councillor Metcalfe, the draper, was going on his honeymoon, someone presented him with a cheque for £25, which was intended for Mr. Metcalfe, the undertaker. On another occasion, Mr. Metcalfe, the undertaker, was pursued in the street by a man who, mistaking him for his draper brother, who is also a tailor, insisted upon being measured for a suit. When Councillor Metcalfe was mayor in 1910, people frequently hailed his brother with "Good morning, your worship"

IT'S ALL IN THE GENES

Part III - A not Inconsiderable Fortune

The Third article in an irregular series about the family of Theophilus John the Scribe.

Theophilus John (Theo John) the eldest son of Thomas Theophilus and Susanna Selina Sophia Metcalfe was born 19th September 1783 at Calcutta, then the administrative centre for that part of India controlled by the East India Company (EIC). Returning to England in the late 18th century with his parents and brother Charles Theophilus (Chas Theo) the brothers were sent to school at Clapton East London. After about a year they both went to Eton, where the greater intellect of Chas Theo began to show. This caused some jealousy between the two.

After he left school Theo John joined the Regency Jet Set, a young man, good looking and in line for an absolute fortune, the world lay at his feet. Then came the Bomb Shell. In 1799 his father told him he was to become a writer (an EIC term for junior civil servant) in Canton. In a brotherly moment Chas Theo said he would ask to go in his place, but he in turn was informed that he was to go to Bengal as a writer! (1) China was chosen, due to the legacy left by Lord Clive. The EIC was on its way from a profitable company to a bankrupt independent department of the Government. Lord Clive had agreed to collect the Tax revenue for the Ruler of Bengal, thereby changing, forever the roll of the EIC. They had to create a civil service and their army became a much larger organization. Effectively all their profit went in running these two departments. A private company was trying to run a country (2).

On his voyage to the Far East on the ship Exeter Theo John was allowed £40 for expenses. This was supplemented when the ship was involved in the capture of two French ships called La Concorde & La Medee off St Helena for which he was awarded £3 19 0½ Batta or prize money.

Once in China Theo John met and married Selina Sophia Russell in 1804. Their only daughter Eliza Debonnair was born in 1809, but his wife died soon after on the 30th October 1809 She was buried in the garden of a house called St Autouris in Canton. Whilst in China Theo John must have found that the post was not as boring as he thought when he expressed reluctance at his appointment. In 1808 whilst living in Macao, he was asked, as the EIC representative, for help by the local officials to stop pirate activity in the area. Again on the 13th July 1810 when Lord Amherst was about to set sail for England after the apparent failure of his attempt to establish an embassy in China, Theo John sent a boat to tell him of the Imperial edict and requested him to proceed to Tientsin.

Theo John may well have fallen out with the EIC as he returned to England shortly afterwards; an action he apparently regretted as on the 12th February 1811 he wrote requesting to be allowed to return and apologized for not having learnt all he should about the company exports to China. This was clearly refused as on the 31st January 1813 he again wrote asking to be allowed to return to China.

The EIC installed a group of men who were charged with the day to day running of the company's activities in China. This was called the Select Committee; appointments were on an annual basis. From April 1812 to 1814 he was superintendent to the companies exports from Canton at a salary of £4036. On 26th November 1815 the third place on the select committee was given to Theo John on the death of one of the other members. However he was absent in Manila and Calcutta on holiday with Chas Theo, his brother and did not return to Canton until the 30th May 1816, when he was appointed president of the committee.

The Tea trade was very, very profitable to the EIC. This was shown when on the 15th March 1818, the Chinese Viceroy demanded that all the tea crates be opened on the dockside. Theo John, back in the Far East, refused saying the company seal could not be broken and the goods should only be inspected in the factory. The crates were not opened. Theo John returned to England on the 20th May 1819 on a medical certificate, never to return.

Back in England, and with overtones of the present, Theo John paid £200 for two lottery tickets, numbers 2495 & 2769 in May and September of 1820. They were lucky for him as he won £440 in total (3). With those winnings and his not inconsiderable fortune he built a large house - Cranbourn Court in the grounds of Fernhill Park.

Theo John died in 1822, and was buried in the family vault at Winkfield. In the inventory taken after his death there are listed 1,400 items of which there were 179 shirts, 127 socks, over 500 books, 394 trousers & draws (underpants) and 1714 items of china (3). In the Public Record Office there are over 50 references to Theo John, unfortunately many of them are in Mandarin Chinese and some relate to correspondence between his daughter, her aunt, and the lawyer about the monies due to his estate by the Hong Merchants in Canton.

His will left a bequest "To my friend Anna Harria de Nozario I do bequeath on condition of her consenting to all children of whom I am the supposed father being sent to England the sum of two thousand dollars for the purchase of a house "There was a further sum of £5000" to be held for the use and benefit of my reputed child Ann who was baptized by me on the 15th of April 1818 and which my friend Anna Harria de Nozario was delivered "A second sum of £5000" for the use and benefit such child or children as may be born to me by the safe delivery from Anna Harria de Nozario". Eliza Debonnair Metcalfe married, much to the relief of her family, Peter Hesketh in 8 June 1826 and was left a trust fund by her father. However she died on 16th January 1833, soon after the death of her small children.

In 1959 a relation of Theo John one Lt Col John Ricketts allowed the British Library to copy onto micro film all his family papers. One of which was a portrait of Theo John. The Library has lost the film, and I have not yet been able to trace any descendants of Lt Col Ricketts to try and obtain a copy

The scope of duties are:

- * Processing applications from new members which involves :

Blind Jack's Violin

Dr Anold Kellett writes "In the Midst of my research on John Metcalf (1717 - 1810) better known as Blind Jack of Knaresborough, I have come across a reference to his violin whose whereabouts I would like very much to establish. Most people - especially in the Metcalfe Society - will have heard of Blind Jack as a pioneer of road building. But his other occupation was as a fiddler at the growing spa of Harrogate and in the country houses round about. This is something we managed to bring out in the retelling of Blind Jack's colourful life on Radio 4 (20 August 2001) which some of you may have heard.

What Intrigues me is an entry in the catalogue for an exhibition of The Art and Industry of the Blind held in Church House Westminster London in 1914. Item 251 is described as 'Blind Jack's Violin' loaned by Mr E S Metcalfe but no address is given. This is presumably a relation, but could not have been a direct descendant as Blind Jack left behind no sons - but four daughters, twenty grandchildren and ninety great and great-great arandchildren.

I would be most grateful if anybody could track down the family of E S Metcalf and perhaps help me to locate the famous fiddle. To have it played again would be worthy of another radio programme!"

Shortly after receiving the above David Lambert, our Chairman, sent me the following piece on Blind Jack. "I saw this in the Yorks. Archeology Journal Vol 73 for 2001, page 129 an article entitled 'Independent Volunteer Forces' by Jonathan Oates regarding the 1745 Jacobite Rebellion.

....The men included the remarkable Jack Metcalf, blind musician and roadmaker, who not only assisted in recruiting but later acted as a spy on the rebels after Falkirk."

The men of whom Jack was one, were armed and equipped by William Thornton, a squire from Cattal near Knaresborough, who was a captain in the North Riding Association. He unilaterally detached his men to the army of Wade in October 1745. He selected his men from 140 who came forward (including I conclude Blind Jack). Thornton's men accompanied Wade to Morpeth on 4 November 1745 and served at the battle of Falkirk 17 January 1745/46. (Did Jack do so?)"

Chairman's Report

This is the time of year when we reflect on the year which is now passing and look forward to the New Year.

Our Society has enjoyed another successful year. If it was measured in terms of new members alone, it would be staggeringly successful. Margaret Metcalfe during the last 18 years has been our Treasurer and was able to retire in the knowledge that she had a successor, although it was a close run thing as by the end of the AGM there was still no volunteer to do the job on a permanent basis. George Buxton offered to do the job temporarily if we did not find any volunteer but by the end of the afternoon Carol stepped forward. I thank George for the offer. Thanks go too to President Charles for preparing the text for the new Birth Brief booklet which was on sale at the Muster. You will recall that he had sneaked off around the world to do this last winter but ended up having to do it again owing to various mishaps.

We elected two new Committee members namely, Eileen Measures and Lesley Longworth. The other existing Officers agreed to stand again. Eileen has taken on the role of Archivist and is so dedicated that she has acquired a bigger flat to accommodate the job!

Subscriptions were agreed at last year's level. May I remind those of you, who are tax payers, that you can help the Society to recover tax back from the Inland Revenue by making a Gift Aid to the Society. I would like to thank on your behalf all of the volunteers who have assisted the Society this year. I would like to particularly mention Susan Harper who set up our Website for us. With Carol Herbert's expertise I feel sure that it will develop greatly in the future. If you have never seen the site or have not looked at it for some time I suggest you do so. It looks and is different! There is no doubt that the expansion of research via the Internet is here to stay whether we like it or not.

The next year will see us considering how we are to make available to **all** members, whether they have access to a computer or not, our compendious records, or at least some part of them. The Committee is conscious that we are custodians for **all** of our members of the archives we have been given or the data we have created over the past 21 years.

May I conclude in wishing you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy 2002, (using I trust your Metcalfe Society Christmas cards to do likewise).

Though the number of attendees was down on last year, many visitors browsed round the stands at length. Requests via email are welcome but should postage costs be incurred you are expected to reimburse the Society eventually. In this age of so many computer bugs/virus/worms etc please always place your Membership Number in the "Subject" section.

If you disagree with any aspect of the information sent to you, please do let us know. We are always willing to discuss any conflict of opinion and to amend/adjust where necessary.

Whether you receive reams of information, or a very little, please remember it is common courtesy to acknowledge it's safe arrival and a thank-you works wonders and wins lots of Brownie points!

"MY COLONIAL METCALFES IN AUSTRALIA" by Robyn E Metcalfe M669

Michael Metcalfe my great grandfather was born into a shipping family in Hull East Yorkshire in 1813. His early education was centered around the port of Hull and he went to sea at an early age. When he was eighteen he joined the St Catherine's Dock Co where he learned much more about commerce, ships and the shipping trade. This was to fit him well for his future life as a customs agent, commercial ship owner and businessman in early colonial Sydney. This future city owed it's very existence to ships and shipping of all kinds. This, arguably the most beautiful harbour in the world, has seen thousands of ships ply its waters from the First fleet in 1788.


Michael's mother Ann (Bell) Metcalfe's family also had connections to the sea with her brothers buying ships from Michael's father (also Michael). At times both families has shares in the same ship so their lives were very intertwined at the commercial level and also at the social level as demonstrated by the marriage of Michael and Ann.

Both Michael's uncle, John Bell and a relative, John Metcalfe owned and mastered ships which came to New South Wales (NSW) and Van Dieman's Land (Tasmania) during the very early days. John Bell owned and captained the "Minerva", a vessel of 530 tons, which carried 160 male prisoners and a detachment of the 48th Regiment from Cork to Hobart Town and Launceston (both in Tasmania) and Sydney Cove, NSW. John Metcalfe owned both the "Burrell" and the "William Lockerby". The "Burrell" left Plymouth on 27 July 1830 carrying 193 male prisoners and a detachment of the 17th Regiment, including Surgeon Superintendent William West to Tasmania; whilst the "William Lockerby" carried Scottish emigrants to Sydney Cove via the Cape of Good Hope, leaving in May 1836. Another vessel, the "Saint George", also owned and mastered by John Metcalfe, carried passengers from London to the colony at Port Jackson (Sydney) returning via Batavia (Java) and Madras (India). Thus it is not surprising that both my great grandfather, Michael and his brother John (b 1817) had the sea well and truly coursing through their veins!

The first time Michael sailed through Sydney Heads on the London Missionary ship "Camden" in 1836. He had come to visit his uncle Hutchinson Bell who worked in the Customs House , today a magnificent building situated at Circular Quay. The view of the early colony and the harbour dotted with ships at anchor would have been stunning from the sailing ship as it sailed through Sydney Heads. This is still the best way of seeing Sydney in any century! Even then the colony was growing fast as many settlers came out shortly after the

First Fleet in 1788. It is a misconception to believe that only convicts came to NSW during its embryo years. Many of the early settlers were whalers and sealers of the Great Southern Ocean. The young Michael evidently saw an exceptional opportunity to secure a future for himself using his knowledge of shipping and commerce learned in his native Yorkshire.

Hutchinson Bell. Michael's uncle had come from Ireland in 1828 arriving in Sydney Cove on 6 October accompanied bv a Jane Metcalfe, (listed as a servant) and in the following vears acquired three allotments / farms from the owners. These were at Leckonfield Thorngumbald and Nafferton which are now near or part of the present Sydney Airport adjacent to Botany Bay. This family connection led to Michael at the



age of twenty four being offered a position by his uncle in the Civil Service at Custom House, Circular Quay. He was pleased to accept and stayed there for twenty years until he embarked into business life for himself as a customs agent, commercial ship owner and insurance broker at lower George Street, now commonly known as "The Rocks". Michael involved himself in social activities together with church and other philanthropic endeavours. Port Jackson was to be no "fatal shore" for Michael.

Michael's brother John Bell Metcalfe was also lured to Sydney Town and set up a business in commercial shipping and insurance at Macquarie Place. He

married Charlotte Williams Brindley in 1840 but in 1864 he sold his shipping and insurance business to his brother Michael and returned to England, where his wife and family lived at Belsize Park, Middlesex.

We know that Michael involved himself in the social life of Sydney Town and soon after his arrival from England he was mentioned in the "Australian" newspaper as attending various concerts and is noted in a citizens list for Bourke Ward (Sydney was divided into wards at that time). He initially resided at Wentworth Place, Elizabeth Street, Sydney which is the place where his brother John Bell Metcalfe established his shipping and insurance business.

In 1839 Michael, whilst still working at Custom House helped to establish the Australian Steamship Navigation Company being a director and auditor until 1881. He also helped to establish the Sydney Dry Dock Company and became its director in 1853. It would seem that he was ready to branch out on his own becoming involved with John Bell Metcalfe's business. By 1857 he had left the Civil Service to start his own commercial shipping agency alongside his brother and in 1864 he bought John's share of the business.

My great grandfather's business activities were wide spread in their nature. He was a chairman and shareholder, until his death, in the Newcastle Wallsend Coal Company and he helped to establish the Sydney Exchange becoming a director in 1863. In 1862 he became the Chairman and director of the Australian Gaslight Company, a company still operating today. He saw the advent of steam engines and became a director of both the Illawarra Steam Navigation Company and the Clarence & Richmond Steam Navigation Company in 1863 until hid death in 1890. His ability to manage funds and his love of education saw him as the treasurer of the Australian Library from 1858 until 1865.

Michael contributed financially to the St Andrew's Cathedral building Fund in 1868, belonging to its first Chapter. He also helped to endow the dioceses of Grafton-Armidale in country NSW in 1867 and the dioceses of Bathurst, NSW in 1869. An active fellow and bursar of St Paul's College, Sydney University from 1860 until 1885 during which time he represented the College on the Synod of the Diocese. His philanthropic activities saw him as a committee member of the Benevolent Society, as well as the Society for the Relief of Destitute Children and a director of the Sydney Infirmary and Dispensary. As a result of his charitable activities the Honourable Henry Parkes asked him to serve on the Public Charities Commission in 1875. Offered a seat on the Legislative Assembly of NSW on several occasions Michael declined on all except the last when he was considering the seat of Moreton Bay (now Queensland) at the next election. However he was thwarted in this endeavour as Queensland attained statehood when Queen Victoria was approached to con-

sider establishing a separate colony based on Moreton Bay giving her approval on 6 June 1859.

In 1845 in the new Christ Church St Lawrence Upper George Street Sydney, a church which he helped to establish and where he was the treasurer, Michael married Agnes Georgianna Robinson, daughter of George and Evelyn Robinson of Woollahra. After their marriage Michael and Agnes moved in to their home named "Llangollan" in Glebe where they raised their family of ten children. Eight lived into adulthood, the eldest son being Edward Milner Metcalfe, my grandfather. As the family was growing Michael's business acumen was making him a wealthy man with connections in all sections of the Sydney community. With this added wealth he was able to buy new homes, including a lovely rural home at St Peters, now a Sydney suburb but then a most beautiful area outside the city limits. The home called "Petersleigh" had extensive stabling for horses suggesting a family love of horses, a trait of a true Yorkshireman. It was here he died in 1890. He left an estate of £25,000.

My grandfather Edward married Marion Annie Underwood, a descendant of a very rich but "infamous" family whose large estate, known as "Ashfield Park", covered many of the now inner city suburbs of Sydney. The Underwoods came to Sydney at the end of the 18th century when the patriach, James Underwood, a merchant, sealer and whaler who bargained with the British Government and the East India Company settled in the area. His descendants fought with each other over land, money and possessions to a degree that early colonial folk of NSW were in constant state of awe and endless gossip! However my grandmother belonged to one branch of the Underwood tree which kept a low profile and were of sober habits. Also they didn't have the wealth of the others and therefore not the power.

It is perhaps ironic that the very trade in shipping which the Metcalfes made their money and power-base by bringing convicts whose descendants including Marion Annie Underwood would later marry Edward. My grandparents were married in a Wesleyan Church and I can't imagine that endeared them to Michael who was a devout High Church Anglican. Edward and Marion had five children including my father Milner. The family lived in various places, however their last home was "Corinda" at Dundas, located in a then lovely rural area on the north western outskirts of Sydney. My father trained to be an assayist at the School of Mines situated in the vicinity of the "Rocks" Sydney. In his youth he was infected by the gold bug and he visited many of the gold-rush areas of NSW to ascertain whether re-working some of the old mines would be financially viable for large exploration companies. My father married my mother, Margaret McDonald on one of these outback odesseys and they had three children before I came along 15 years after my brother!

His father, James, was described as a butcher in February 1852 when Charles married Susannah Orton at St Mary Woolnoth in the City of London - both gave their address as Lombard Street. They had one daughter, Alice Anne in 1855 when they were living in Stepney. Charles was a grocer and died in January 1864 aged 35 years in Chelmsford Essex where Susannah also died in 1890. I cannot find any other reference or record of where Charles was baptised or anything about his parents." Books

Robert Metcalfe M1220 has written a book "No Time for Dreams: A Soldier's Six-Year Journey through World War II" that covers his experiences from the late 1930's through to the end of the Second World War. Reviews of the book, published in 1997 by General Store Publishing, in the Ottawa Citizen state that "..although he (Bob) takes the listener through his memory banks with an emphasis on humour, the harder edges can be found in the book." There are vivid descriptions of the Dunkirk evacuation with air battles and planes straffing the beach full of soldiers. Although wounded he was taken by stretcher onto a ship and as the vessel started to move there was an awful screeching noise and on enquiring was told to hold his breath as a mine was dragging along the side of the ship.

There is also a description of service in Italy where he met Rommel's Italian interpreter Gallo and his future wife, who was a nurse. After the War he returned to Canada and lives in Ottawa. Try the local library or bookshop for a copy of the book.


