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
# FROM THE EDITOR




My thanks for the positive comments I have received concerning the December issue which seems to have gone down well. I hope this magazine is enjoyable as the last.

#### JOHN (BLIND JACK) OF KNARESBOROUGH

On Sunday 22 February 2009 the sun shone bright & warm and the Knaresborough Silver Band played beautifully to entertain a large crowd, who had gathered to see the unveiling of the life size seated statue, of one of Knaresborough's most famous sons, in a prominent position in the Market Place.



The project came about in June 2005 as the result of a suggestion in a letter to the Knaresborough Post. This led to a good response from interested residents & support from the Editor of the paper. Following a meeting of the Town Council, at which sculptor Barbara Asquith spoke, it was felt appropriate that Knaresborough Civic Society should progress the project & identify a suitable location in the town.

Thus began the hard task of raising the necessary funds.

Thanks to the efforts of a spirited local community, £30,000 was raised & Barbara Asquith was commissioned to begin work on creating a clay model, which led to the casting in bronze, which was unveiled by the Mayor of Knaresborough,

Councillor Pamela Godsell.

The Metcalfe Society was represented at the event by at least seven members, one of whom has sent in a family tree going back to Blind Jack which we are currently researching & two more that are almost certain to join. **Brian Metcalfe M1554** 

#### Harry Metcalfe's Cycling Journey to John O' Groats 1932

Harry Metcalfe was the uncle of Bill Metcalfe M63 who died last year. Bill's wife Joan writes "Harry although "just a weaver" in his working life was a very intelligent man with wide interests and a great love of the countryside and seeing it from the saddle of a bike. He didn't marry until he was in his mid 50's and was nearly 40 when he and a friend set off on this trip to John O'Groats. This is his diary"

Tuesdav 30 August Left (From Blacko near Colne, Lancashire - Ed) after dinner today by way of Sedbergh, Tebay, Orton to Shap. Camped a few miles from Shap on roadside. Good weather. 53 miles today.

Wednesday 31 August On to Carlisle, thence the cyclists' delight A7 the 93miles Carlisle to Edinburgh. Camped at farm 5 miles past Hawick where called last time, crippled lady lives here. Fine day. 86<sup>1/2</sup> miles today.

Thursday 1 Sept On to Edinburgh. Crossed Forth Bridge on train and then we will go via Kinross to Perth where we join A9 for Inverness. Drizzled all day. 70 miles today. Camped at farm with binder past Cowdenbeath.

Friday 2 Sept Been grand day. Farmers busy in corn. Arrived in Perth on head of Firth of Tay, thence to Dunkeld, very pretty place, wide river (Tay), mountainous and clothed with trees. On to Pitlochry and Blair Athol where we commence 17 mile climb over Grampians. Have come up wonderful valleys since Perth for scenery. Through the Pass of Killiecrankie where we had tea to-



day. Camped in croft 6 miles past Blair Athol. 70 miles today.

Saturday 3 Sept Carried on keeping the river Garry and the railway company. Wonderfully graded road. Reached the top of Drumlochter Pass, 1508 ft. Very mountainous. Going down other side good view of the Cairngorm group. Also on top enter into Inverness-shire. Near here stone erected by General



Wade who made this road 17—. Thence by Kingussie and Carron Bridge. Got another good view of the Cairngorms, 4 or 5 peaks all over 4000 ft. Inverness-shire wild scenery of mountains, rivers and heather in bloom everywhere. Spaciousness is expressed here. Arrived at Inverness about 8.30 pm. 76<sup>1/2</sup> miles today but still 140 miles to John

O'Groats. Showery today. Camped at farm, dairymaid got us milk.

Sunday 4 Sept On to Beauly and after negotiating Cromarty and Dornoch Firths arrived on coast at Golspie. Corn harvest in progress up here. Game-keeper friend informed us what fine weather they have had up here, better than we at home. Very cool, but have had fine sunshiny day. Passed over

moors bathed in purple from Alness to Bonar Bridge,. Came on to very



bad roads tonight. Camped at large road works, plenty of company. One old man told us about a stone inscribed" William, perished here 17—. Be ye also prepared" and the jovial soul laughed exceedingly. 80<sup>1/2</sup> miles today.


Monday 5 Sept John O'Groats at last. Distance from Blacko as registered by meter 482 miles. This morning was one of the bonniest - very mild and sunny. We have come up this distant coast from Gowerport to here, the sea on one hand and the corn and ploughed patches on the other. These crofters, as they are called, are very numerous where the land is passable along the shore. It is common to see sheep tethered also cows, these latter generally limited to one. How they make a living we cannot imagine. Each little house has its peat stack and coming along the smell of peat fires has assailed us at every turn. Travelled a little way with district nurse who seems a hardy cyclist and no wonder. Had a walk round tonight, the sea, the moor and the lighthouses near and distant made a picture. The coast is very rocky. Coming up this coast we could see across the Morav Firth the coast of Aberdeenshire and Lossiemouth about 60 miles away. Camped at NCU place. 561/2 miles todav.

Tuesday 6 Sept This morning very calm and mild. Had another walk to Duncansby Head, 2 miles. A keeper kindly showed us round the lighthouse there, even up the tower to the lantern. Wonderful optical work the lenses. Engines to work the syren etc. Very clean and tidy. It is possible to see 7 or 8 lighthouses at night. At night our tent was caught in the beam from D.H. every second and also from one much further off. A man pointed out to us the Skerries, the Orkneys and further away still, Kirkwall. The island of Stroma covered with the usual cottars' shacks looks only a short distance away but is 3 miles. Met Glasgow cyclist this morning who is coming along with us. Said goodbye to John O'Groats and left in fine sunshine 1 o'clock. Camped on cottar's land near Lybster. Irate lady crofter arrived to inform us it was her land. Told us a moving narrative - husband dead, son at St Andrew's University, trouble with neighbours, etc. Our cottar (nice old man) and wife provided us with bowl of milk sufficient for 3 or 4 calves, 29 miles from John O'Groats, good to be there on a fine morning.

Wednesday 7 Sept Left our kindly host and continued down the coast. Passed the village smithy at Berriedale. Scores of deer antlers on the walls provided by His Grace the Duke of Portland who had fine place near here and comes deer stalking etc. Up here is a stone to mark the killing of the last wolf 17-, also an arch over a gateway of whale jawbones, vertebrae, etc Remains of ancient Picts' dwellings along the shore. Now leaving the northern extremity of

Scotland. The innate charm, the hospitality, the industry of its people and the glimpses of its scenery are never to be forgotten. 37 miles today. Camped at Brora, by football pitch with corrugated iron surround. Still 70 miles from Inverness.

Thursday 8 Sept Off again, we two and the Glasgow friend. Breakfasted at Ragge Farm. Enough implements here to stock a dozen of our farms. One stable had 12 stalls. Dined under bridge. Wet. Dingwall Fete today, but what awful weather. Approached Inverness by fresh route. Camped behind large hoarding outside Inverness. Rough night. 66 miles.



Friday 9 Sept Inverness again after 5 days on the coast. Moderate size and busy town. Woolworth's which must be the most northerly. Left Inverness on the A82 on the 67<sup>1/2</sup> miles to Fort William by Caledonian Canal all the way. Very fine scenery. This road very much under repair. For 15 or 20 miles we continually passed road gangs with pneumatic drills, light railway excavators etc. When this road is finished surely it will be unexcelled anywhere for scenery and ease of travel. At present much cut up. Arrived Fort Augustus, half way to Fort William, not more than a village but set in scen-



ery of grandeur and romance. Forge here. Owing to bad road only 35 miles today. Stopped at camping place in Fort Augustus. Railway here but not many trains.

Saturday 10 Sept Completed the remaining length of Caledonian just after dinner. Words cannot describe this riot of hills, lofty mountains, mighty braes, the black-looking lochs, the fine views of water, woods and unending heights, the burns tumbling down the hillsides, and the waterfalls. A workman yesterday pointed out to us the scene of the Hambro tragedy on Loch Ness. The water here, 12 ft from shore, was nearly 400 ft deep. "The loch" said he "rarely gives up its dead". Today we have passed the Well of the Seven Heads. This is to commemorate the murder of the Keppoch family, a branch of the McDonell clan. As feudal justice had it the heads of the murderers were



scencollected and washed at this spring before being taken to the Chief at Glengarry Castle. The monument is inscribed in Celtic, English, Latin and French and surmounted by seven heads above which is a hand holding a dagger. Nearing Fort William is the mightiest of all the mountains, Ben Nevis, but never saw it completely owing to cloud. Fort William a lively little town. On to Ballachulish, 12 miles all way on Loch Linnhe. Crossed ferry on queer tub. Camped in croft of villager amongst most remarkable scenery I ever saw. See Scotland here. A river thunders to the loch outside our door. Very rough night. 46<sup>1/2</sup> miles today.

Sunday 11 Sept Left Ballachulish this morning. Raining. Increased later to torrents. Strong wind which carried us before it. Through Glencoe, the mountain and glen scenery being of the most wonderful. The Three Sisters magnificent. Even rain formed a picture. Lost road (more of an apology for one) at Kingshouse. Passed by Bridge of Orchy where we again found the right road. In familiar country again, seems quite tame now after what we have seen. Camped near Callendar in croft by river. 67 miles today. Just had supper. Our progress in the culinary art is amazing, stewed steak, potatoes and dumplings, flapjack, currant cake, cheese on the menu tonight.

Monday 12 Sept Very fine this morning. Invaded Callendarthen on 17 miles to Stirling where we stopped the afternoon. This is our third visit here but never knew it was so large a place. Woolworth's 2 floors. Very historical place. Visited the Castle (6d (2<sup>1/2</sup>p)) and were informed in all its history it was never taken. Resisted the whole English army in 13 -. No wonder when you look over parapet. John Knox the martyr in graveyard. Saw soldiers on parade - part of Castle is barracks. Went to Field of Bannock burn. Chat with guide who dilated on tips and on dialects. People can't tell where we come from. One man put us down as London even. A shopkeeper cyclist voted for



Isle of Skye. Carried on to Dennyloanhead then 17 miles to Lanark where we camped at farm. Talk with farmer who was fettling front wheel. 36<sup>1/2</sup> miles today.

Here the day-to-day diary ends with this final entry. The little tent has behaved nobly under (sometimes) trying



conditions and kept us snug throughout.

It also is impervious to the most violent language such as is occasional, by pans upsetting etc.

This of course is the language of campology.

IT could be all too easy to be dismayed with life at present!

The economic situation is no better and the news about our Banking institutions is, as I write my chairman's jottings, to say the least troubling. For years the country, as a whole, has not 'enjoyed' a sustained period of really cold winter weather. Probably a lot of you like me have been plaqued with a virus which 'boomerangs' back after about 14 days: I am on my third dose which started the week before Christmas leaving coughing and spluttering at irregular intervals! It reminds me that its not just computers that get viruses! In about 14 days time I celebrate (if that is the right word!) a 'big' birthday ending in a zero; another decade gone and how fast it has done so!

However, we should not despair! I found it a little warmer today and even saw the sun. The birds were searching for nesting material and I saw my first snowdrops and also crocuses which surely portends warmer weather, longer days with shorter nights and spring. Surely there cannot be hose pipe bans to come in the summer or reports of reservoirs at an all time low after the rain and snow we have enjoyed this winter! Chairman's Jottings

I saw an interesting article in the Yorkshire Dalesman for the month of February which commented upon the absence of a hard long and cold winter, the last such being that of 1962-3. It was interesting to read that the year of 1716 was estimated to be one of the coldest on record. In 1740 the temperature never rose above freezing for 2 months. That of 1947 will be remembered by some of you as the worst in your memory I suspect. The author reminds us that 5 feet (1 ½ metres ) of snow fell in Teesdale and that in Hawes there was snow piled 10 feet (3 metres) deep along the main street! Our weather records have incidentally been kept for about 300 years and if you are interested, it is fascinating to look at the Meteorological office website and records on http://www.metoffice.gov.uk/climate/uk/about/archives.html

How fortunate though we are in the UK when compared with the horrendous bushfires fires in Australia, where the temperatures have been over 100 degrees Fahrenheit (40 centigrade). I hope that none of your relatives or friends have been affected by these calamitous events. A large number of Metcalfes of course willingly (or maybe unwillingly) went to Australia and New Zealand and settled there in the 19th and 20th centuries. Our local Society agents keep us in touch with them and have proved to be important links between the Society and its members especially in the days before Paypal and the internet. They eased the administrative burden on the officers of the Society in the UK when we had only a few committee members and volunteers.

The Society has for some time promised you that records would be made available on the internet via our website. I am delighted to report that Carol was able to 'go live' on 21 January with access to parts of our huge Metcalfe Index on our Website. She refers in greater detail in this edition to what is available and how to use the facility. I am very grateful to her for making this happen. The information is for members only. The access does not make our redoubtable archivists' task redundant. You should still contact Brian for assistance and he, Nina and Edwin will delve and try to answer your guery. Edwin has to have a major operation in a few days time, as I write this, so I wish him well and a speedy recovery by the time you (and he) read this.

If you have not done so, do try to use the 1911 Census which is now available, in part, 2 years earlier than planned. I thought that it would not be terribly interesting: I knew where everyone was living by then didn't I? Well no was the definite answer when I became hooked and tried to find my ancestors and collateral lines of uncles and aunts. Unexpected entries soon were revealed and details of where the head of the household said relatives were born. How long they had been married was a real boon and also how many children they had had born alive and who were still living. Employment status too is very useful, as is the number of rooms in the house. Do give it a try if you have not done so. The drawback is that you do have to pay for copies of the transcription of your ancestor's handwritten form, signed by him or her but it is less for a copy of the details in transcribed form. The search index itself is free though. See http://www.1911census.co.uk/. I am certain you find it worthwhile.

Likewise an investment in a place at the 2009 Muster. See the preliminary details in the Mecca News for our 2009 Muster; put the date in your 2009 diaries if it is not already there!! I think it promises to be a great event with perhaps some special local connections. The drawback of writing this before our committee meeting is that I cannot say too much as it is in the planning stage!!

We have only really just recovered from our major 25th anniversary celebrations or so it seems to me! Like me and my birthday, time marches on for next year we will celebrate our 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary! The committee is looking at ways to celebrate this next year and we will be able to make some announcements about this in the August Mecca News and certainly at the Muster in October this year.

So things are not as grim after all !!

How am I celebrating my birthday? On a whim I am going with my nephew and 2 nieces and their husband and fiancé respectively to Las Vegas for a few days. I won't be playing on the gaming tables (the £ to the \$ makes this unwise and a bit unlikely!) but my great grandfather, who married a Metcalfe wife, was a bookie so maybe there is something in the genes I ought to put to q the test? **David Lambert M11**

Has t'a been there? Into the cave hidden under the waterfall? No? Look, o'er yonder.' He pointed across the valley. 'Tha can see where the gill flows into the Swale, below those old mine-workings? The kirk is way up the beck from there, above Crackpot Hall. The Puritans went up there to hold services in the bad times around the Civil War when Church of England good as went Roman. It's since those days that main of dalesfolk are Chapel - we learnt it all at Muker School.' *The Dalesman November 2008*.

#### I Malham Free School

In 1828 the poster advertising the vacancy for a master gives the salary for teaching the children of Malham as £77 per annum out of which the Trustees were to allow the retiring Thomas Hurtley a pension of £16 per annum for the rest of his life. This poster also states that the candidates must be "competent to teach the Greek, Latin and English Languages; Writing, Arithmetic, etc, etc."

The examination of the candidates was to take place on Wednesday, 17th December at the house of Mr Harrison, the Buck Inn, in Malham. We do not know for certain who was appointed to succeed Thomas Hurtley but it is likely to have been **James Metcalfe** who on the 14th of May 1836 was given three months' notice by the trustees 'in consequence of the many complaints laid against you on account of your intemperate habits and of your taking in a number of Boarders and thereby neglecting your Duty to the children of the inhabitants of Malham'. #### A FAMILY OBELISK from Dr Christopher Metcalfe M590

Our significant family obelisk (c15 feet and made of marble) presented a very sorry sight when. some years ago along with many others in the Pateley Bridge Cemetery, it was dismantled by the Harrogate Borough Council.

The cemetery was opened in 1874 with my great grandmother Isabella, first wife of George

Metcalfe (1826 -1898), interned in 1879; the names of many other family members were added, the most recent entry that of George Metcalfe's last grandchild, Dr John Christopher Hesketh (1919-2006).



However the obelisk was recently restored (in November 2008) by HA Green & Sons of Ripon after Mrs Margaret May of Thirsk - Dr Hesketh's eldest daughter (who had assumed responsibility for the family's

graves) - spent a considerable amount of time and energy

dealing with the Harrogate Council and more recently our chosen restorer. The very considerable expense has been shared between the great grandchildren of George Metcalfe. The council has offered £45 towards reinstatement!

It is interesting that a short article has just appeared in The Daily Telegraph of 17 January 2009 headed 'Ministers Attack Graveyard Tinkering'. Fresh guidance has now been issued by the Ministry of Justice to relevant authorities demanding that headstones only be moved as a last resort, to avoid "unnecessary distress"



- (and expense!).

#### **Another Metcalfe House for Sale**

The 400 year old Porch House at Northallerton North Yorkshire is for sale. Once used to house King Charles I after his capture in Scotland during the English Civil War and owned by the Metcalfe family from 1584 until 1988 is being sold by its current owners with a price tag of £500,000. THE PARISH CLERK by John Lowry originally appeared in the Hampshire Family Historian November 1992. Reprinted by permission.

There can be few of us who have not been helped by the work of a parish clerk during our searches, and we may have stopped to wonder who clerks were and what they did. The answer is that, as the incumbent's chief lay helper, they did whatever he wanted them to do. Originally they were in minor holy orders and performed some of the less important functions during divine service. The emphasis of their duties was more on the liturgical than the lay side. After the Reformation this tendency was reversed but they were still expected to lead the singing (particularly the metrical psalms), make the responses, and say the "Amens". The essential qualification, that they should be literate, remained.

As the variety of parishes, incumbents, and clerks was infinite, so too was the variety of jobs done by clerks. In theory they should have had a sexton to help them. He dug graves, rang the bell, and did maintenance repairs to the church building. But there must have been poor parishes which could not, or did not, employ a sexton if they could push his work on to the clerk. Family historians probably think the clerks' most important job was keeping the registers. Some were kept impeccably in neat handwriting while others were scrawled and sprinkled with blots. As we know, they were not always accurate and sometimes committed the sin of writing up a register after the ceremony had taken place when they had forgotten some of the details. It is charitable to think the clerk was old or ill who wrote an entry I came across, "Isobel son of John Smith baptized..." or perhaps he had come to the church after a long business lunch up at the Rectory.

Parish clerks were part-time and paid, but as a rule the amount they received only compensated them for loss of earnings in their own occupation. If he wished, the clerk could extend the musical content of the service to include hymns for the congregation perhaps with the help of a small choir. If he played an instrument he might accompany the singing or get together a band of players. Thomas Hardy in "Under the Greenwood Tree" describes such village church music which might have been inspired by the parish clerk.

In some ways the parish clerk could exercise considerable power over his incumbent, as he was essential to the smooth running of the parish. Who else was there to bring parents and babies, brides and grooms, mourners and deceased together with the clergyman to have their most important rituals performed? There must have been many a young and inexperienced curate who went in fear of his clerk. Such a robust clerk is described by Flora, Thomson in "Lark Rise to Candleford" where, in the 1880's in an Oxfordshire 15

village, Clerk Tom's responses drowned the subdued murmur of the congregation, and trod on the heels of the rector before he had finished while prolonging his own final syllables. He threatened to lock the church door on latecomers after the bell had finished ringing. Tom also stoked the coke stove, warmed the water for winter baptisms and having no sexton, dug the graves.

Other clerks took a more relaxed attitude towards their work. One can be seen in an 18th century engraving by William Hogarth. He is wearing scholars' bands, and is sitting holding his glasses in a kind of mini-pulpit under the main pulpit during the sermon. Like the rest of the congregation he is sound asleep.

Today, clerks are still appointed by parochial church councils but as a result of legislation introduced in 1844 and 1894, most of their responsibilities have been taken over by church officials or local administration. In London, the Worshipful Company of Parish Clerks has been in existence since the mid-13th century.

#### FFHS NEWS

The Halsted Trust is hosting the next national Family & Local History conference 'Open the Door & Here are the People'. It is being held at the East Midlands Conference Centre, Nottingham, 28th to 31st August 2009. The event will cover a broad spectrum of subjects of interest to the family, local and social historian with experts, information and speakers including military historian, broadcaster and author Richard Holmes; historians and authors Kate Williams and Sarah Wise; TV genealogist Nick Barratt; George Redmonds, leading authority on English surnames plus speakers from The Galleries of Justice, Institute for Name-Studies, King's College, London, The Library & Museum of Freemasonry, The Media Archive for Central England, The National Archives, National Maritime Museum, National Monuments Record, Parliamentary Archives, Royal Geographical Society, The Royal Observatory, The Women's Library and the Society of Genealogists. The Halsted Trust is also hosting the Federation of Family History Societies General Meeting as part of the conference activities.

The Family Records Centre is now closed and the General Register Office (GRO) no longer provides a facility for customers to apply for and collect certificates in central London. All certificates are issued by post via the General Register Office based in Southport, Merseyside. The service provided by local register offices remains unchanged.

Temporary closure of Caird Library, National Maritime Museum, Greenwich. Work will begin earlier than initially planned on the £35 million redevelopment of the National Maritime Museum, to include a modern research and reading room and improved storage for the paper-based collections. The move of the archive and library collections currently stored in the South West Wing of the museum to temporary offsite storage will therefore begin earlier, with the Caird Library closed to all users until late spring/early summer 2009.

The 1911 Census became available online on 13th January 2009 on a pay per view website in a partnership between FindMyPast and The National Archives. The site will not be part of the FindMyPast system and will not be available for viewing as part of their subscription services, although log-in details and pay per view credits will work on either site.

London Metropolitan Archives & Guildhall Library Manuscript Section in partnership with Ancestry are to launch the first records on Ancestry.co.uk early this year as part of a digitisation program to make available a range of genealogical sources. It is expected that Parish Records, Poor Law documents and London school admissions – records from 843 individual London schools dating from early Victorian times through to 1911 will be among the first to be launched.

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**S**ince the Society began nearly thirty years ago members have been recording occurrences of the Metcalfe name in all its variances on lists.

Initially they were handwritten or typed lists but as computers and more particularly Personal Computer's came into their own the diligent Society collectors compiled the details on paper and media.

The lists were scrutinised by our various list holders and archivists before being entered into the family database. At the last count there were some 2500 lists of varying length and detail. Some are of census returns, BMD's from parish records, wills, monumental inscriptions, a list of seafarer's from the National Archives, whilst others are from little known sources that individual family researchers recorded whilst looking for that elusive breakthrough.

Some of the lists are short and have only a few entries whilst others run to many pages. All are of interest and usefulness - they might just give that piece of information which makes sense of the family conundrums we all tend to have at some stage.

With the coming of the internet and the placing of more information on line the potential for finding that missing piece of information (or the opportunity for greater confusion!) arises. So over the last few months your Society has looked to access information appearing on the Internet and get it onto our database. A start has been made on listing the divorce records from the National Archives and there are other lists awaiting transcribing. Our List Coordinator also ensures that the lists go onto the database and over the next few months we are hoping to

extract more information from the pre-1850 period.

Where do you fit in? Well in a number of ways.

If you have information which you have gathered and not shared with the Archivist team in the past why not send it in to Brian Metcalfe, the Archivist coordinator?

If you you have gathered wills details concerning Metcalfes (from either Metcalfe or non-Metcalfe wills) have you sent them to Edwin Metcalfe for copying?

**H**ave you checked out the List of lists on the Society's web site? You may be surprised at what there is. Why not have a look and if there is anything of interest then contact our List Coordinator, Anita Metcalfe.

It all adds up to more information thus increasing the opportunity to find that missing link. Why not look at what information you have already and send it in or make time available you never know what benefits it might bring?

#### Diary of a Victorian Junior Officer - Part 2


In part 1 (see Mecca News 85 August 2008) Lt Col G C Jones, wrote: "Booth Hay Metcalfe was born in 1843 ... went to Cambridge and after going down his father purchased a commission for him in the 83rd. ... Warwick Metcalfe (M256) ....came across his grandfather's diary for 1868. The entries are short and concise but nevertheless give an insight into the life of a subaltern when the 83rd was stationed in Gibraltar and on leave in UK. I have extracted a selection of entries which are intended to give an impression of his duties. recreation and lifestyle." Part 1 covered the first six months of the year.

Now back in Richmond Booth Hay went to York to watch cricket visited Scarborough and then to London where he watched Eton v Harrow prior to returning to Gibraltar.

Tue 7 Jul. Started by 9.30 train to "Scarbro" with Fitz

MacPherson & Mrs M Philip & Ada S. had a very jolly day. Not so many people as I expected. Met Mr & Mrs Dver. Gerald Wilson left by the 4.30 train & got home about 10.30 - very hot.

Sat 11 Jul. Pitt breakfasted with me & saw me off by mail to Southampton. Very hot again - met Perrot. Templeman on board "Mapillia" Same ship I came home in. Left Southampton about 3.p.m Thu 16 Jul. Arrived in Gib this morning about 5.a.m. after a very fair passage. Landed about 7.30 with Gus. Bond(?) sent young Perrot on board the (?) for Cadiz. Lent him 2 sovs. Wed 29 Jul. Adjutants drill under Capt of day. "Moi" on gun-drill. Fawcett started early in The Yacht



with Frank for Algeciras en route for England via Spain & France. Rather astonished the natives - exciting interview with Mortimer.

Thu 30 Jul. Ft (Fawcett?) returned last night having changed his plans -Frank (Frank seems to have been his boatman) came back this morning from Algeciras with a letter to Ft very hot day - no wind - gun drill in evenina.

Fri 31 Jul. Persuaded Ft to leave today by Steamer "Mandeg"(?) for Harve by way of Cadiz & Lisbon. Flat calm not a breath of wind - on gun drill - Powell & Marriott went on board with Ft a great loss to Regt.

Tue 11 Aug. Wind changed to W. Prince Consort left for Malta in evening - young mid. left prisoner at 21 Algeciras for riding over old woman - Gun drill - squad examined by Instructor and passed - not at all sorry. Mess & band in evening.

Sat 22 Aug. CO's Parade at 6.a.m under Major Forster. Back about 7.30. Theoret instruction at 11. Then Kit Inspection. Afternoon went out for a sail with Fawkes & Powell - nice breeze. Went Europa Point Ramps. Paid Frank £5.

Sat 5 Sep. C.O.'s parade under the Chief till 7.30 slight shower & then cleared off. Theoret Instruction under Gore but went in fact to inspect coal at Chief's quarters instead. Went fishing in afternoon with Wyndham & Chocera - caught about 150. Wind still in E.

Thu 17 Sep. Breakfast and then took over A Coy from Wyndham. Frank still on sick list. Went down St Michaels Cave with F.K.W - Sparkey & Powell wonderful sight well worth going to see. All the Sergts of the Garrison there with their wives etcevening turned out the Club.

Fri 18 Sep. On Guard N Front with CLS seedy after late night - very bad d - - - got some physics from Robinson after which better. Frightfully wet night not very pleasant walking round by the Devil's Tower.

Tue 22 Sep. Adjt's Parade under Capt of day. Calpe Hounds out for cub hunting first time. Not much sport...... in Spain ~ "Viva Prim" great excitement at the lines ~ much smuggling ~ after tasting many sherries ~ went down to Catalan Bay with J.de.M & Stewart no sport ~ no birds too early.

Wed 23 Sep. Great excitement in Gib re revolution in Spain ~ much smug-

gling still going on ~ in fact free trade. Arrival of Prince... (?) at Algeciras & two frigates "Villa de Madrid" & "Saragossa" walked out to North Front with Wyndham. Great excitement in The Lines.

Sat 10 Oct. On Duty again. Mail from Malta in 3 days. Wonderfully quick passage "Ceylon". Wrote a long letter home - Field day in honour of Admiral Farragut. Jolly day. Wyndham & Stewart out for a sail in the Yacht - light breeze.

Fri 16 Oct. Shooting again commenced about 9.a.m. Wind began to rise about 12.30 so knocked - off as men began shooting very badly. Back to I barracks about 2 p.m. " pretty well tired. Not so hot.

Tue 20 Oct. Heavy night last night ~ rather dead this morning - volley firing - finished by 12 o.c. and then racing commenced - very little excitement - nothing extra in the racing line. Very hot in the sun.

From 25 Oct to 7 Nov Booth Hay went on short cruises on a yacht to Malaga, Ceuta and Tangier.

Tue 27 Oct. Still in sight of The Rock about 6 miles from shore - splendid morning hardly a ripple - about 2pm. a nice breeze which took us into Malaga about 4.30 pm - moored - dined on board & went on shore and had a look round.

Fri 30 Oct (At Ceuta). Breakfast & went on shore about 10.30. Visited the "Citadel de (la Reina) (?)", Castle, Convict Prison etc Sailed about 2 p.m. for Gib with fair breeze - good run of2 hrs (?) on the Samara(?) & came on shore.

Sat 31 Oct. Breakfast on board the "Whirlwind" with P Cuthbert &

McWhinnie. J de M there - then "Muster parade" Renewal of leave for seven days for another cruise - P.C. M de M dined with me - & then rounds - turned in about 3.30.

Tue 3 Nov. Went on board the "Leda" at 9a.m. to breakfast - weighed anchor and started for Tangiers. Nasty thick rainy morning - but cleared up when round Capita(?) Point - made a capital run to Tangier - went on shore & called on Sir John Hay.

Wed 4 Nov. turned out all the bazaar - R invested heavily in old silver. After lunch went for a ride in the country with Sir J & Lady Hay - very pleasant. In the evening dined with them. Very pleasant evening - played billiards then turned in

Fri 6 Nov. Blowing fresh from W. With (?) more shopping& after lunch called on Sir J H to leave PPc's. Went on board the Leda about 5.30 intending to sail for Cadiz but came on a regular gale with a tremendous sea running - rather a lively night. Sat 7 Nov. Much better night than we

expected - heavy seas still running - cleared out about 10.30 intending to beat up to Cadiz - but when two miles to W of Tangier bout ship and made a splendid run into Gib of 3 hrs weather moderating - wind N.

Tue 10 Nov. On duty .....(?) blowing fresh from N. W. in evening to a gale. Rochefort still here. Dined with me & then went to Convent - great ....... (?) on. Many people there - turned in about 12.30 very tired

Sat 28 Nov. More Position drill & judging distance. Field day on N Front Regt out - didn't go being on musketry. Had a walk as far as the Almeda. Then went to see C.L.S. on

Main Guard. Turned in early.


Thu 17 Dec. Off Guard relieved early (check) for 28th Ball by F Karslake & Anderson. Afternoon Presentation of Colours to 28th - home about 5pm. pretty well tired - not many at mess. Fri 18th Dec. Regt Ct Martial at 9.30 finished about 11am. then breakfast full account of the 28th Ball - great success - most of fellows back about 6.a.m. Sergt's Hop in evening went to opera "Masta" (?) very good.

Fri 25 Dec. Xmas Day began to rain very heavily about 8am & went on at intervals till 12.o.c. came off guard about 11.30. Chief went round Xmas dinners. Rooms very nicely decorated.

Thu 31 Dec. Orderly Room - had to wait 1/2 an hour for Evidence then muster parade - breakfast - finished arrangements for Spain Drove out to Spanish Lines - mess - Sergt's Ball - so finished the year 1868.

Comments: There is little mention of the soldiers, not even his soldier servant, only a few comments about "Frank" who seem to have been responsible for his yacht. The opposite sex gets scant mention just

his mother. the wife of a brother officer. a walk with the ladies in Ireland and once 'Alice". He was an only child and it is possible that Alice had been his nannv.

#### **AUSTWICK COINCIDENCE**

The article about Austwick in the December MN (No 86), reminded me of a surprising occurrence last year. Returning home from a meeting of the Society in Hawes, Ena & I called at Austwick. I knew from the 1891 census that my granddad James Metcalfe, was a farm servant, age 18, living & working at the White House, Austwick in John & Isabella Bradley's household, John being a farmer.

Enquiring from an elderly lady in the village street, if the White House still existed, I was delighted when she replied in the affirmative & also gave excellent directions to it. It was a short drive out of the village & was well signed at the entrance of the drive leading to the house. It is a lovely property, which has obviously been well maintained. I knocked on the door, to ask if it I might take some photographs, & was greeted by the lady of the house, with whom we had a pleasant conversation about the reason for my visit. The first surprise came when she revealed that her husband was a Metcalfe! We do

seem to have spread our wings. I eventually took some photographs and we continued our journey.

The second surprise concerning Austwick came some months later, when a new member sent details of his ancestors, so that we could prepare his birth brief. Reading through his notes, my eyes lit up when I read that his parents lived



at the White House, Austwick. His mother being the lady to whom Ena & I had spoken some months earlier!

In addition to the present day connections, Austwick features greatly in the early days of the "Clan". As our wonderful book "The History of the Clan" reveals, Austwick was the southernmost stronghold held by Earl Maldred. It then passed to his son, Gospatrick II, who eventually handed it over to his son Dolphin. It was Dolphin's grandson, known originally as William de Dent, whose lands occupied Middleton Calf Top, becoming known as William Medecalf de Dent, literally William of the middle hill in Dent. Thus did our family name come into being around 1175.

(It was his father, also Charles, who founded the extant Norwich law firm Metcalfe and Copeman in 1801.) My great grandfather. Fenwick Metcalfe. was his fourth son. a surgeon in the Indian Medical Service, who was killed in India about 1874 by being blown off a cliff riding his horse. Charles Metcalfe was a multi millionaire and left 12 manors, but my great grandmother, Augusta, a descendent of Admiral Lord Gardiner only inherited about £4000 and was pretty hard up. He had three sons. Brig-Gen Fenwick Henry Metcalfe DSO Royal Artillery (my grandfather), Brig-Gen Sydney Metcalfe and Gerald Fenwick Metcalfe, an artist and an ARA. George F Metcalfe M1785.

You "so do" have a Metcalfe link in Malta (MN84). My 1st cousin Emily White and I are descendants of John Metcalfe 1776, Hawes, and Margaret Wilson, Hawes, Married Dec 27 1786. Hawes. In the late thirties Emily a R N left Denton Yorks for a position at Mile End Hospital London. There she met eminent Doctor John Craig of Malta. They got married and moved back to Malta. They had 3 girls and a boy. John was one of the Doctors on call for the then Princess Elizabeth when Prince Phillip was stationed in Malta. Later on a hospital on the Isle of Gozo is or was named after John. As far as I know the 3 daughters still live in Malta. The son in London.

Ordained into the Church of Scotland and became minister of the Congregational Church, Ayr, 23 December 1868. Later appointed minister to the South Parish, Paisley. He died 8 August 1916.

#### Metcalfe's and the GAR



In September 2008 I was wandering round the burial ground of the Methodist Chapel in Benton Wisconsin USA looking for my Buxton stones when I became aware of two small markers; one was for Thomas Metcalfe and the other was for Leonard Metcalfe. They had a small metal marker quoting GAR. I asked our friends what GAR stood for, they informed me they stood for

**Grand Army of the Republic**, dating from the rebellion of 1776. So I decided to look into these Metcalfe men.



Leonard Metcalfe was 30 years old, born in England and a miner, he died August 1871.
He was married with 5 children.

Thomas was 24 years old but his service in the GAR was short as he was taken ill and died at Nashville on 16th May 1865.



Both joined the 96<sup>th</sup> Regiment of the Illinois Volunteer Infantry at Benton on the 2<sup>nd</sup> March 1865, then Company A at Russellville Tennessee. When the 96<sup>th</sup> was mustered out they were transferred to Company B 21<sup>st</sup> Illinois.

Four more Metcalfe's were also uncovered

Christopher aged 21 years old born England; miner subsequently he became a farmer at Centre Grove Dubuque County Iowa

James aged 22 years old became a druggist at Benton. His place of birth was given as Glimerside England. (I think this should be Gunnerside, Swaledale.) John aged 23 years old he became a banker Paulina O'Brien County Iowa (Thomas, James & Christopher seem to be brothers. Their parents were James & Margaret Metcalfe. If that is the case other members of the family were Frances; Margaret; Mary Ann; Mathew; Mary; From the 1850 Federal Census.)

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#### The Mecca News April 2009

Corporal Josephus Metcalf aged 26 years old was born Pecatonica Illinois, engineer enlisted Galena, wounded at Chickamauga and fell into enemy hands. He was taken to Richmond Virginia where he remained two months; then taken to Danville, where he was kept for five months and ten days when he was exchanged.

Returning to the regiment he was left at Chattanooga to guard supplies. While on his way to rejoin the regiment at Palaski he fell off the cars and sprained an ankle. He was sent to hospital at Nashville and from there to St Louis. He returned to the regiment and was promoted to corporal. Before enlisting into Company A he was with the 3rd Missouri Cavalry. He became a stationary engineer at White Oak Spring Wisconsin.

#### Sage Observations from the 1500's!

Houses had thatched roofs, thick straw piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying *It's raining cats and dogs*.

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. *That's how canopybeds came into existence*.

The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saving, *Dirt poor*.

The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entrance way. Hence the saying a thresh hold.

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, or *the upper crust*.
